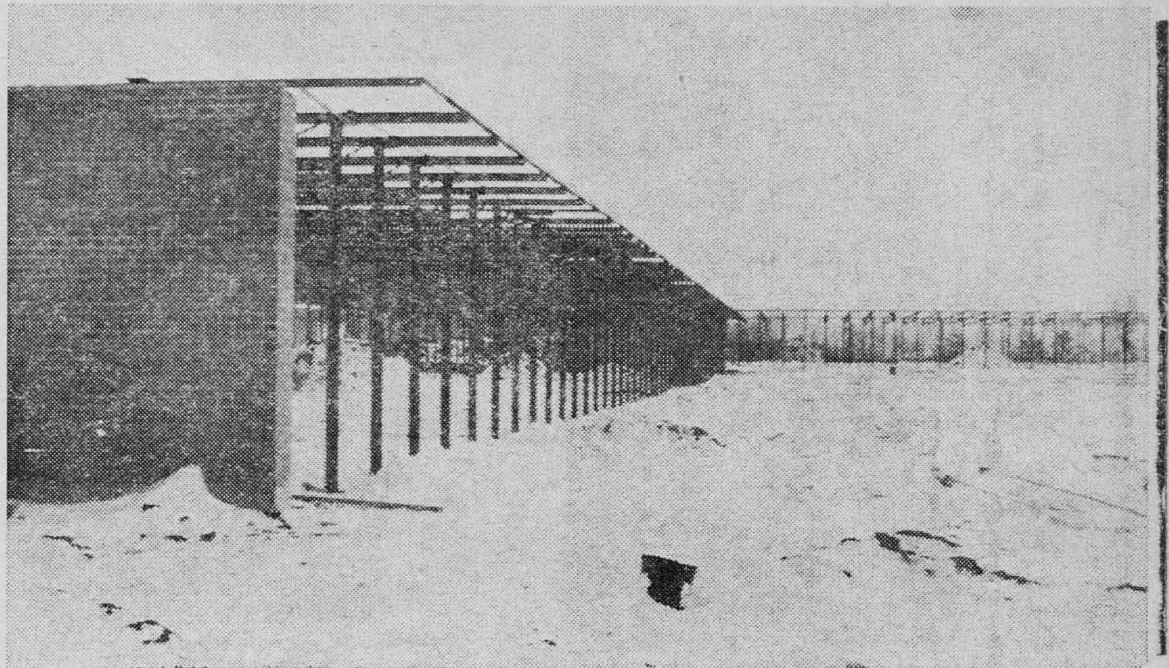
FINAL CROP REPORT

Forest Hills High School Ahead of Schedule



Work on the new Forest Hills High School on Hall Street is making good progress, Harold Chambers, Superintendent of Schools, reports and some stages are ahead of schedule. Shown here is the science classroom wing consisting of 6 classrooms. At the rear of the picture is another identical classroom wing; a third is under construction at the left. Roofing crews are expected in a few weeks to put a special roofing material on the steel framework which is acoustical on the inside and the top is covered with tar and gravel. The steel beams will be exposed in the ceilings but will be decorated with attractive colors. The walls of the buildings are mostly glass and will come fabricated in sections for quick erection. In addition to the classroom buildings, a pump house and electrical terminal building and the building to house the heating plant and act as temporary shop have been erected except for the roof. Foundation work for the gym has been finished and the steel will be put up in a few days. When this work is completed, all buildings can be seen taking shape.

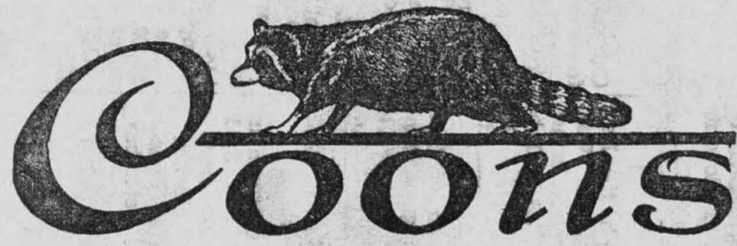

WHEREAS, said Consumers Power Company has heretofore filed its written acceptance of said franchise, and has requested that the question of confirming the grant thereof be submitted to the qualified electors of the Township, at a special election to be held for that purpose, and has also paid to the Township Board the estimated expense of holding such special election; and,

WHEREAS, there has been heretofore filed with said Board, a petition signed by at least twelve electors, requesting that a special township meeting and election be called for such purpose;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to resolutions adopted by said Board, notice is hereby given that a special meeting and election will be held in said Township at Precinct No. 1: Cascade Township Hall, Precinct No. 2: Fire station on Wednesday, the 19th day of February, 1958, for the purpose of voting on the confirmation of the action of said Township Board in granting such franchise.

