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Over 110 Sign Up For Little League

On Saturday, March 22, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 1 p. m. more than 110 boys between the ages of 9 and 12 signed up for the Little League baseball season, with more boys yet to register.

Tentative plans now call for the regular season to start around May 19th and to finish around August 1. This is being done so that the teams can compete in tournament play this year. Practice will start two or three weeks prior to regular

season games.

We would like to make a correction of the age limit as reported in last week's paper. The age bracket for boys in the Little League is for boys 9 through 12. If a boy reaches his 13th birthday before August 1, 1958, he is unable to compete this year. If his 13th birthday comes after August 1, 1958, he can stay in the League for the entire season. Those boys who did not sign up as a result of this notice can still sign up by calling Tom Ray at GL 4-8348.

In talking to people throughout the area, we find that there is some misunderstanding about how the Little League operates. The Board of Directors of the Little League is made up of four elected officers, the managers of the teams, coaches, umpires and the player agents.

Officers and Manager

This year the officers are Earl Bentley, president; Tommy Ray, vice-president; Gerald Brian, secretary; and Irvin Werner, treasurer.

The managers for this year, so far, are Carl MacDanold, Harold Parrish, Norval Clifford and Ron Hennie. These men will be assisted by other men who have not as yet been named. Some of the umpires for the League are Bob Paine, Ken Klynstra, Bob VanStrien and Richard Seppan.

Sponsors

Operating funds are raised by selling sponsorship for the teams. These sponsors for this year are the Cascade IGA store, Christian Men's Fellowship of the Cascade Christian Church, Cascade Businessmen's Association and the Thornapple Lions Club. These sponsors make a donation to the League fund. All rules and regulations are determined and made by the Board of Directors with the sponsors having no authority to vote on change in same.

Five Teams

At the present time, plans have been made to field five teams for this year, but from the registration slips it looks like they might have to form more. The ball games are played at the Thornapple Valley Little League park, with future diamonds being studied. The league is officially called the Thornapple Valley Little League, and operates with a franchise from the National Little League office. This franchised area includes the Forest Hill School area and all of Ada and Cascade Townships. Any boy in the age bracket living within these boundaries is eligible to compete during the season.

The Little League also operates a minor league or a farm league. This is done in order to let all the boys play ball that possibly can.

Tentative plans call for permitting eight-year-olds to participate in the farm league for the forthcoming season.

Notices will be out in the near future concerning practice sessions and any other details that you might need to know.

Let's Help Stop These Grass Fires

Several grass fires in this area have been caused because of carelessness with burning trash. Local police say that if these fires are not watched until the flames are put out it is a violation of the law.

If you burn trash, these precautions are suggested:

1. Never light an outdoor fire on a windy day.
2. Set out, and attach, your garden hose. Keep it in readiness until the fire is completely out.
3. Burn trash in a wire mesh basket or a metal container with a cover slightly ajar to prevent embers from scattering. Set it well away from building, fence, tall grass.
4. Keep children away.
5. Stay with your fire until it is out and the ashes are cool enough to touch.

Using a blow-torch to remove paint is a dangerous practice, and there is danger, too, in the use indoors and handling of paint removers, containing volatile, flammable liquids or solvents.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters suggests removing old paint by safer methods, such as scraping, sanding, wire brushing, or using noncombustible paint remover of a type listed by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc.

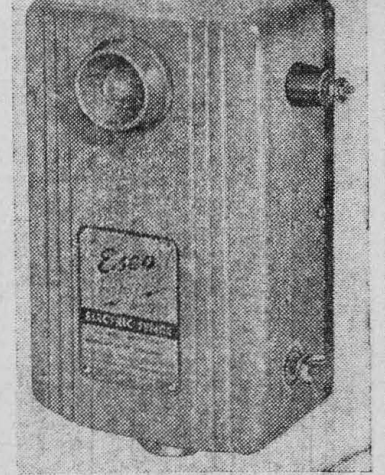

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TB Society Reports Positive Reactions

"Nineteen people in Ada and 18 in Cascade who recently had chest x-rays in the Christmas Seal X-ray bus of the Kent County Tuberculosis Society had positive

reactions. This was shown by a spot which became raised and red and indicates the presence of living TB germs in the body," according to Blanche H. deKoning, Executive Secretary of the tuberculosis society.

