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## Ready in May, 1958, is Plan Start Hickory Hills Golf Course On Cascade Road for Public Use

Have you driven past Galbraith Avenue on Cascade rd. where the Ace Plating is located, and wondered what all the activity was in the fields, and why it was going on? Here is the reason: William Lester Johnson and his sons, Fay and Bill, owners of the Ace Plating Co., with Ira Dustin, former greenskeeper of Cascade Hills Country Club, and in recent years a commercial landscaper, are building a public golf course, which they expect to have in readiness by Memorial Day of 1958, if all goes well.

The course is to be called "Hickory Hills", named for William Lester Johnson, who got the nickname "Old Hickory" because of his guiding others in Canadian hunting and fishing expeditions. In former years the boys and their dad have spent a good many summer week ends in Canada on fishing trips, but this summer they gave them up to work on the building of the golf course. This also is the time of year that the plating business is slow, so they can devote much of their time to this project. They already have nine greens in.

The course is laid out on the 96 acre family farm, which originally was the Robert Wride farm and has been in the family for sixty years. A few years ago the pasture area served as a landing field for small planes which Lester and the boys flew.

The course faces both Cascade Rd. and Galbraith Avenue. It is rolling ground, and includes 15 acres of woods. This winter the Johnson's will erect the club house on Galbraith Ave.

The tentative plans call for a 5,640 yard, par 72 course, with a limited amount of rough. Holes No. 11 and 12 are in this class. Fairways of both are flanked by woods, with the former green on top of a hill 340 yards from the tee. Hole No. 12, 272 yards, demands hill to hill shots.

There has been one casualty since work started. Bill broke his hand last week while driving the tractor.