The polls of said election will be opened at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and will be held open until 8 o'clock p. m., Eastern Standard Time. The Township Clerk will be in his office from 9-5, six days a week, except Sunday, 1958, said date being the thirtieth day, as determined by statute, preceding the date of said election, for the purpose of reviewing the registration, and registering such of the qualified electors of the Township as shall appear and apply therefor, which registration may be made on said date between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 8 o'clock p. m., Eastern Standard Time.

Said franchise as granted by said Board is on file with the undersigned Township Clerk for the purpose of inspection by the qualified electors.

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Senator Potter reports



... the latest news from Washington of special interest to Michigan ...

Tooling up for the mighty Jupiter intermediate range ballistic missile is getting into high gear at Chrysler Warren plant just outside Detroit. Regular pay checks await 500 men and women now being hired and everything points to doubling of the present work force by the end of the year. That would bring it close to 10,000 workers at Warren. Unquestionably the most cheerful development in a month of Sundays, the new jobs come as a result of the recently-announced Army award of a \$52,000,000 missile contract to Michigan.

Of course, this merely dents Michigan's jobless list, but it offers enormous encouragement to those of us who needle the Pentagon ceaselessly to place defense contracts where they are needed most—in Michigan's labor-surplus centers. Tooling-up is sure to be followed by hefty production orders. I'm confident that the effects of this first huge Jupiter contract will span out through southern Michigan to smaller businesses

who will garner a share of the subcontracts.

The President has asked Congress for \$1.2 billion in emergency defense funds and \$40 billion in the new budget, much of it for stepping up missile work. What has been labeled as "Potter's Push on the Pentagon" will be continued in an effort to get this money into Michigan in the form of defense contracts and new jobs.

Pay TV hearings open tomorrow and I predict a verbal slugfest. Can Mr. and Mrs. America lounge in front of the family television set to be informed and entertained free of charge? Or must they drop a coin in the slot to receive certain programs?

I oppose any form of pay TV. A man buys a television set expecting that his investment ends right there, with the exception, perhaps, of a few service charges. Pay TV is like buying a refrigerator and having to drop money in the slot before you can open the door and get something to eat.

I expect to appear before the House Commerce Committee to point out my reasons for opposing these schemes. Today we have 40 million television households in the nation and the investment of American citizens in our free system of television adds up to \$17 billion. That money has enabled networks and local stations to build their news and public events coverage to the point where the American people are among the best-informed in the world. It has all been free of charge, built by free enterprise. Let's keep it that way.

Last Week's Caravan of Michigan visitors brought U. S. Attorney Wendell Miles of Grand Rapids and Mr. Henry Wolfenden, distinguished Detroit lawyer, to my office. Both gentlemen asked me what I consider the most urgent tasks facing Congress in the coming session. First and foremost, I replied, comes national security. I believe any strengthening of our defenses should give special emphasis to missiles. Second, but equally important, we must increase opportunities for scientific training. Third, Amer-

Police Report 221 Less Traffic Deaths

Provisional figures compiled by the State Police show that Michigan completed the year 1957 with 221 fewer traffic deaths than in 1956.

This was well beyond the goal to save 174 lives, or 10 per cent under the total of 1,747 who were killed the preceding year.

While the provisional figure is subject to adjustment downward with the receipt of delayed reports, the final saving is expected to be in excess of 200. Deaths in 1957 now total 1,526.

Every month but one last year showed a reduction. The exception was June, with seven more than in the same month in 1956.

December, one of the most deadly months of the year, had a provisional saving of 18 lives, or 149 deaths in 1957 as compared with 158 in 1956.

Science Center Plans Programs At Michigan State

The Science and Mathematics Teaching Center, organized at Michigan State University in the pre-Sputnik days of April 1957, is planning a series of programs aimed at helping close the gap in science education in Michigan.

A two-week conference for selected high school sophomores and juniors is being planned for next summer. It will give them a chance to observe scientists and mathematicians at work.

A summer institute for community-junior college science and mathematics teachers also is scheduled for the summer months.

A series of school-and-industry science fairs is being planned in several Michigan counties.

These events, together with the continued backing and promotion of the Junior Engineering Technical Society (JETS), organized at M. S. U. in 1950, represents a concentrated effort to stimulate interest and participation in science scholarship throughout Michigan schools.

"We got off the ground before Sputnik and are not a part of any 'crash program' idea," stressed Dr. Frederic B. Dutton, M. S. U. chemistry professor who heads the science center.

"The science center is serving as a communications link between resources at Michigan State University and teachers of science and mathematics in the schools," he explained.

Dr. Dutton hopes to obtain from industry scholarship funds for high school students who could not otherwise take part in the summer program. These funds would be in addition to the \$47,000 grant from the National Science Foundation which is to finance the national institute for community-junior college science and math teachers timed to coincide with the 1958 M. S. U. six-week summer session.
