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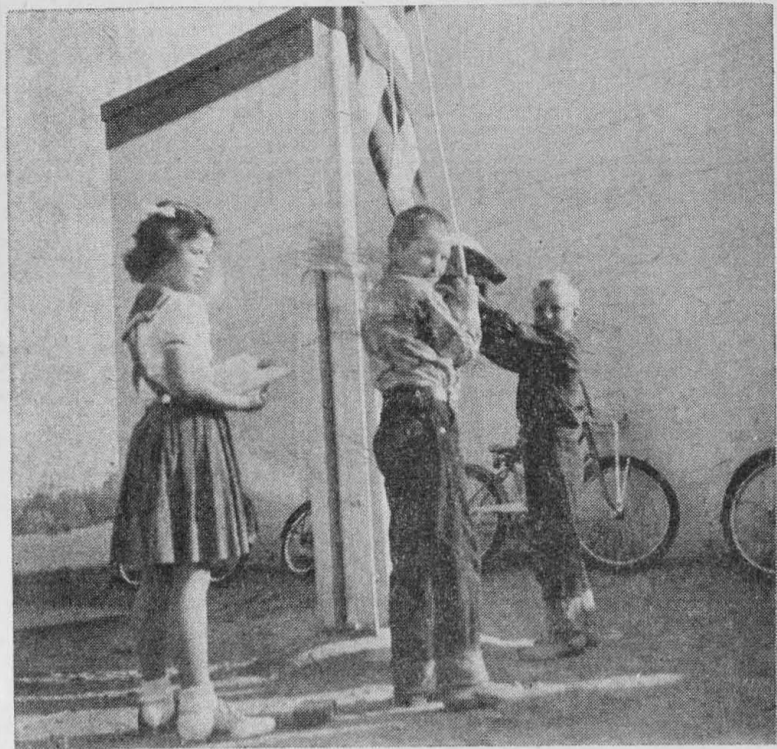

## Cascade Studies Zoning Ordinance

Objectors, if any, to the proposed aircraft hanger on the R. B. Somerville property, Thornapple River Drive stayed away from the public hearing on the matter which was held last Monday evening in the Cascade Township Hall.

Somerville, present at the meeting, spent a lonely half hour waiting for possible objectors to his proposal. At 8:30 p.m., Supervisor Gerrit Baker informed Somerville that it was evident there would be no objections to the project.

Remainder of the evening's session, a joint meeting of the township board and zoning board, was devoted to bringing the township's zoning ordinance up to date.

The ordinance is essentially the same and the only major change was a provision for allowing future trailer camps to be placed in the industrial zone only.

According to the ordinance, the industrial zone is the area within 500 feet of the C and O Railroad right of way. Township attorney, Robert M. Verdier, also present at the meeting, stated that this area can be increased to 1000 feet at the discretion of the board.

The new ordinance will be published, sometime in the near future, in a public newspaper to give township residents a chance to study the matter.

Next step is a public hearing on the ordinance with members of the zoning board. If no objections are brought forth, the zoning board will turn the ordinance over to the township board for final approval.

Supervisor Baker also explained the agreement under which Herman Rutgers was granted permission at the last board meeting to operate a trailer camp on 28th St. According to Baker, Rutgers has agreed to rent space to childless couples only. If, at any time, he decides to dispose of the camp, it will be permanently closed and will not be sold to any other party.

The camp, or court, will not be visible from the highway and before construction begins, plans must be approved by state officials. All trailer courts are licensed by the state and certain requirements must be fulfilled.

## M.S.U. Scientists Find New Links To Tooth Decay

Tooth decay may be affected by body development and thyroid gland activity, according to a Michigan State University research team.

Differences in these two factors have been detected among two special strains of rats developed in the long-term M. S. U. tooth decay study. One strain of rats is susceptible to tooth decay, the other is not.

