

Police Plan Extra Shifts For Holiday

Following the same holiday schedule as in recent years, pass days of all Michigan State Police officers will be cancelled and patrol shifts lengthened over the Memorial day week end.

The department also will have the services of 140 National Guardsmen and 110 will be assigned to sheriffs.

The State Police intensified patrol schedule will be in effect from noon Wednesday, May 29, to midnight, June 1. Normal patrol shifts of eight hours will be lengthened to 10 hours.

National Guardsmen will be used on point control and as the second man on two-man patrols, releasing the regular second man for another patrol.

Primary attention will be given to high accident areas, particularly during the hours of the heaviest flows of traffic.

State Police planes will be used for observation of traffic conditions.

With Michigan showing a steady reduction in traffic deaths, State Police are hopeful there will be no setback over the long holiday period.

There were 17 persons killed during the 102-hour Memorial holiday period last year, or one every six hours, which was less than the average of one every 5.7 hours for the entire year.

The worst Memorial holiday period was in 1941 when 58 were killed, and the best in 1950 when only four died. Part of the difference in the death toll each year is accounted for by the length of the holiday period, which varies according to the day of the week the holiday falls on.

"The Memorial week end marks the beginning of the summer driving period when more deaths and more accidents may be expected," said Commissioner Joseph A. Childs, "but drivers have been demonstrating that they can do a better job and we earnestly hope they will be unusually vigilant and careful in the heavy holiday traffic. It isn't worth taking a chance when it could mean death."

More persons die at night in rural traffic accidents than during the day, according to the National Safety Council.

The Lowdown on The Slowdown