"All of these people have received a personal report and literature about the prevention of TB. When we know that tuberculosis does not respect color, race or age, we realize that it is important to find these infected people. Education about good, nourishing food, plenty of rest and the need for annual chest x-rays are the best vaccination we have against this tricky, infectious and costly disease."

In the report recently released, 10,424 people were skin tested, 3,720 had positive reactions and 9,354 had 4x5 chest x-rays. Nine active cases, found among apparently well people, were admitted to sanatoriums; one was hospitalized for a non-tuberculous illness and one had chest surgery for a tumor. The report covered a four month period.

Winter Fish Catch Higher Than Summer

Ice fishermen heard encouraging news this week from Paul H. Eschmeyer, assistant director of the Institute for Fisheries Research at the University of Michigan.

According to Eschmeyer, a current research project shows that the winter catch from at least one Michigan lake is far superior to the harvest during the longer summer season.

Subject of the study and the findings in Houghton Lake where an estimated 70,600 ice fishermen took 250,000 fish during the three winter months last year. In those same waters, 126,000 summertime anglers only caught 174,000 fish from June through September.

The research was conducted by Kenneth E. Christensen, assistant biologist at the Institute. While Christensen feels the greater winter catch is "unusual for the state as a whole," he conducted a similar study at Craig Lake near Coldwater several years ago which produced the same findings.

When you carry packages, don't always carry them on the same side, suggests Coral Morris, extension specialist in home management at Michigan State University. Spine and shoulder strain may result if you do. It's best if you carry things directly in front of yourself.

Small Towns Could Improve Aid for Aged

Employment and income problems are especially acute for elderly residents of small communities, a University of Michigan expert on aging believes.

Wilma T. Donahue, director of the U-M Division of Gerontology, says:

"A larger proportion of people living in rural areas and small communities requires old age assistance than is true in cities. This probably reflects lower lifetime with the lack of retirement and pension plans covering farm and small town residents.

"So far as employment is concerned, census data show only about one out of every four men living in small communities is employed. This compares with about one in two men living on farms or in cities.

"Those seeking employment are also somewhat more frequent in the small community than either farm or city.

"This suggests that men desiring to work or to continue working at an older age may find it difficult to do so in small communities."

She suggests there are several ways in which their lives may be enriched. One of these is that communities or rural organizations may establish special committees on aging. Among the functions which they could perform are:

1. Establishing a visiting program for older residents who live alone or have their home in an isolated area.
2. Developing a food service to insure that elderly residents receive at least one hot meal a day.
3. Providing a daily telephone service to talk with those over 65 who live alone, making sure they are in good health and spirits.

4. Helping integrate older people in community life through joint enterprises, such as relief sewing.

Child's Work Habits Come From Parents

What better place is there for children to learn good work habits than at home, asks Coral Morris, extension specialist in home management at Michigan State University?

Children learn first from their parents and each other. Your children are good observers of your ways of doing things, so your own good work habits are a help in teaching them.

The method you use to teach them good work habits and family co-operation is important, too. Let your children know they have an important place in your family and can make worthwhile contributions to your family's welfare and happiness. Your children need to know why things should be done or why some ways are better than others.

When teaching children to help, be sure they know exactly what is to be done. Explain how to do the job one step at a time so they understand what you want them to do, adds Miss Morris.

If your children are learning a new task, work with them and give help when they need it. When they have mastered the procedure, watch them work at it alone, making occasional suggestions if necessary, suggests Miss Morris.

After children have learned their work methods thoroughly, let them work without direct supervision. This way they build confidence in their own abilities.

Above all, reminds, Miss Morris, remember to encourage and praise your children for work well done.

Tired Out? Then Try Some Exercise

You're all worn out from the holidays? You think a good rest is what you need? Stop. Don't flop on that couch. Get out and take a brisk walk around the block.

Sound Crazy? It's not. More and more doctors are prescribing exercise for fatigue. For a long time they used to treat fatigue by having the patient cut out some activity, no matter how little he was doing. If he did nothing more than sit in a rocking chair all day, the doctor told him to stop rocking and lie down.

"That's all changed today. Doctors have found that fatigue as often as not is caused by lack of activity. They call it "atrophy of disuse." Young people usually avoid this condition and keep in good shape by taking part in sports. But as we grow older we tend to give up more and more physical activity. So we suffer from fatigue which makes us think we should give up more activity. Caught in this vicious circle, we can become worn out before our time.

