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Two Cascade Men Capture Robbers Sunday Morning

A long string of burglaries and car thefts were ended early Sunday morning when two youthful burglars were captured; one of them being held at bay by two ACE area businessmen, the other arrested in Grand Rapids by city police.

Starting at Cascade Lumber company in Cascade, the two young thieves, 17 and 21 years of age, broke the glass in the front door and entered the office. According to Ray DeGreen, manager of the lumber yard, nothing was disturbed in the breakin.

Breaking a side window at Smith's Super Service in Cascade, the pair removed the cash register from the building and abandoned it near the power dam where it was discovered by sheriff's deputies making a search of the area. Dick Smith, owner of the station said that \$7 was missing from the till.

The attempted robbery of the Marsman Lumber company on 28th St. proved to be the undoing of the criminal team.

Breaking a section of glass in a rear door of the Marsman office set off a burglar alarm in the home of Everett Marsman, who lives next to the yard. Running out with a rifle, Marsman saw one of the pair, Morgan Wheat, 21, Lowell, in a car parked near the office. The car was a stolen one.

According to Marsman he went up to the car and ordered Wheat to "Get out or I'll shoot!" He then held Wheat at gunpoint.

In the meantime, Ivan Marsman, a younger brother, armed with a shotgun, was searching the buildings behind the office. He heard Ken Worthington, 17, Saranac, the second culprit, say to Everett "Drop your gun or I'll shoot". Both brothers then heard a shot but because of darkness could not tell where it came from. It was discovered after Worthington's capture, that he had, in attempting to shoot the older Marsman, wounded himself as he drew his gun.

Ivan, helping to hold Wheat until sheriff's deputies arrived, ordered him to empty his pockets. The first item Wheat dropped was a loaded 38 revolver.

After the deputies arrived the area was searched but no trace was found of Worthington. A second car found a short distance away had also been stolen by the pair.

The cash register, battered in an attempt to open it, was found outside the back door of the office. It was from this spot that Worthington attempted to shoot Marsman.

The pair admitted to the questioning officers that they were responsible for the theft at Coopers Service in Ada and many other robberies and car thefts in this part of the state.

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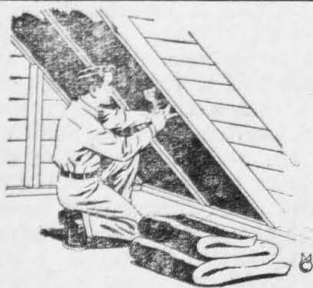

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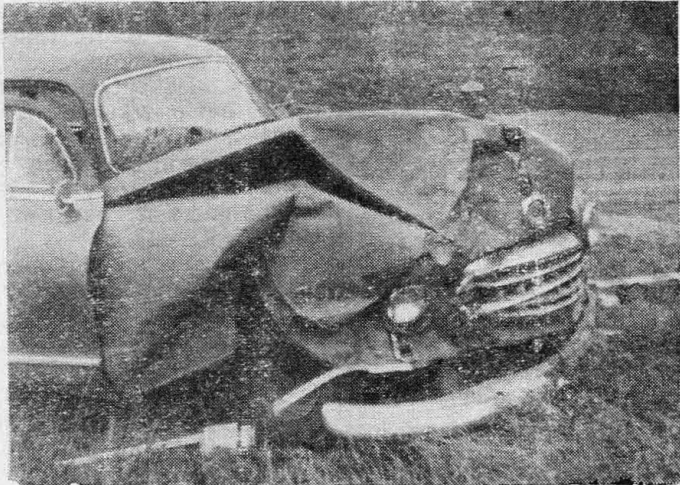
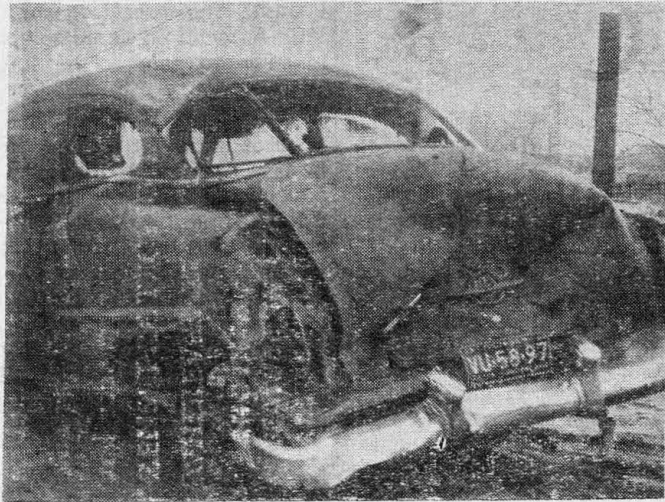
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Three Injured In Week End Accidents

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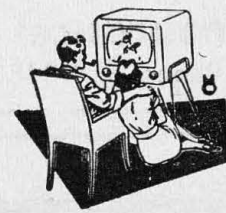
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Newsmen Confer at Michigan State

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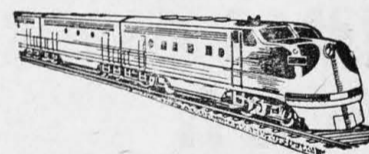

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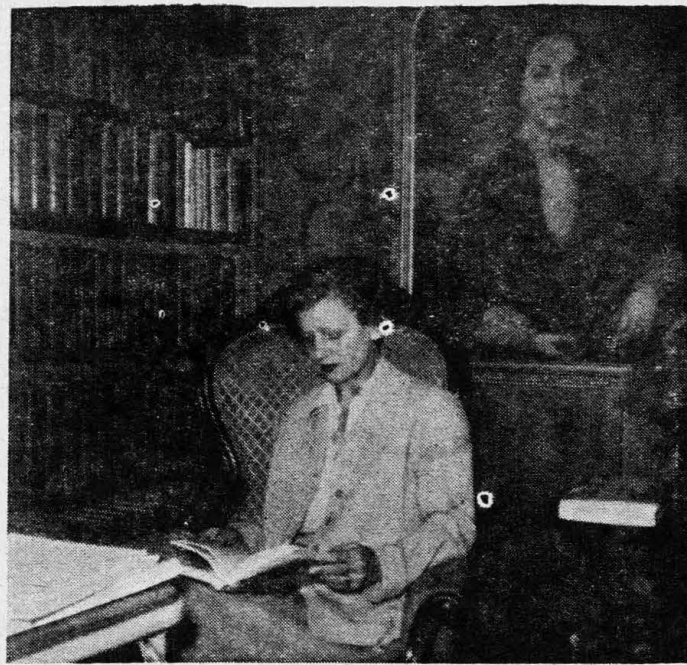
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Local Writer Has Two Books Published
