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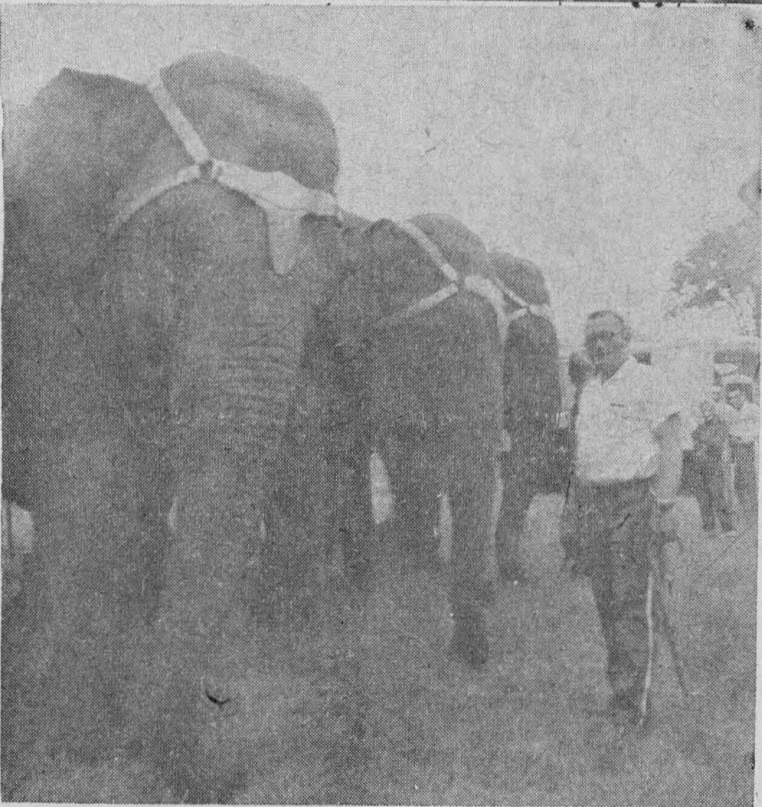
**W.E. Upjohn Center for the

To Explain Bond Issue At Ada School Friday

Residents of the Forest Hills school district are expected to turn out in large numbers for the informational meeting which will be held this Friday, September 14, at 8 p.m. in the Ada school building.

At this public meeting, the proposed \$800,000 school bond issue will be discussed. On hand to answer questions from the floor, which will undoubtedly come thick and fast, will be Harold S. Chambers, superintendent of the new district, members of the board, Joseph T. Daverman of the architectural firm retained by the board, Paul O. Strawhecker, attorney, and Fred Sherk, auditor for the district.

One question certain to be brought up at Friday's meeting is the problem of merging the bonded indebtedness of the various districts. As the situation now stands, debts will not be merged for a period of three years. At the end of this time, electors will have the opportunity to vote on the matter of debt consolidation.

Until this problem is settled, each former school district will carry a different tax rate. As an example, this year's school tax, without an increase for a bond issue, ranges from \$14 per thousand in the Strong and Thomas districts to \$35.70 per thousand in the Knapp area.

How much will the new high school cost? What will we get for our money? How long will it be before the bond issue is liquidated? What will the interest rate be? How much millage will be raised? All these are questions that should be answered.

The people of the new district want a high school. This area needs a high school. With almost \$1,000,000 involved, however, any and all questions pertaining to this money should be completely understood.

The board, which set the date for next Tuesday's vote in the Martin school building, should have the answers to all these questions. Residents in this school district deserve to know all the facts. They are the ones who are going to pay for the new school.

We feel that the difference between assessed valuation and state equalized valuation should also be explained. Will the millage rate for the bond issue be on the assessed, or will it be on the state equalized valuation? How much will the tax, in dollars and cents, be on a home valued at \$1500?

Another problem that taxpayers in this area should know is that interest rates for school bond issues are rapidly rising. According to Attorney General Thomas M. Kavanagh, "The rates on Michigan municipal bond issues have skyrocketed from a normal average of about 3 or 4 per cent to 5 per cent and in one instance 6 per cent, plus a fee."

"With the growing need for new schools, it is unfortunate that the cost of providing a good education for Michigan children should thus be inflated."

At 3 per cent, the interest on \$800,000 amounts to \$24,000 per year. At 4 per cent, it would be \$32,000. These facts must be realized.

The outcome of Friday's meeting will undoubtedly play a major part in the outcome of next Tuesday's balloting.

Those attending the meeting will be armed with facts—facts that only those presiding at the meeting can provide. Only by viewing the entire picture, can the citizens of the new school district vote (continued on back page)

Site Chosen For High School

This past Wednesday evening, the school board of the Forest Hills district announced the choice of a site for the new high school which, if Tuesday's bond issue vote is favorable, might be ready for occupancy next Fall.