We can blame part of the trouble on labor saving devices our ancestors didn't have. The electric golf mobile, for example, may be fine for heart cases and similar problems, making it possible for the semi-invalid to get some exercise. But for the average man it can destroy most of the health-giving value of his day on the golf course. He'll feel less tired if he does eighteen holes on his own two feet.

So if you feel exhausted after a hard day sitting behind a desk or loading your automatic washer, exercise may be the prescription for you. But remember, it should be fun, not drudgery.

Organize Baseball For Boys 13 to 16

The organizational meeting for a summer baseball program was held at Collins school on Thursday night, March 20, at 7:30 p. m. 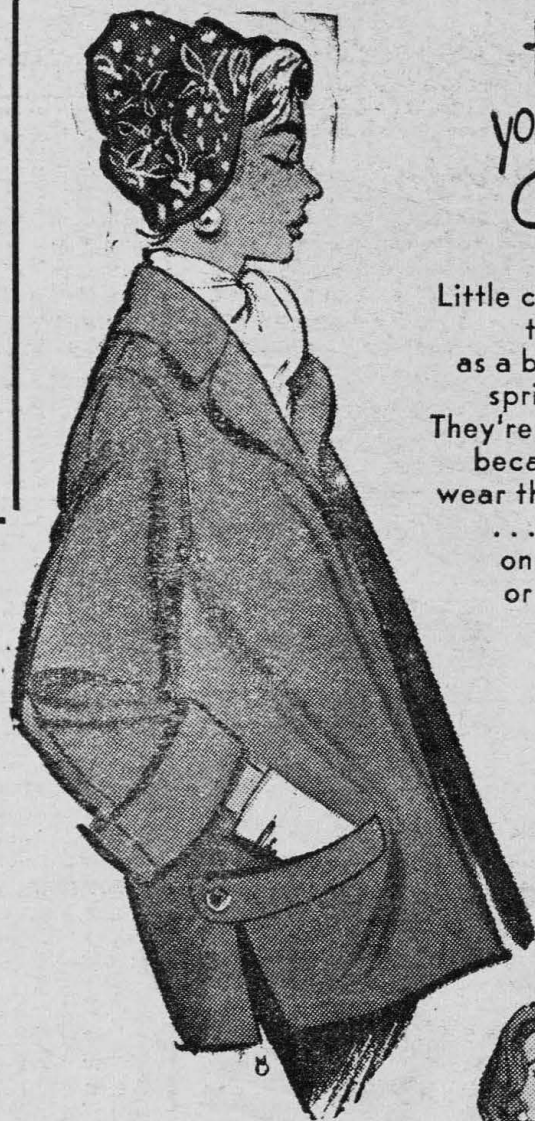

