CHURCH EXTENDS CALL

At a Consistory meeting Monday evening, October 21st, at the Cascade Christian Reformed Church, a call was extended to Rev. George VanderHill of Dearborn, Michigan.

Work on the new Forest Hills High School is being pushed ahead with the staking out of the buildings, drainage lines, roads completed and the work of getting the ground ready, moving as rapidly as the weather allows.

Bulldozers have roughed out the road being planned, well drilling crews have the water supply well under way, surveyors from the architect firm have completed the staking of the buildings.

In getting ready for the new school that will mushroom into a giant in just a few years, surface water drains must be laid, some as large as 21 inch tile to carry off rain and melting snow. A septic tank system big enough to handle a small city must be built and connected to the various buildings. A special disposal system must be constructed to handle the waste from the science laboratory.

Must Plan for Future

Before the sixteen rooms and the gymnasium are completed and occupied next year, it will be necessary to be laying plans for the next stage of construction. Supt. Chambers revealed that if no new families move into the area in the next few years the high school population will be 800 in 1961. Of course, in the next three years many new families will move in so the high school population may be over 1,000, this will require double the presently planned high school. The board and the citizens advisory committee are already looking ahead and planning for the needs of the future.

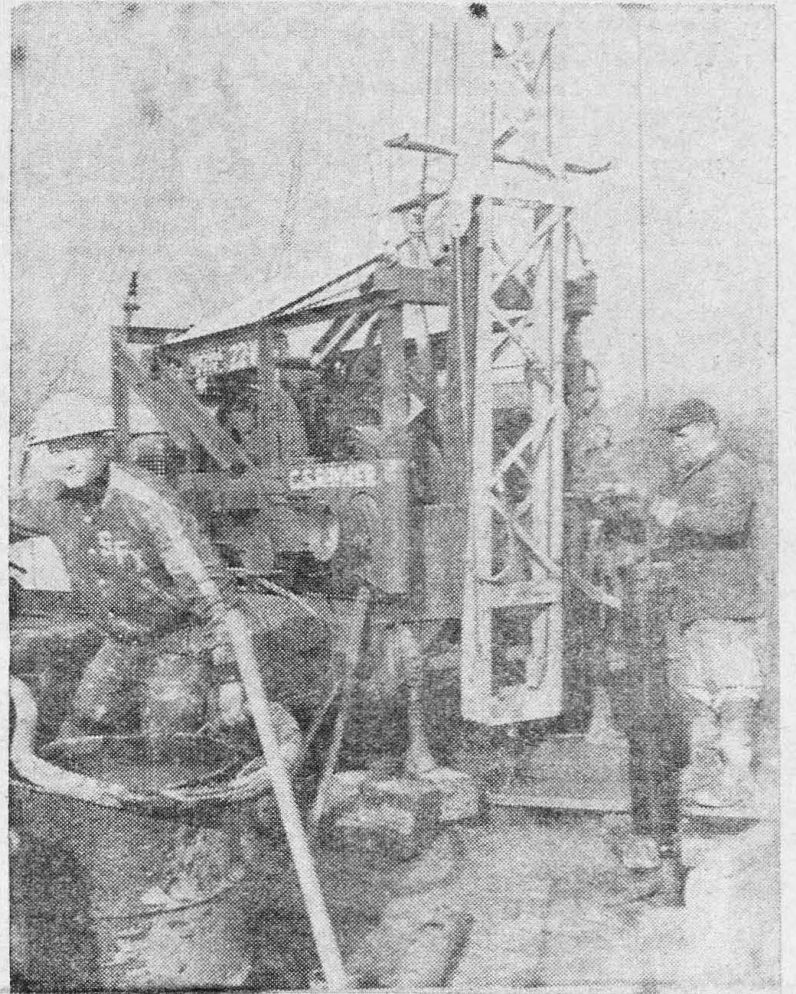

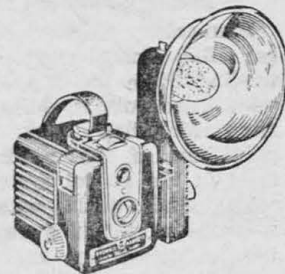

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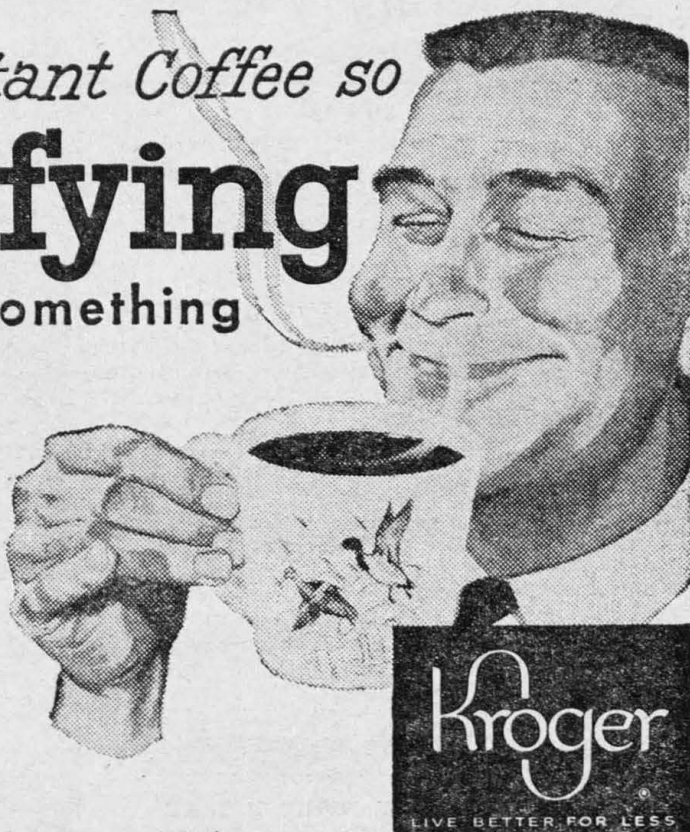

