



Help Wanted For **Neighbors in Need**

During the next month the people of Grand Rapids are going to be asked to be "good Samaritans" to meet an emergency. Lack of funds to cover the cost of sickness this year for families of many jobless people is the reason for the call to action.

Under a more favorable employment situation these people could afford to pay their own medical expenses. At this time, however, they have only the means to feed their families. When illness strikes they can turn only to the community for support.

Because state and county welfare funds and the Community Chest fund for free service in the hospital clinics have run out, the community must answer this need. If money isn't raised to care for these unfortunate neighbors, the cost of their care will have to be absorbed by the hospitals in the form of rates charged to paying patients. The hospitals, which are non-profit organizations, do not feel right in raising rates charged to paying patients to cover this free

work. To keep medical service available to people who cannot afford it. a Good Samaritan Fund campaign was announced Saturday after meetings of hospital boards, chest agencies and the chest board. J.