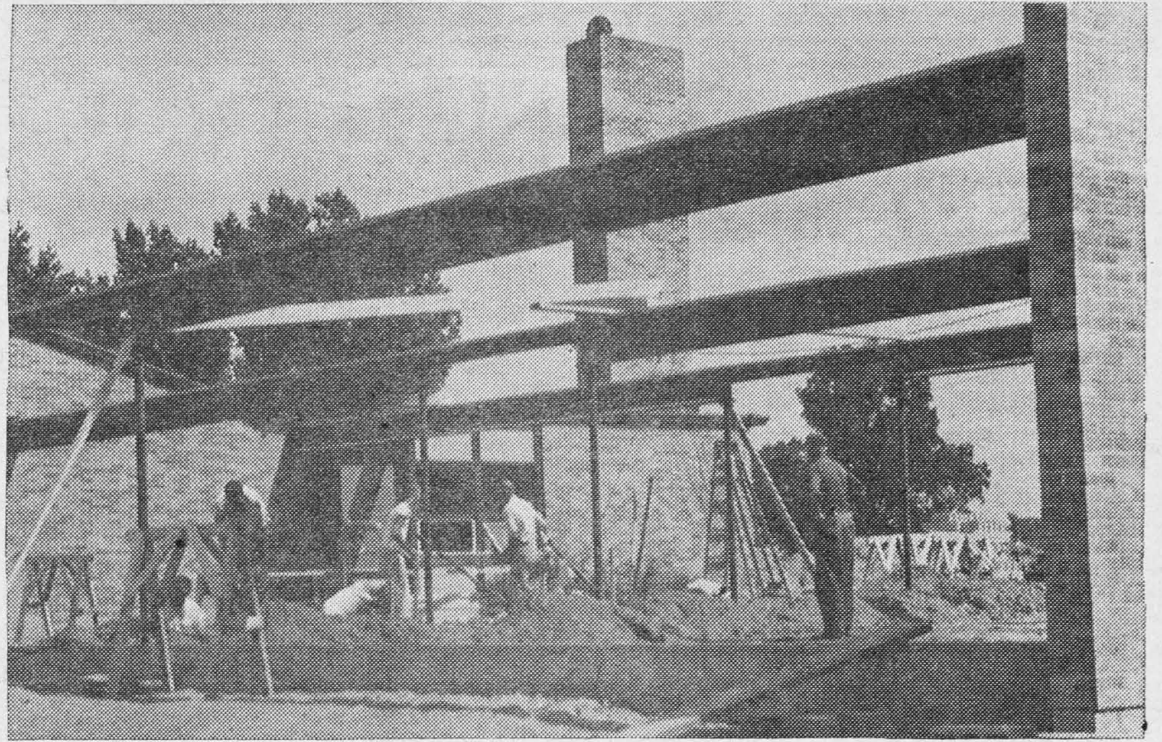

## CASCADE TAVERN ROBBED THREE MEN ARRESTED

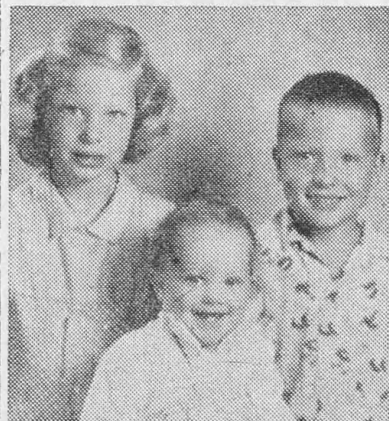

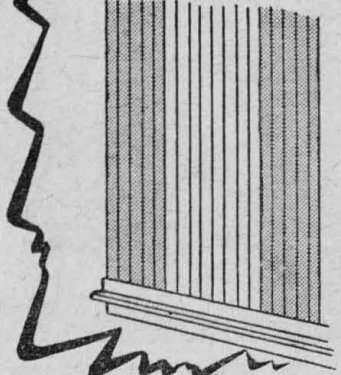

## Linoleum Needs Less Care Than Most Folks Think

Many homemakers may actually be giving too much care in cleaning linoleum and felt base floor coverings. It is a common fault. Eleanor Densmore, home demonstration agent says that contrary to popular belief, these floor coverings don't require frequent mopping with quantities of water and detergents.

Constant washing and scrubbing with abrasive powders is actually harmful to linoleum and will roughen and soften the surface making it easier for dirt and marks to cling.

The specialists say if linoleum surfaces are given a hard wax surface and are swept and dusted frequently, actual scrubbing is seldom needed. If something is spilled on the floor, of course, it should be wiped up immediately with a damp cloth to prevent tracking and to avoid accidental slipping.

When a waxed linoleum floor must be washed, use a minimum amount of water and a mild detergent. Wash a small area at a time, rinse well and wipe dry. Overlap each area just washed. This method will usually clean the floor without removing all the wax coat.

When you wax, use a high-gloss self-polishing wax that's hard enough to protect the linoleum from marks and water spotting. Several light coats of wax are better than one heavy coat. Allow it to dry between coats. Once

you've given your linoleum this treatment, one coat every few weeks is sufficient.

