Order Third Trial In Cascade Death

A third trial of Mrs. Shirley Jo Swanson, 28 year old Clarksville woman, who crashed through the window of a Cascade drug store last September, killing a St. Joseph woman pediatrician, has been granted by Circuit Judge Dale Souter.

Mrs. Swanson was convicted on April 13, on a charge of negligent homicide in the death. Judge Souter ruled for a new trial for Mrs. Swanson, stating that Kent Prosecutor Stuart Hoffius had committed a reversible error in the last trial by referring to the fact that Mrs. Swanson's husband, a passenger in the car at the time of the fatal accident, did not testify. A rule of evidence states that a husband and wife cannot be made to testify against each other, and that if they refuse to testify, their silence cannot be used to imply guilt.

The first trial of Mrs. Swanson also ended in a mistrial when Judge Leonard D. Verdier ruled that a prosecution witness gave testimony prejudicial to Mrs. Swanson.

All Efforts Fail To Revive **Drowning Victim**

All efforts of Thornapple residents and the Cascade Fire Department failed in an attempt Sunday to save the life of Richard A. Long, 29, of Grand Rapids. Mr. Long was drowned after he had saved his 15 month old son from the family car, which had rolled down a bank into 25 feet of water with the sleeping child.

Grover Fase, of 1772 Thornapple River Dr., and Walter Afton, Jr., of 1768 Thornapple River Dr., who were fishing near by at the time, recovered the body of Mr. Long.

The Cascade Fire Department was immediately notified and rushed to the scene of the accident where fire chief Sy Dykhouse administered oxygen in an attempt to revive Long. When the first tank of oxygen ran low, additional supplies were again rushed from Cascade. George Strain, of 2727 Thornapple River Drive, applied artificial respiration for more than an hour in a further attempt to revive Mr.

The efforts to revive Mr. Long on the part of those present who responded so quickly and worked hard are to be commended for the job they did.

foods in fold-up metal tubes. To get the drive rolling the Collapsible Tube Manufacturers Council distributed thousands of one-ounce tubes of jelly to thousands of packaging experts who were on hand to make sure they weren't missing any ways to get their products into the consumer's market basket.

Food in metal tubes-fish and meat pastes, caviar, cheese spreads, honey, catsup, mustard, mayonaise, even cream cheese, butter and coffee cream-have long been popular in Europe.

"There definitely is a place in the streamlined American way of living for foods in tubes," said Lester B. Platt, executive secretary of the Council. "In this type of packaging the foods would be ideal for making canapes and hors d'oeuvres, for school and work lunch boxes, and for picnics, hiking and camping."





In an era when the typewriter has become standard military equipment, a directive unearthed recently in the Army's Office of the Quartermaster General reads like the museum piece it

Dated September 9, 1876, signed by the "chief clerk", and addressed to the "principle clerks" in the then Quartermaster General's Office, the circular states: "The Quartermaster General desires that use be made of the type writer. The principle clerk of each branch of this office will therefore please designate some one person under his dir. June 15 at Masonic Temple. ection to take charge of a type writer, and by practice become familiar with and proficient in its use, in order that all letters, not mere forms, and products of each branch, may be printed by

The directive was written by hand in pen and ink.

You can obtain the two necessary application forms from your nearest FHA or VA office. One is a certificate on which you state that you have tried to obtain an FHA-insured or VA-guaranteed loan from at least two local or reasonably accessible mortgage lenders and have been turned down. 
