Store Children's Toys Near Play Area

Where do you want storage for children's toys? The kitchen, bath, living room and child's sleeping area are probably the main places says Coral Morris, extension specialist in home management at Michigan State University. The child needs storage where he plays. This makes it easy for him to "be good" and put his things away. It also keeps things handy for him to use and makes it easier for you to keep the house neat. Shelves are probably the best storage as the child can learn to arrange things neatly. He can take pride in keeping toys and books in order. A box can serve as a place to put things, but it doesn't encourage neatness. When his toys are thrown in a box he's less likely to learn to take good care of them. If space is limited you may need to use a sack, hung from the wall, but with the top open so he can reach in easily. Simi-

lar to the box, it doesn't encourage being careful of the toys. A drawer in the bottom of the cupboard or dresser can be used too. Be sure it's low enough for the child to reach easily. Children like to be near you so you'll want some storage in the kitchen. Let him have a bottom drawer or a low shelf away from the stove and from your busy area. In the bathroom you'll only need a small amount of storage for tub toys. A closed shelf or drawer will help keep play things in the living room neat. The largest amount of storage is usually needed in the child's bedroom. Open shelves of varying heights work well. Things are out where he can admire them. The toys are easy to get for playing and shelves are handy for putting them away. Snake bites and bee stings helped account for 52 deaths in a recent year, the National Safety Council says.

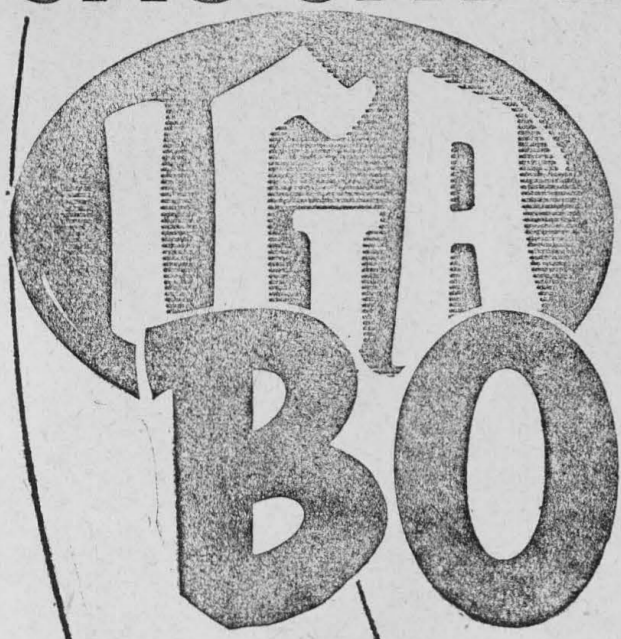

Meeting in a plush Miami Beach Hotel, a handful of labor bosses have served notice that they again plan to decide in advance who their members will vote for. They expect to dip into the treasury of hard-earned dues money to support those candidates in the coming political campaigns. The Corrupt Practices Act expressly forbids corporations or unions to make political contributions and these bosses know it. I have always said that any union boss who says he can deliver the labor vote is insulting his members. I have great faith in the American working man and in his ability to make his own intelligent decisions. He is no rubber stamp. Past elections prove the workers do not vote like sheep no matter what some of their leaders may think. The American working man and his wife vote independently and according to their convictions and not as instructed by a team of two bit Napoleons.

A hot war is raging over missile contracts for Michigan as the Nation prepares to spend billions for the new weapons. Major battle ground: Washington, D. C.

Over 300,000 Michigan men and women desperately need the jobs missiles can help to provide and the American taxpayer needs the savings possible when missile work is entrusted to experts. Therefore, I am leaving no stone unturned to see that Michigan gets her fair share of the business. A skilled labor force and industrial genius more than qualify our State to meet the challenge of the intricate new weapons.

Last week the missile contract war flashed fire on two fronts—Detroit and Washington—when a

Member of Congress charged that the Army had snubbed our State. After placing the huge \$52 million Jupiter contract with Chrysler in Detroit, it was reported Major General John Medaris, Army Missile Chief, issued a written order banning all subcontracts in the Detroit area, directing them instead to an Alabama firm.

Within hours the Detroit Ordinance District had denied the charge. The Chief Industrial Officer at Redstone Arsenal in Alabama assured me over long distance that of 350 Jupiter subcontractors, 215 are in Michigan. It was also indicated that 738 of the 1,675 Redstone subcontractors are Michigan firms. Secretary of the Army Brucker assures me he is personally conducting a full investigation of the matter.

Until the matter is settled, we would do well to remember one thing: Our State most certainly deserves the positive and wholehearted support of the entire Michigan Congressional Delegation in our continuing and vigorous efforts to obtain a full and fair share of this defense work for Michigan.

In addition to various other positive steps which I have taken in behalf of our State, I am presently working with a group of expert Detroit engineers on a plan which we have every reason to believe will channel more defense contracts into Michigan.

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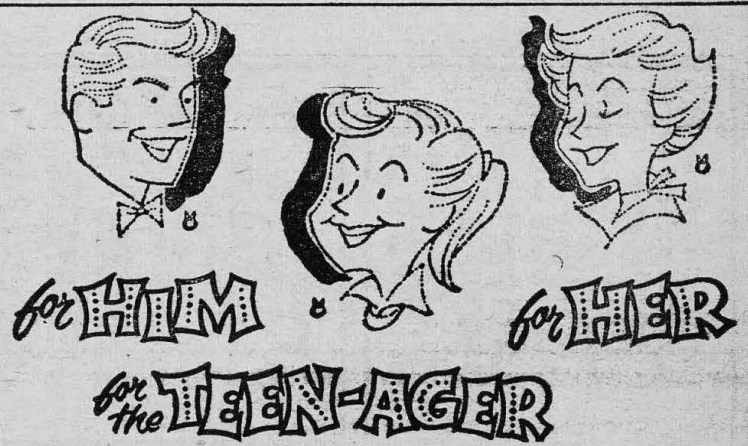

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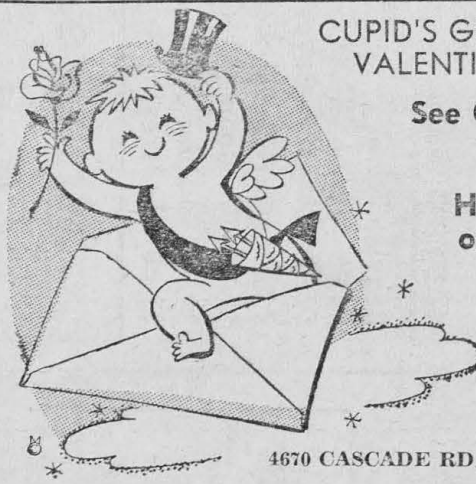
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