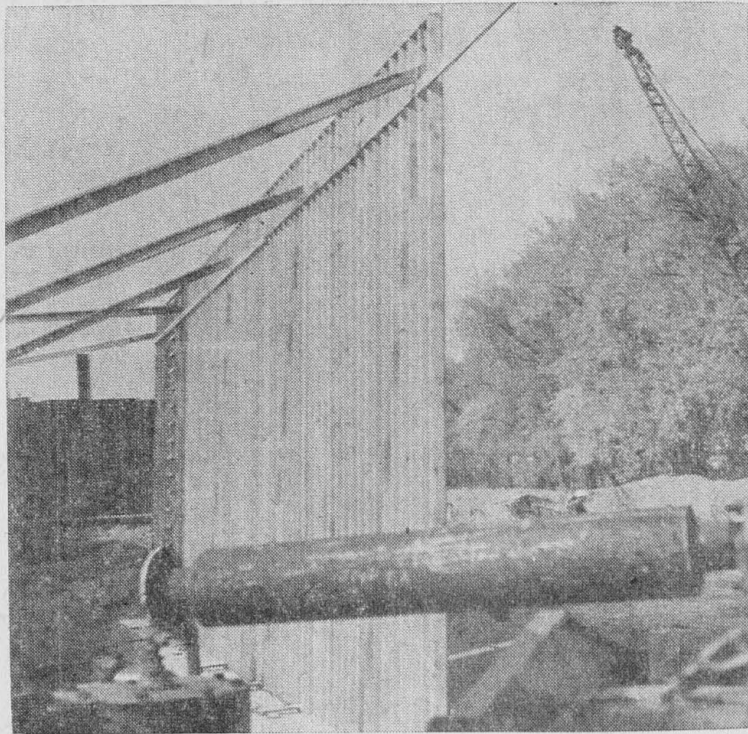
The research team found that when the initial period of body growth is past, decay-prone rats grow less than their cousins who resist tooth decay better.

In the same study, Drs. Waldo F. Keller of the University of Akron and E. Paul Reineke of M. S. U. appear to have found a relationship between tooth decay and thyroid gland activity. Decay-susceptible rats retained more injected radioactive iodine in their thyroid glands in a test period.

"Some of the findings should result in a more complete understanding of tooth decay, and may lead to further improvements in dentifrices," said Dr. Carl A. Hoppert, chemist and one of the project directors.

## Forms Go Up for New Ada Bridge



First sections of the forms for the piers on the Ada bridge were set up this past Tuesday. Built on the ground by carpenters, the plywood sheets are placed in position by a large crane. The piers will be 24 feet in height from the top of the footings and almost 90 feet in length. Steel reinforcing rods protrude from the footings to give a strong bond to the piers and thousands of pounds of steel will be part of the concrete work on each pier. Ernest Malkewitz, project engineer stated that when the piers are completed a variation of less than one inch will be noted.

## Be Sure Clothes Are Clean Before Winter Storage

The first step in storing away those summer clothes is to clean them thoroughly. It pays off to put them away clean, because the longer spots and stains remain on the fabric, the more likely they are to become set and hard to remove.

It's wise, too, to remove any pins or metal ornaments that might leave marks on fabrics in storage, points out Bernette Kahabka, extension clothing specialist at Michigan State University. You will save time if you put away washable summer clothes "rough dried." Other garments, such as men's summer suits or coats will keep best shape if carefully placed on hangers in clothes bags to keep off dust.

All boxes or paper dress bags should be labeled giving the description of the contents such as "Mary's spring coat." Then, if you should want to find a specific garment in the middle of the winter for a warm-weather vacation, you will know just where to look.

Any fabric that you are afraid may stretch, or a garment that is heavily trimmed, should be packed flat. Pad it well to keep its shape and to avoid sharp creases that weaken the fibers. For suits and dresses that will hang all winter, place on padded hanger to help to keep the shoulder line in place.

Old socks or bags made of scraps are handy to use around those summer white shoes to protect them and the things with which they are stored. Cottons and linens can be stored without starch and unironed. Nylons and silks need no special treatment, says Miss Kahabka, except to store them free of wrinkles. Nylons can be stored indefinitely without deterioration of the fiber.

### Raw-Pack Asparagus

Research shows that the easier, flavor-saving raw-pack may be safely used to preserve asparagus. Count on using about 2½ to 3½ pounds of fresh asparagus for each quart. Choose fresh, tender stalks. Wash, trim off scales and tough ends and wash again. Cut in one-inch pieces.

