Every 24 hours, accidents kill 300 persons in the United States. Twelve per cent of the people who are now 16 years of age will be killed or injured during their lifetime if the present trend in auto accidents continues.

Think for a moment-Last week 2100 people were killed in accidents. All of them were people just like you-all of them had the same kind of hopes and fears, families and friends. These figures show that it COULD happen to YOU. And it will happen to you.

If you consistently break speed laws, if you fail to stop for traffic lights or stop signs, if you try to beat the yellow light, if you drive with bad brakes, if you drink before driving, have a dirty windshield, or a leaky muffler, you will be certain to end up as a vital statistic.

Everyone of the above mentioned items has been in the past and will continue to be in the future, a direct cause of fatal or disabling accident.

The sad part of almost all accidents involving two or more cars is the fact that innocent persons too, are killed or injured.

Our Sheriff's Department, state and city police are doing everything they can to keep dangerous drivers off the highways. Last year over 25,000 Michigan drivers lost their right to drive. Still the death rate is climbing.

Did you know that when your car is going 60 mph, you are covering 88 feet of ground every second? Did you know that with perfect brakes it will take 226 feet to come to a complete stop? Think for a moment. What chance do you have to avoid an accident at 60 miles per hour? The odds are against you, my friend.

Forty per cent of those killed in Michigan traffic accidents are pedestrians. Motorists should be especially watchful in areas where children are liable to be playing. You can be absolved of blame when a child dashes out in front of your car and is killed but your "I'm sorry" to the parents will even sound strange in your own, ears. Neither one of you will ever forget the little body lying in front of or under your car.

Sheriff Arnold Pigorsh says, "Be serious for a moment, just what could you do for yourself and family if you were hospitalized as the result of an accident many miles from home.? Wouldn't it be wise to take a few more minutes on each road trip? It might save a life-your life.

"Only YOU can make Michigan highways the safest of all by knowing and observing the rules of the road. "May we have your cooperation?"



Where did they hunt? Be truthful now-would you tell?

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