An 80 acre tract, with 1300 feet of frontage on both Ada Drive and Hall Street, has been chosen after careful consideration and discussion with architects, men from the city parks department and other officials acquainted with school building problems.

According to Wilford Clapp, chief of the building and site planning division of the Department of Public Instruction, the site is an ideal one in every aspect.

Harold S. Chambers, superintendent of the new district, stated that a sign will be erected on the site facing Hall Street. Chambers said that those persons wishing to view the location of the new school property should go seven tenths of a mile east on Hall from US16 or one and seven tenths of a mile on Ada Drive from Forest Hills Ave.

According to board members, the new site is adaptable to a school building without expensive development. There is ample space for athletic fields such as a track, football and baseball fields. Without crowding, a driver training range can also be constructed.

On the Ada Drive side there are hills suitable for winter sports and activities such as skiing, tobogganing and it is expected that provisions will be made in the future for an ice skating rink.

Chambers stated that the woods on the property will be admirably suited for a camping site; one of the newer aspects of all around modern education.

The portion of the property where the school building itself will be located is high land and affords a wonderful view of the surrounding country side.

Members of the Citizens Advisory committee played a part in the selection of this site also. The feeling among this group was that enough land should be purchased now so that future development and expansion of all the phases mentioned above would be possible.

This recommendation by the committee to the school board helped them to choose this particular site.

Tuesday Vote For Bond Issue

Tuesday, September 18, has been set by the board of the Forest Hills school district as the date for a vote on an \$800,000 school bond issue. Booths will be set up in the Martin school building on US16 and polls will be open from 12 noon until 8 p.m.

According to the school board, the \$800,000 will erect and furnish a new high school building, pay for its site, (story elsewhere), and will build "an addition or additions to and the remodeling of school buildings in said school district".

According to Paul O. Strawhecker, attorney retained by the board, qualifications for voting in the special election are the same as those for the November elections, with the following exception; "they must have property assessed for taxes in the Forest Hills school district, or be the husband or wife of such a person."

In other words, if you are buying a house on a land contract you and your wife are eligible to vote. Strawhecker stated that the term "property owner", sometimes causes confusion and persons who are eligible to cast their ballot occasionally fail to do so.

Plans are under way to procure 12 voting booths for Tuesday's vote. The board feels that this will prevent the usual long line and facilitate the entire procedure.

The vote on the bond issue marks the culmination of approximately five years of working towards a high school for this area. The survey last summer by Harold S. Chambers, at that time superintendent of the Hudsonville school system, and the resulting Chambers Report, set the wheels of consolidation moving.

Originally encompassing a 12 district area, the final vote on the matter was decided by 9 school districts. The new area, now known as the Forest Hills school district, ranges from 4 Mile Road on the north to 48th Street on the south, the East Belt Line on the west and Grand River at Ada on the east.

A heavy turnout of qualified voters is expected at the polls. Those favoring the bond issue feel that a high school in this area will create a real estate boom. Land values have, since consolidation went into effect, risen by as much as 50 per cent.

At the present time, total enrollment in the school district is approximately 1150.

