## State Law Puzzles **Electricians**

### Christmas Seal is Truly a Powerful Bit of Paper

The tuberculosis Christmas Seal, with its double barred cross, has entered 93,000 homes and business places recently.

It carries a message of a crusade against tuberculosis which be-Those from Lowell who attended gan 52 years ago when TB was captain of the men of death.

The seals also raise the funds which support the extensive program of the Kent County Tuberculosis Society throughout this county-free tuberculin skin tests, Baehre, chairman of the campaign.



"When the society was started people thought tuberculosis was inherited and it 'ran in families' it was considered a family disgrace and usually fatal because cases were all found in an advanced stage; there were practically no suitable hospitals available for the isolation and treatment of these unfortunate victims, so they were tucked away in a room at home to await death. In the meantime the whole family became infected."

We know we are not born with the disease, but become infected with it by someone who has the disease, and often does not know he is a carrier.

### Kent Leads Fight

In Kent County a chest clinic was started by the TB Society in 1907 and is now operating in the City Hall under the county health department. Sunshine Hospital became possible through this crusade.