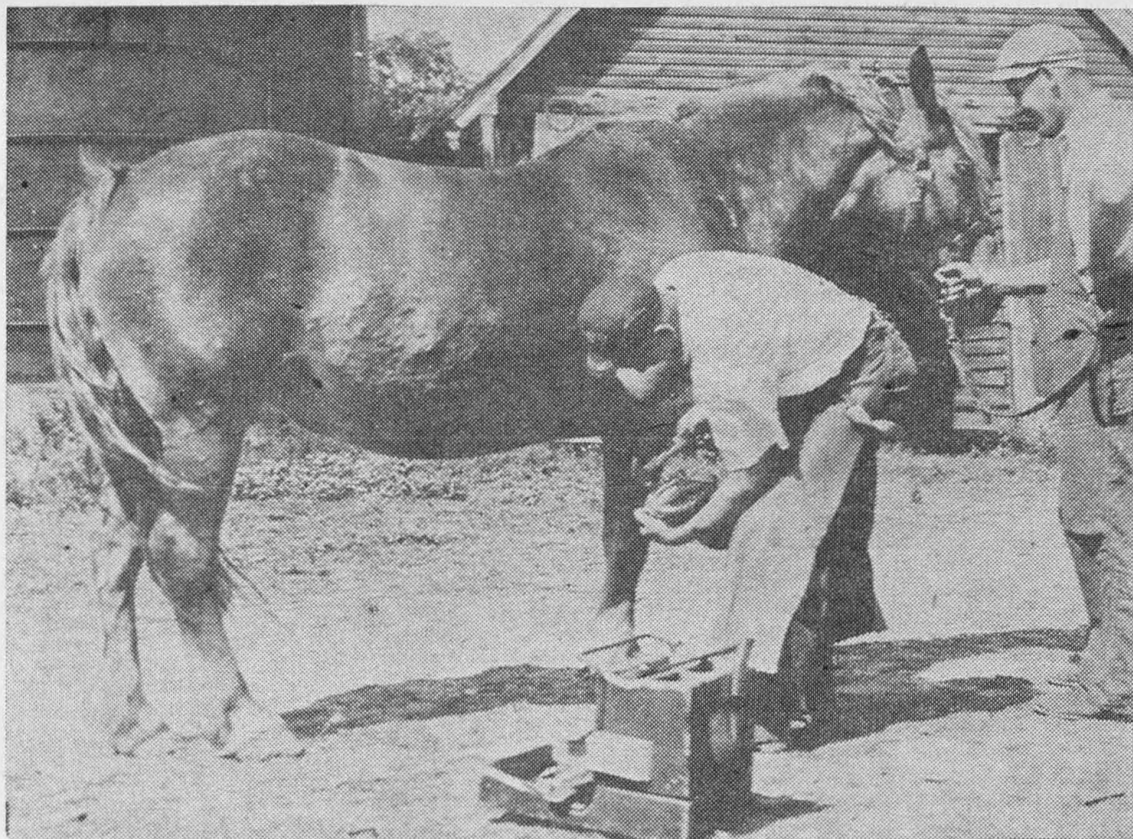

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**Two Kent Teen-Agers Abroad Write Interesting Letter from Germany**

Friends in Lowell have received another letter from two of the Kent county Teen-Agers Abroad, written this week by Ginny Pace and Dick Jackboice. This you will remember is the group that Linda Norwood is with. At the present time they are staying with their "families" in Miltenberg, Germany.

The letter, in part, follows: "Goten Tag,—At long last we

have arrived in Miltenberg, Germany. Our families were eager to show us around their town. In fact, nearly all of us saw one another with members of our families walking along the River Main, through the street, or at the medieval castle, the pride and joy of Miltenberg. On the following days with our German brothers and sisters we walked to nearby points of interest including a well-known

monastery, the remains of a Roman camp, and several small villages in the vicinity. We have already become well acquainted with Miltenberg and its buildings and streets which date back to the fifteen hundreds. The new houses, the type in which most of us live, provide a noticeable contrast with the main street on which the older traditional German buildings are located."

These students gave a description of what their families are like. Here are some of their comments.

"My family's name is Molitar. We live in a seven room house built in 1953. The house is much like one you might find in the United States with the exception that it has no living room. Instead, two of the bedrooms have chairs and tables and thus this arrangement suffices as a living room. The women may be interested in knowing about the kitchen. The only appliances my German mother has are a gas stove, an electric mixer, and an iron. Since she goes shopping for food every day, she claims she has no need for a refrigerator.

"My German father is an interesting man in many ways. At the present time, he is a high school teacher of German, shorthand, French and English. During the war years he was anti-Hitler and barely escaped arrest several times.

"My family is made up of six members. They are Mr. and Mrs. Shulz and their three sons. We all live in one of the old traditional German wood framed houses on Main Street.

"The thing that has impressed me most about the Shulzes is that they are always laughing and really having a good time doing simple everyday things.

