

Egypt is news! The famous photographer Alfred Wolff captured it on beautiful color film, and will narrate it in a fascinating manner. This intrepid adventurer recently TV BRIEFS returned from Egypt with pictures of places forbidden to the camera for years. He took the first photos of the Solar Boat of Cheops. 
