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Nine School Boards Complete Merger

Last Saturday the temporary school board appointed recently for the newly organized school district met in the Collins school.

The board, headed by Russel S. Jensen, made plans for a meeting of the former 9 district school boards which was held this past Tuesday. Books from these various districts were turned over to the new board and problems of the districts were discussed.

Jack Baines, secretary of the temporary board, announced that persons seeking nomination for the July school elections should get their petitions circulated as soon as possible.

Baines stated that the petitions, which must bear the signatures of at least 25 qualified electors, may be procured at his home, 386 Forest Hills, at the office of Lynn Clark, in the County Building Annex, or at the temporary office of Harold S. Chambers in the Martin school building.

The petitions must be signed and returned by the 19th of June. To have full representation from as many of the former districts as possible, those seeking election to the board are urged to seek nomination during the next few days.

Local Men Man Radio Car

Two local men, Grover Buttrick and Frank Atherton, took turns manning the First Aid radio car which was stationed at the Cascade fire barns for the Memorial Day traffic situation.

Under this emergency setup, any accidents in the area can receive immediate attention and the Sheriff's department's cruisers can spend more time in the necessary work.

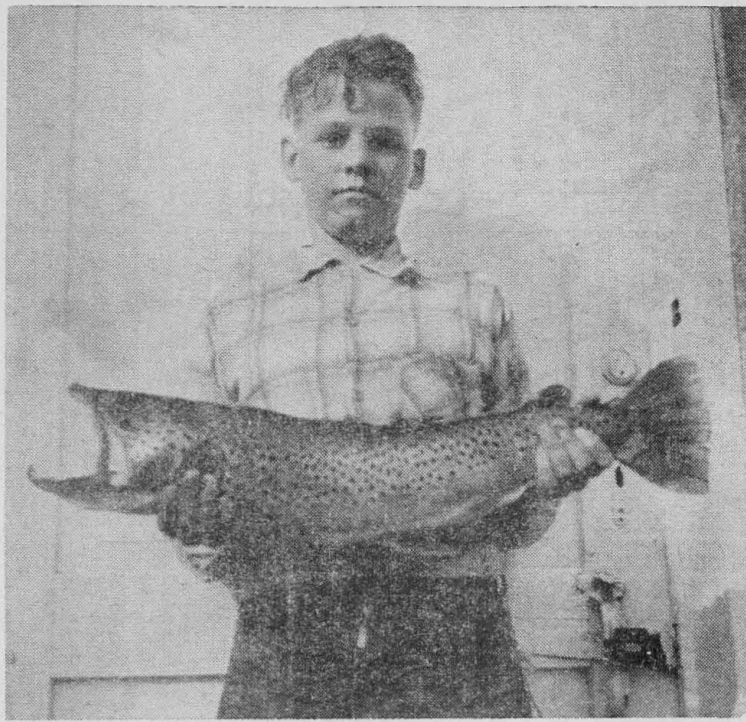

Ada Youth Lands 26-Inch Brown Trout



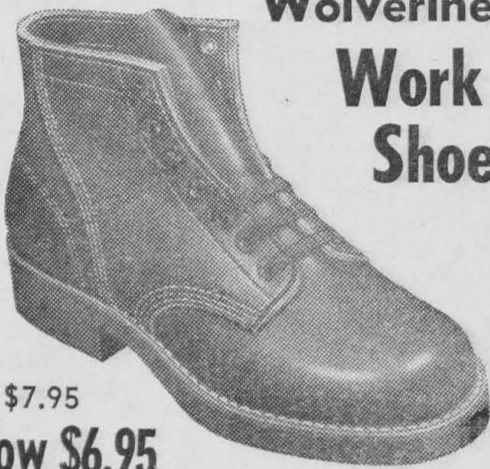

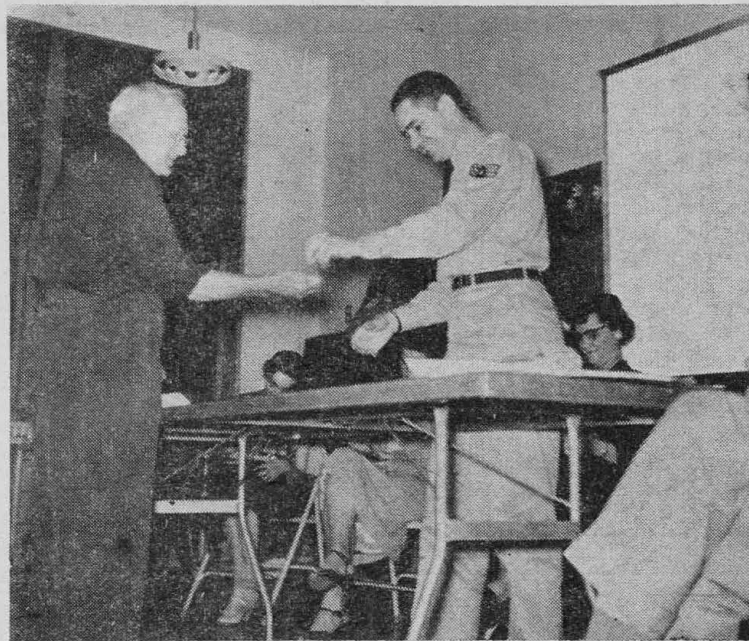

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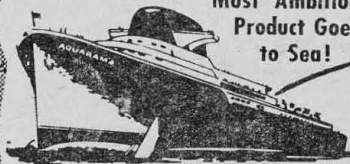
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Ada Locals

Public Notice

On motion made by M. C. Cook and supported by William Veneman, the following ordinance was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Township Board following full consideration of the matters involved finds that the protection of the health of the inhabitants of this township requires the enactment of an ordinance regulating the dumping of refuse and garbage within the Township, and

WHEREAS, the Township Board has the authority under Michigan Public Act 246 of 1954, as amended, to enact such an ordinance,

NOW THEREFORE, the Township of Cascade, Kent County, Michigan, ordains as follows:

"AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE DUMPING OF REFUSE AND GARBAGE WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP OF CASCADE, KENT COUNTY, MICHIGAN, AND IMPOSING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE".

'Section 1-Dump. A "dump" is hereby defined to be a place designated by the Township Board where refuse, rubbish and trash (but not garbage) may be deposited'.

'Section 2-Location of Dump

(a) The Township Board shall by resolution select the location or locations for all dumps to be located within the Township. Such locations shall be lands owned or leased by the Township or may be privately owned land provided the written request or permission of the owner of such land is filed with the Township Board.

(b) No persons shall dump or deposit any refuse, rubbish or trash at any location within the Township of Cascade except in dumps duly designated by the Township Board."

Section 3-Regulations. The Township Board shall by resolution adopt regulations governing the use and maintenance of all such dumps.

Section 4-Deposits of Garbage Prohibited. No persons shall dump or deposit garbage at any location within the Township other than on the premises wherein such person resides. Garbage shall not be deposited at any dump designated for the deposit of refuse, rubbish or trash.

Section 5-Penalty For Violation. Any person who shall violate this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$25.00 or by imprisonment for a term not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 6-Publication and Effective Date. This ordinance shall be published in the SUBURBAN LIFE and is effective thirty (30) days after such publication."

I, Martin J. Vanderveen, Clerk of Cascade Township, Kent County, Michigan, do hereby certify that the foregoing ordinance was duly adopted by the Township Board of Cascade Township at a regular meeting of said Township Board held May 17, 1956 at 8 o'clock P.M. in the Township office at Cascade, Michigan.
