Teen-Agers Abroad Visit Heidelberg

The fourth E.O.T.L. letter was received this week from the Teen-Agers Abroad group that Linda Norwood is with in Europe. It was written by Kaye Betteridge and Rob Modica. Here is what they say:

"Wie Gehts—We have been assigned to relate the experiences of our second week in Miltenberg. At 8:00 Tuesday night our group and most of our German brothers and sisters met in the local gymnasium for a party planned by one of the teen-agers, the purpose being for everyone to get better acquainted. As the evening drew to a close, we all felt that this had been accomplished.

"The next day we all went our separate ways, but on Thursday morning we met in town where a chartered bus took us to Heidelberg, one of Germany's oldest cities. While in Heidelberg, most of us visited the famous university, but were unable to enter because classes were still being held. An other point of interest was the castle which is the only ruin in Heidelberg. The city was fortunate in being one of the few cities to escape bombing during the war. Upon leaving, we took a side trip to a small town containing a palace and beautiful gardens. We arrived in Miltenberg at 8:00 p. m. after a full day of sight-seeing.

"Now, as in the last letter, each of us will tell a little about our families:

"My family consists of five members, Mr. and Mrs. Jung, Christle, Peter, Hans and Bellnian, the dog. Christle and I have made trips to Wurzburg and Frankfurt plus many places around Miltenberg. In Wurzburg I saw the Residence and a castle used to house refugees from Hungary. In Frankfurt, we went through the house where Goethe was born and made his home for many years.

"I also attended a German wedding that took about one hour, although most of them don't require so long to tie the proverbial knot.

"As in other families, I get more than enough of excellent food. I keep wanting to try German dishes, but they keep fixing them like American dishes so I will have something like home."

"My family has taken numerable walks to the nearby surroundings including the not-so-nearby (10 km) monastery.

"As most of the other Teen-Agers, I find my homestay enjoyable and the food delicious. It -od no ealv humans enb sues tatoes as this is usually the most of our meal. I find Miltenberg very quaint and picturesque. I have visited the castle, the city wall and many of the old places in town. Trying to become a German I am one of the many Teen-Agers who have bought lederhosen. They all seem to agree that they have made life-long friends and wishing they could stay in Miltenberg for the rest of the summer.

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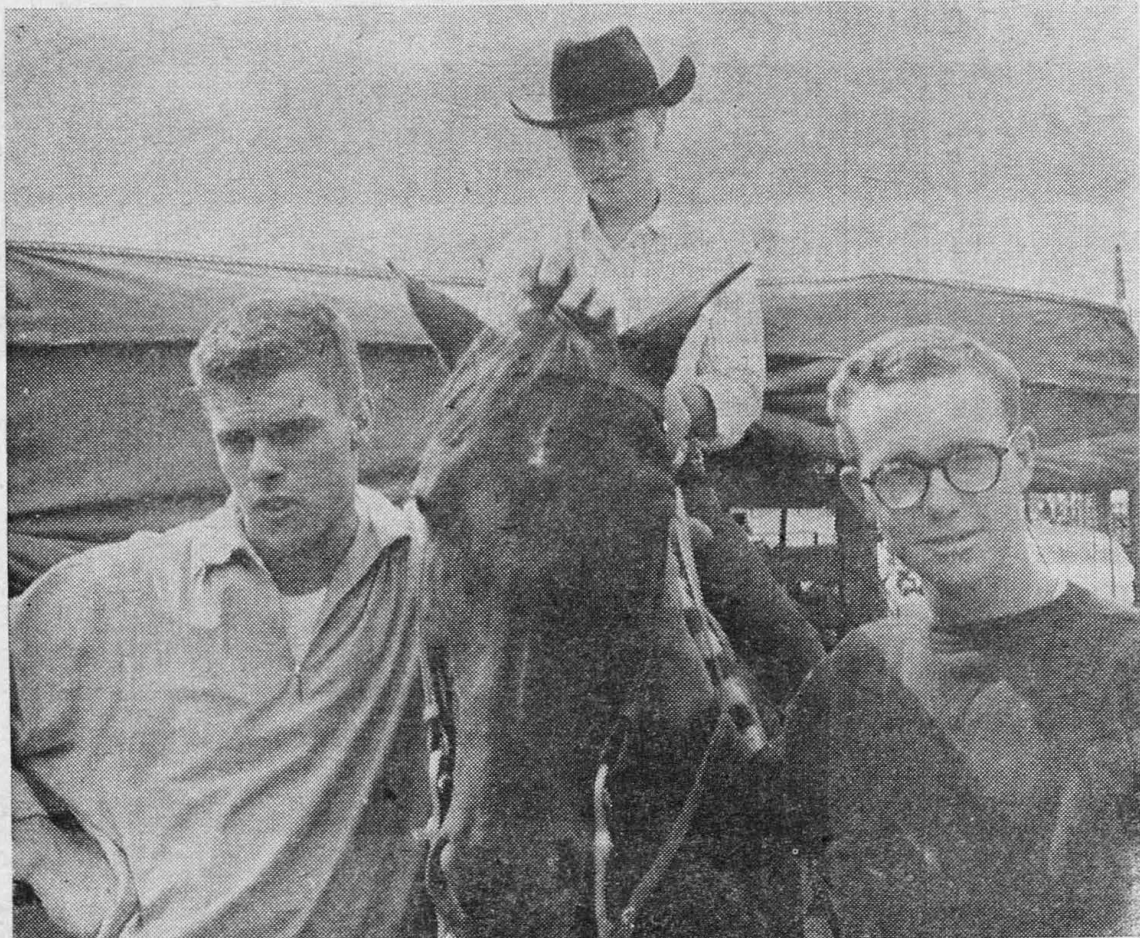
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Jens Yde, Danish Exchange Student Arrived Wednesday

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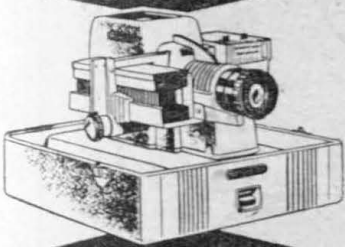
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4-H Fair Awards Go To Many From This Vicinity

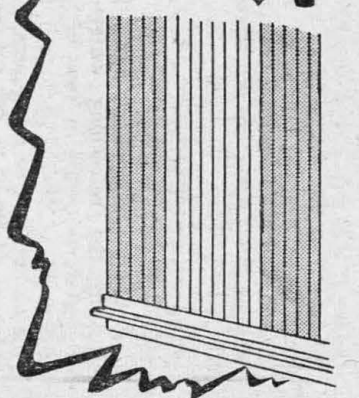
