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

## Start Work on 2nd Cofferdam This Week



In upper photo, Floyd Becker and Don Kilpatrick, State Highway engineers, check the density of earth volume on the recently filled approach to the west side of the new M-21 bridge. The instrument they are using compacts a sample of the sand. This sample is then carefully weighed and it is possible to determine if the proper amount of settlement has been reached. To hasten the settling process, the earth was sprinkled with large hoses. Lower view shows a crane, mounted on four barges, pulling up the sheet piling from the first cofferdam on the east bank of the Grand. An extractor, activated by the large compressor, also on the barges, acts like a monstrous "hammer in reverse" and pulls the 30 foot pilings out of the river in a few seconds. Workmen are busy building the second cofferdam on the west bank and soon the pumps will have it dried for further pier construction.

## Safety Program On Radio

This coming Sunday, November 18, a new series of radio programs devoted to Michigan's highway traffic safety problems will be aired on 23 radio stations. Entitled "You Are The Jury", the series is produced by the Highway Traffic Safety Center and the radio stations at M. S. U.

The listener, along with a studio panel of three jurors, first hears a dramatic presentation of the facts in a traffic case taken from the files of the Center. Following this presentation of what happened, the listeners, along with the studio jury is asked to form an opinion regarding primary responsibility in the case reviewed.

Following the discussion by the jury, the Center provides an analysis of the case by its experts and the listener can determine how well he has matched his own thinking with that of the Traffic Safety Center.

Purpose of the series is to point up the how and why of traffic deaths and injuries and let everyone make his own personal decision on what can be done to improve his or her driving ability.

The new series has been endorsed by the Michigan State Police, the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police, Michigan Sheriff's Association and many other organized safety councils and groups.

## School Board Prepares For Bond Sale

Although the \$800,000 bond issue for the new Forest Hills high school has not yet been approved by the Michigan Finance Commission, the board of the newly organized district has not been idle.

According to Harold S. Chambers superintendent of the district, a brochure is being prepared by the board which will be released to approximately 500 prospective bond buyers as soon as the issue is approved. The brochure will contain details of the financial condition of the new district, tentative plans for the new high school building emphasizing its size, architectural features and other data which prospective buyers are interested in knowing.

Hope for construction to begin this year have fallen by the wayside due to delay in approval of the bond issue. Only reason for the delay is the fact that literally dozens of school bond issues were received in the Commission's offices before the Forest Hills issue was brought to a vote in mid-September.

According to Chambers final approval will undoubtedly be given in the next few weeks. By this time, last minute details for the informational brochure will have been completed, advertisements for bids will immediately be published in various papers and the next step towards the new high school will be taken.

It is impossible to predict the interest rate for the bond issue. Interest rates for this type of bond have ranged in the past year from slightly less than 4 per cent to more than 6 per cent. Only time and the mystical manipulations of persons who control the finances of our country will reveal what the citizens of the new district will pay, in taxes, for their new school.

The Citizens Advisory Committee is also actively working on a new curriculum for the high school and at their last meeting a report was given to the group by members who had attended a clinic at Ann Arbor on the planning of school buildings.

Dr. Robert Paine reported that if the parents of the Forest Hills school district so desired, a flouridation program for school children could be worked out. No decision was made on this matter, although more information on the subject will be discussed in the future.

Mrs. Paul Farnsworth was appointed publicity chairman of the group and an effort will be made to keep the public posted on the latest activities of the committee.

Persons from this area are invited by the committee to attend the Open House which will be held in the New East Grand Rapids High School on November 20. Ideas which are incorporated in this building could possibly be used in the new Forest Hills High School and those attending the Open House will have an idea of what their tax dollar will buy.

## T.B. Seals In The Mail

This week tuberculosis Christmas Seals have been mailed to 93,000 homes and business places in this county by the Kent County Tuberculosis Society, according to Otto P. Baehre, who is chairman for the campaign.

"Now that lives have been saved from tuberculosis we have the difficult problem of making the public understand that this is still our costliest disease. The living healed cases are still carrying live TB germs in their bodies and, unless they are supervised and educated, may again become active and dangerous, thus becoming an innocent source of infection."

"Last year your Christmas Seal dollars helped us give tuberculin tests to 42,718 people, and chest x-rays for 24,431 in our Mobile X-ray bus. Among apparently well people we found 22 active cases of TB; 37 suspicious of lung cancer; 253 referred to their doctors for heart conditions; 1,844 with suspicious and healed tuberculosis who will require supervision and 438 other miscellaneous findings. All of this is contributing to the general good health record of this community."



*Toy classification: Average wt.: 8 pounds. Shoulder height: 11 inches. Coat: Smooth, short haired, glossy. Color: Solid red or stag red, black with tan markings, solid brown or chocolate with rust or yellow markings.*

In such cases, a regular program of exercise under supervision should be established until the dog learns to conform and stay at home.

Many dogs become tramps because they don't get enough attention at home, so if you have a hobo dog make sure he feels that his presence is appreciated.

If your dog continues to roam, no matter what efforts you make, arrange to confine him at home.

This can be done by fencing the yard, by the use of a portable pen, or restraining him on a running yard wire. If he is a house dog he will be confined indoors except when he is taken out on the lead, turned loose under close supervision or exercised by getting him to retrieve a thrown ball.

**Feeding Tip:** If your dog dawdles over his food—nibbling, then going away and returning to nibble some more—feed him by himself. Limit his meal time to a half-hour, then take the food away. The dog will soon learn to concentrate on his meal until it is finished.