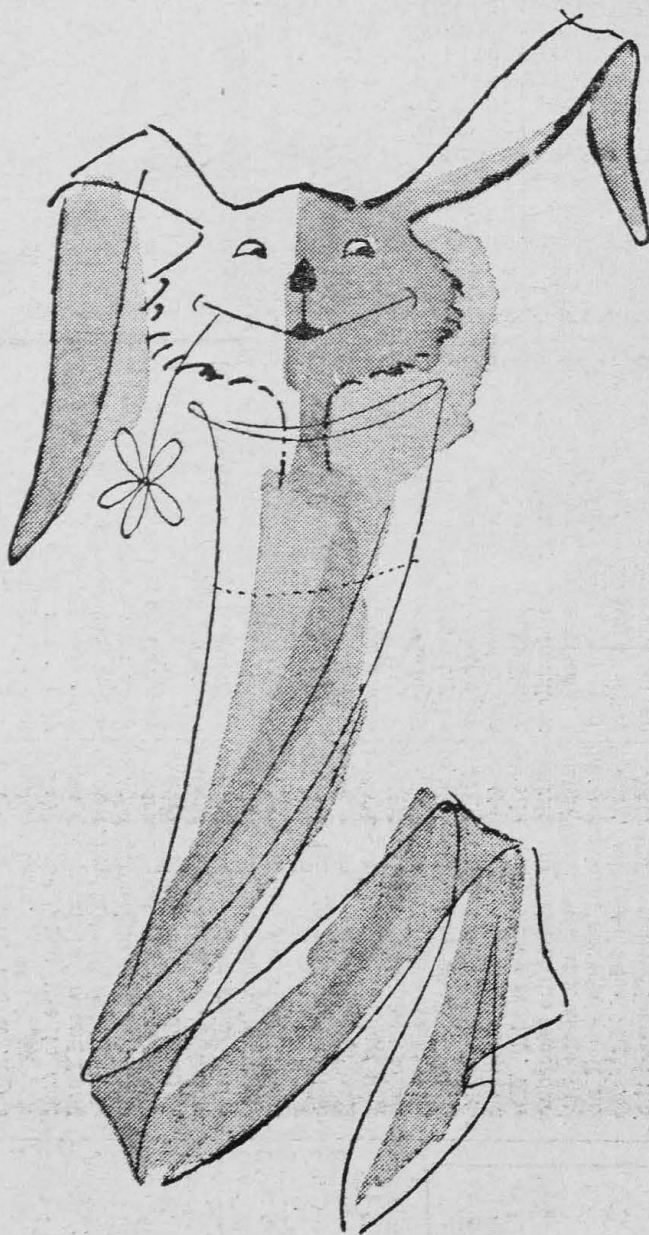

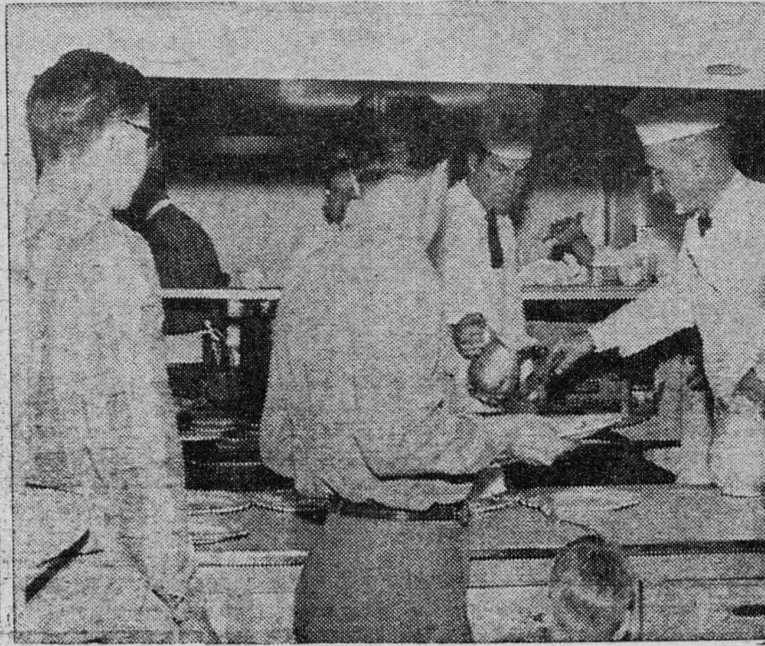

Are You Positive ?

"Snakes love music." Do you believe that? Are you positive? Really, snakes have no ears. You've seen pictures of Indian snake charmers making their snakes dance to music. The snake merely feels the rhythm through his body. Many people will go on believing that snakes can hear music. What do you believe? What you hear? What "everybody" says? This belief about snakes won't harm you but some incorrect notions may cause harm.

Have you heard this? "TB isn't a problem any more. I hear they have just closed a TB hospital." Are you positive? Did you ask about that hospital that closed? Probably it was one of those old-fashioned sanatoriums in the mountains, left over from the time when it was believed that people had to have some special air or climate to cure tuberculosis. People with TB no longer have to go far away from family and friends to get well. With modern treatment more people are cured, and cured faster. So every hospital bed for TB serves more patients.

Treatment for tuberculosis and convalescence take a long time. Often there's permanent damage that changes a whole way of life and people do die of TB—about 15,000 a year. It is a problem but it can be solved with your co-operation. You can be positive about that.

The Kent County Tuberculosis Society has a new educational cartoon film, "Are You Positive?" Showings can be arranged for community groups by calling GL6-1471 or writing to the society in the Federal Square building. The society will also furnish a projector and operator when necessary. This is part of its educational program and paid for with its Christmas Seal funds.

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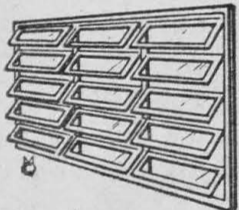