To raw-pack in glass jars, pack the pieces as closely as possible without crushing, to within ½ inch of the top of the jar. Add ½ teaspoon salt to pint jars and 1 teaspoon to quarts. Cover with boiling water leaving ½-inch space at top. Adjust lids and process in a pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure (240°F.) Process pints for 25 minutes and quarts 30 minutes. As jars are removed from the canner, complete the seal, if the closures are not self-sealing.

### A DO-IT-YOURSELF DOG BED

by Bob Bartos  
Prominent Dog Authority

Many dogs are "cliff-dwellers"—that is, they live with families whose homes are apartments in cities. When this is the case, the owner must take special steps to be sure his pet is exercised each day.

For apartment-dwellers and other families whose dogs sleep indoors, either out of habit or



training, the right kind of dog bed is important. It should be comfortable for him, easy to remove for airing and washing, and free from dampness and drafts.

In this day of the "tubeless" tire for cars, many people have old inner tubes in the garage which have been outdated by the tire that holds its own air. An inner tube, providing it still holds air, is the basic ingredient in a simple, do-it-yourself dog bed for medium-size dogs.

There are two ways to make the bed using the tube. The first is to make an "envelope" of denim, lightweight canvas or other sturdy material, which is as wide and long as the tube measures when it is inflated. Place the deflated tube in the envelope, inflate it until the material is drawn taut, and baste up the open edge. The second method is to work with a simple square of colored denim or other material large enough to cover the diameter of the inflated tube plus enough to cover the "sides" and allow for lacing the corners together underneath. Once the material size is determined, it is only necessary to bind the edges to prevent raveling, install metal eyelets (available at any hardware store) in the corners, and lace the cover taut on the underside of the inflated inner tube.

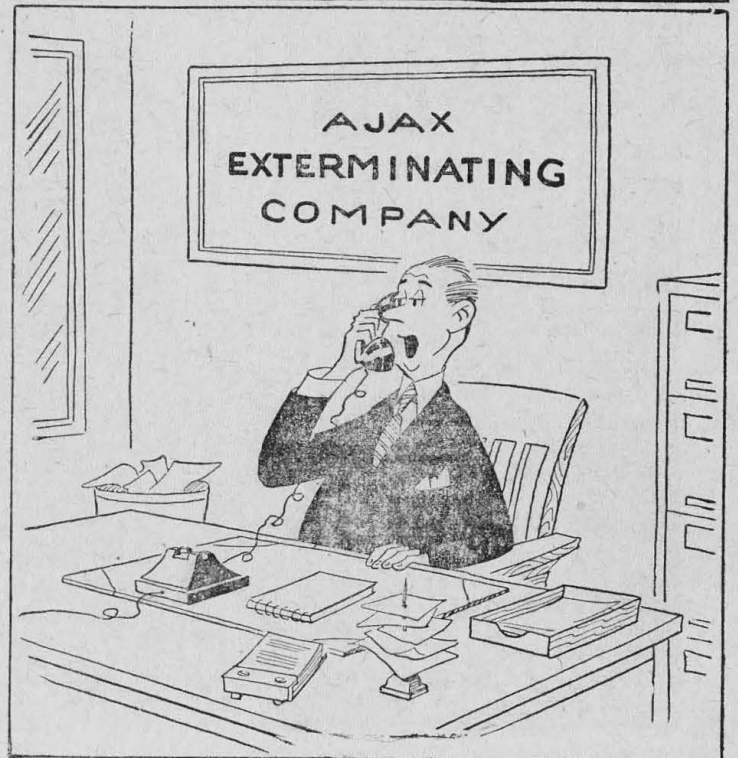
Each of the two methods provides for easy removal of the cover for washing, and the weight of the dog will form a snug, comfortable hollow in the center of the inflated tube.

**Feeding Tip:** Apartment dogs, like apartment dwellers, may not get sufficient exercise or sunshine. Rationed amounts of a quality dog food, like Friskies, will keep the dog's waistline trim and supply essential nutrients, including sunshine vitamin D.
