### Car Wash, Saturday

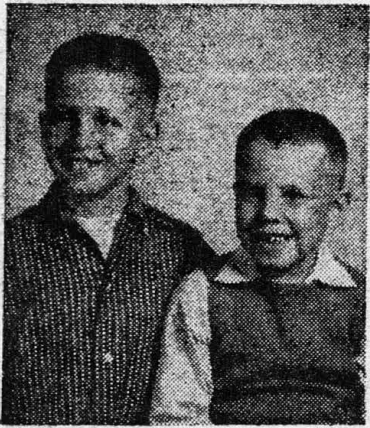

## Will Demonstrate Breathalyzer Test In Cascade Oct. 8

At the meeting of the Cascade Businessmen's Association on Tuesday, October 8, in the Township Fire Station, Inspector William Dangel of the Grand Rapids Police Department and a resident of Whitneyville Road will demonstrate the Breathalyzer test for drinking drivers. There will be a live demonstration of the unit and a discussion of its merits. Inspector Dangel says that this unit analyzes the breath of a suspected drunk driver and will accurately tell the percentage of alcohol in the body.

This idea was developed in 1954 for a laboratory testing device to test drinking drivers. Grand Rapids Police purchased one of the first commercial units and now check suspects for all police in this area. The test is not now admissible as evidence in Michigan courts but is in 27 other states and police are working to get the legislature to permit these tests to be brought into court as evidence in Michigan.

## Tax Increase Turned Down

Voters of this area, along with most sections of Kent County, turned down the proposal to increase taxes to finance capital improvements, in the special election Tuesday.

Lowell tax paying residents voted 129 to 74 against the proposal: Ada 119 to 67; Bowne 62 to 19; Cascade 152 to 84; Grattan 62 to 15. Only in Vergennes township in this section did voters approve the tax; tax payers there voted 30 to 26 in favor of the plans.

The total vote in all of Kent county where only 17,473 persons turned out to vote was yes, 7,916; no, 9,557.

## Tax Payers Fear Long Term

In our discussion with residents of this area we were told that most "no" votes were based on the fact that the proposal called for such a long term, 10 years. The other reason for the failure is probably based on the fact that this was such a large group of projects, a specific vote for one or two improvements on a 3-year basis would probably have passed.

They do it by slyly casting mud at the Supreme Court, by throwing legal roadblocks in the way of minority groups, by asking for "time." My advice to them is, if you don't like democracy, go join the Russians. Let us hope Little Rock will provide an object lesson to those who have chipped away—unwittingly or deliberately—at efforts to work out racial problems through patience and cooperation. After all, there has to be cooperation on both sides or we'll never reach a solution.

Mayflower II has been cut loose from British registry but not yet taken over by Plimoth Plantation in Massachusetts, where a permanent berth for the replica of the Pilgrim vessel is being built. Now is the time for all those in the Middle West who want the Mayflower to sail up the St. Lawrence Seaway to speak up. I offer the facilities of my Washington office for a meeting of Michigan and Middle Western representatives with officials of the Plimoth Plantation.

A Seaway voyage, of course, won't be practical until next spring, but planning should start right now. Plimoth Plantation expects to take ownership on Thanksgiving Day but needs funds to complete its permanent shrine for the Mayflower. The new owners are a non-profit group. However, they would expect the Seaway voyage to produce some financial return to defray costs of the ship's berth.

Therefore, these questions must be answered: Will there be an admission charge to view Mayflower? Who will man her? What itinerary? Are the cities who want the vessel willing to put up a moderate financial guarantee for her appearance?

Since I proposed the voyage last summer, letters of enthusiasm have poured in from ports, civic groups, individuals and tourist associations. Even the U. S. Department of State favors the trip. I am confident a Mayflower II voyage into the Middle West would build international good will and dramatize the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway and Mackinac Bridge.

Hedgehopping through Michigan to fill a heavy schedule of speaking dates has stretched, but not slashed, my pipelines to Washington. I am continuing to maintain close contact with all Defense Department procurement agencies in a steady effort to bring more contracts into the state. We need those jobs.

## County Leaders Plan to Travel Around World

Around the world—but not in 80 days—is the goal of Mrs. Leona MacLeod, state home demonstration leader, and Eleanor Densmore, Kent County home demonstration agent.

Sailing October 2 from San Francisco, the two Extension Service women will start their world cruise by going to Hawaii and then to Japan. From there they will fly to Okinawa where they will visit Michigan State University's adopted school, the University of The Ryukyus, where M. S. U.'s College of Home Economics has sent a home economics consultant for the past several years. Miss Densmore was there two years, from 1951-53.

To be gone about five months, the two will then go to Hong Kong, Singapore, Bangkok, and into India and Ceylon. They will also visit Cairo, Egypt, and on to Italy where they will leave their tour group and explore Italy, France, Spain and England by themselves.

During their trip Mrs. MacLeod and Miss Densmore will visit schools of home economics in Hawaii, Japan and India as well as Okinawa.

Mrs. MacLeod has been assistant director of the Michigan Co-operative Extension Service in charge of home economics since 1950. She supervises the home demonstration program in Michigan's 83 counties. A 1923 graduate of M. S. U., she joined the extension staff in 1934 as a home demonstration agent and in 1938 became a clothing specialist.

Home agent in Kent county since 1935, Miss Densmore graduated from M. S. U. in 1928 and received her M. S. degree from Columbia University in 1935. She has also studied at the University of Oslo in Norway. Her two years in Okinawa were spent pioneering the newly established home economics department and promoting scholarships for girls in Okinawa where education for women is traditionally unimportant.

In Kent County Miss Densmore has broadened the scope of the Extension and 4-H programs and promoted interest in community projects such as the 4-H Club camp, libraries, schools and charity funds. Miss Densmore will be back in the county Extension Office on February 1, 1958.

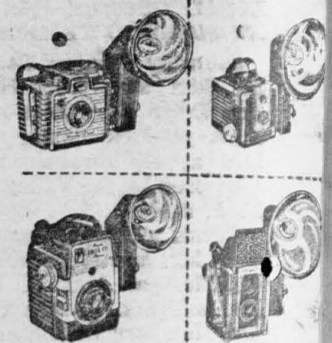