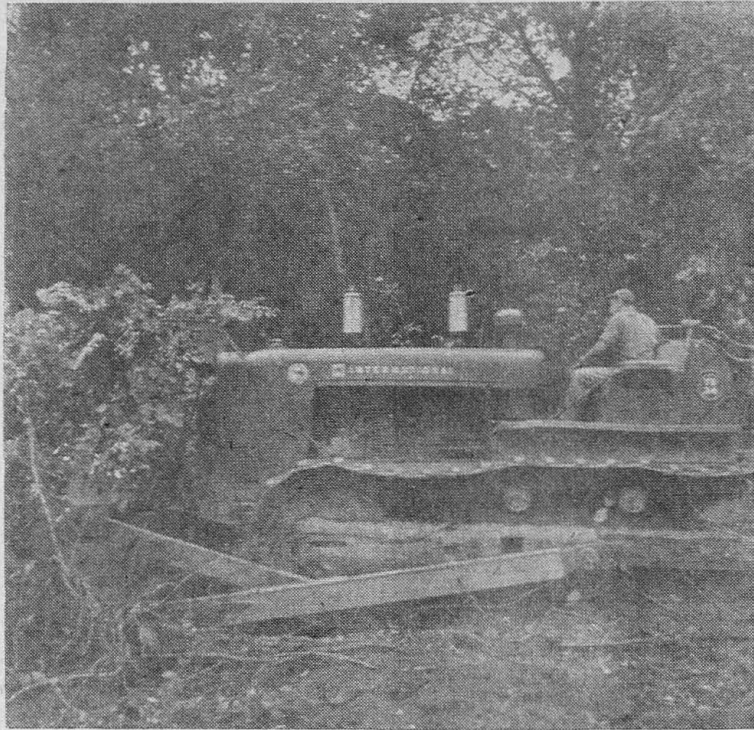

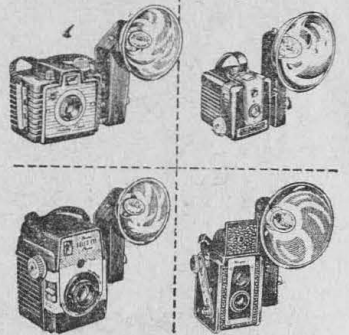

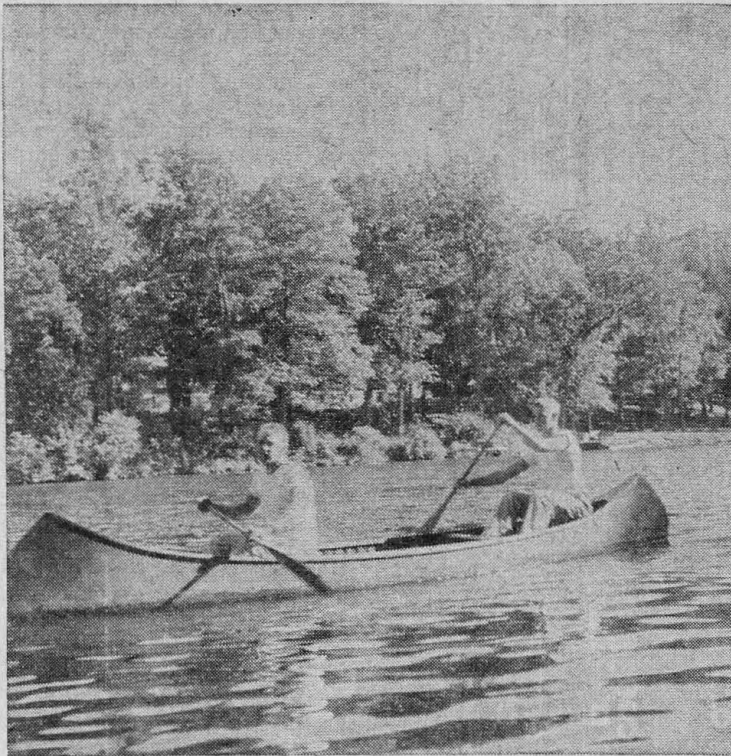

O. B. Snow Heads United Fund

O. B. Snow, veteran leader in Kent County as well as in Grand Rapids, has been named chairman of the 1956 United Red Feather-Red Cross Fund Campaign. Announcement of Snow's appointment was made by James F. Wendell, President of the Community Chest of Grand Rapids and Kent County, and B. Russell Dooge, Chairman of the Kent County Chapter, American Red Cross.

Snow, a native of Kent County and a graduate of Central High School, long has been interested in civic work. During World War II, he served as Club Director and later Area Director in charge of forward areas in the South Pacific for the American Red Cross.



As early as 1941, he was working in Community Chest campaigns, holding several important

posts which culminated in his appointment last year as chairman of the county division. Twice he was chairman for Red Cross fund-raising and served as chapter chairman in 1950 and 1951. He was a member of Red Cross executive committee for seven years and is a life member of the Board.

In 1949, Snow was awarded the "Silver Beaver" for his long and outstanding work in Boy Scouting. The "Beaver" is the highest award given volunteer Scouters in the Grand Valley Council.

As president of the Lions Club in Grand Rapids, and later zone chairman for Lions International and deputy District Governor, Mr. Snow was active in organizing Lions Clubs in Kent County, including the clubs in Caledonia, Thornapple Valley, Standale and Byron Center. He was also instrumental in organizing Lions Clubs in Lowell, Sparta, Rockford and Kent City.

The goal for the United Campaign, traditionally held in October, has not yet been set. Last year, volunteers raised more than a million and a quarter dollars to underwrite the activities in 63 health and welfare agencies which otherwise might campaign individually. Under Snow's leadership, Kent County raised \$58,552 last year, 118.2% of its goal, the largest amount ever raised in Kent County.

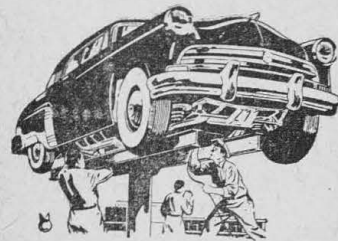

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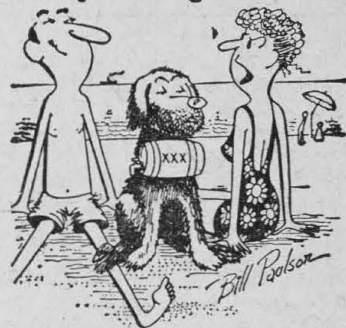