Dr. Campbell lived in Panama for eight years, where he was Educational Advisor to the President of the Inter-American University. So he knows this area well. He produced this film in 1957, and we will be among the first to see it. It is a beautiful coverage of the countries' geographical attractions, interesting native tribes, important products and industries. Of course the cities and the Canal are thoroughly covered, and through it all is the story of the modern engineering wonder—the Pan American Highway. When it is completed it will link North and South America and make it possible to drive from Alaska to Cape Horn! He will give a good account of the natives, who have had little contact with civilization. He journeyed on river boat and horse-back to photograph the Guayami, San Blas and Chukunaques tribes and the Cimarrones—negro slaves who fled from their masters three centuries ago. And there will be scenes of cattle raising, industry, army life, and much more. As described by Dr. Campbell, in person, this film will be an outstanding one.

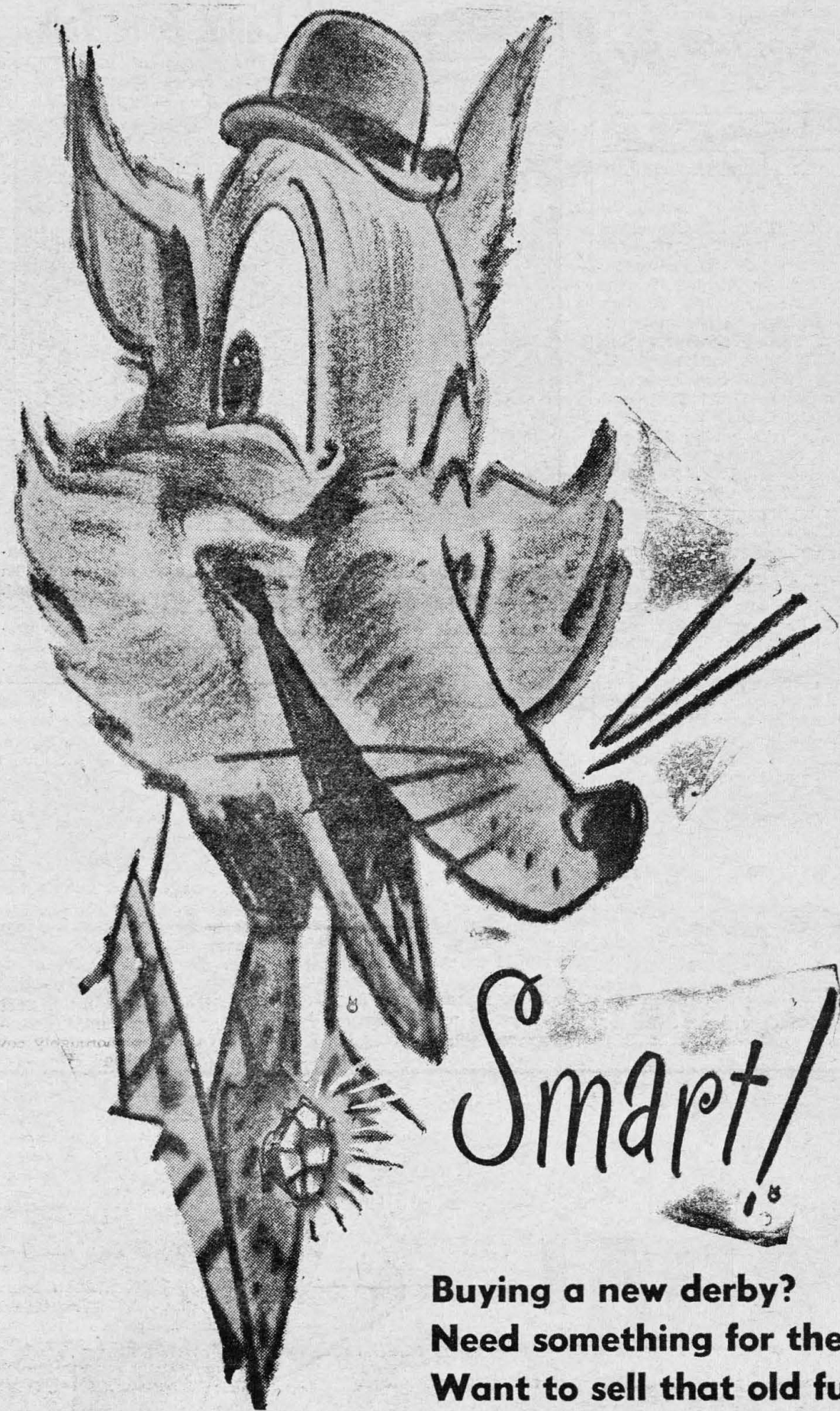
