



Mr. and Mrs. Roger I. Wykes, Thornapple River Dr., have returing from a five-week vacation trip to Florida.

During three weeks of their stay, they occupied an apartment on the beach at Treasure Island, located on the Gulf of Mexico. The weather was perfect, sunny, breezy and with no rain.

One of the highlights of the trip was a visit to the lychee nut plantation, the first of its kind in Florida, and the country. Lychee nuts are a delicacy served by the Chinese and used in their cooking

In addition to the grove they visited an Arboretum, or Botanical garden. The owner's father started the garden, containing poinsettia, hibiscus, rare palms from Africa, numerous tropical trees, flowering shrubs and vines, as a hobby. There are palm trees used in the manufacturing of rice paper and panama hats. One palm is called the shaving brush tree because the red and white blossoms have stamen formed like shaving brushes.

The trip included two visits to Mrs. Wykes' mother, Mrs. H. H. Mallory, at Mt. Dora, Florida.