"For entertaining we go to the movies (in German, of course), or go for a walk in the forest or to a nearby point of interest. Also, for entertainment, I have gone to several of the churches in Miltenberg and gotten permission to play their pipe organs.

"I really feel that I have been fortunate in being able to live with the Shulzes for my three weeks at Miltenberg because I am enjoying myself very much.

"The German people are eager to learn about Americans and their way of life. We sense that they have genuine liking for us and a sincere desire to better relations both on a large and small scale. Though, perhaps, they may disapprove of what seems to them to be flashy American ways, it is evident that they are trying to understand us.

"All in all we are gaining much

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# 4-H Fair Sets New Records Over Seven Thousand Entries

The Twenty-third Annual Kent County 4-H Fair was in full swing Tuesday, when more than 1,180 persons had entered with from 1 to 10 entries each. This tops last year's record of 962 by a large margin. Exhibits of clothing, preserves, table settings, photography, electrical appliances and almost everything you can think of, are on display in the main building. All together, between 7 and 8 thousand separate entries were made. (Last year's mark was 4,000.)

Among the animals at the fair are horses, cattle, sheep, swine and poultry, as usual, but there are more of them this year. About 320 4-H'ers are attending the fair

with their animals, and staying on the grounds in tents and trailers.

Several awards have been made available by contributions from business organizations who want to support 4-H work; these prizes are given on the basis of showing, club report, and achievement. Four senior winners are chosen in the major classes of livestock to receive an all-expense paid trip to the Chicago International Livestock Show in November. These and the many other prize winners will be announced next week.

The midway was brought to the fair by Wade shows; the same group that was here last year. There have been some additions including a carousel, octopus, tank,

whirloplane, and a dip-si-doodle; also two new side shows: The Devil's Child, and DeVaul's animated circus. This is a miniature Barnum and Bailey outfit with over 25,000 moving parts, carved by hand in 15 years. In it, there are all the things you see in a circus; even a replica of Emmett Kelley and Clyde Beatty!

The judging of horses and the tractor operating contest were held on opening day; the rest of the judging except sheep and dairy cattle was Wednesday and followed by a Horse Show in the evening.

Thursday's program includes booth interviews, softball eliminations, and a talent show at night.

The last day, Friday, entertainment will be the Archery and a 4-H Demonstration Contest, with the Livestock Parade at 8:00. This will also be Children's Day and some lucky girl or boy will receive a new bicycle in the drawing.

The fair comes to a climax in the evening with the crowning of the King and Queen to be immediately followed by the big Square Dance.

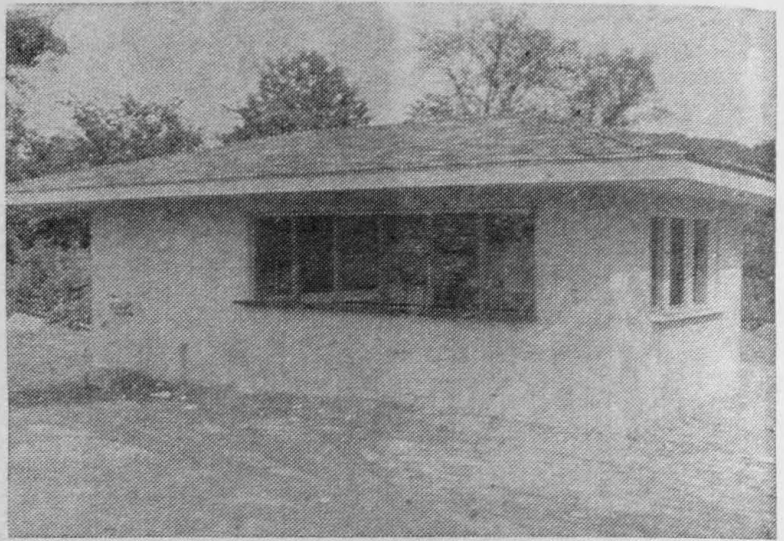
