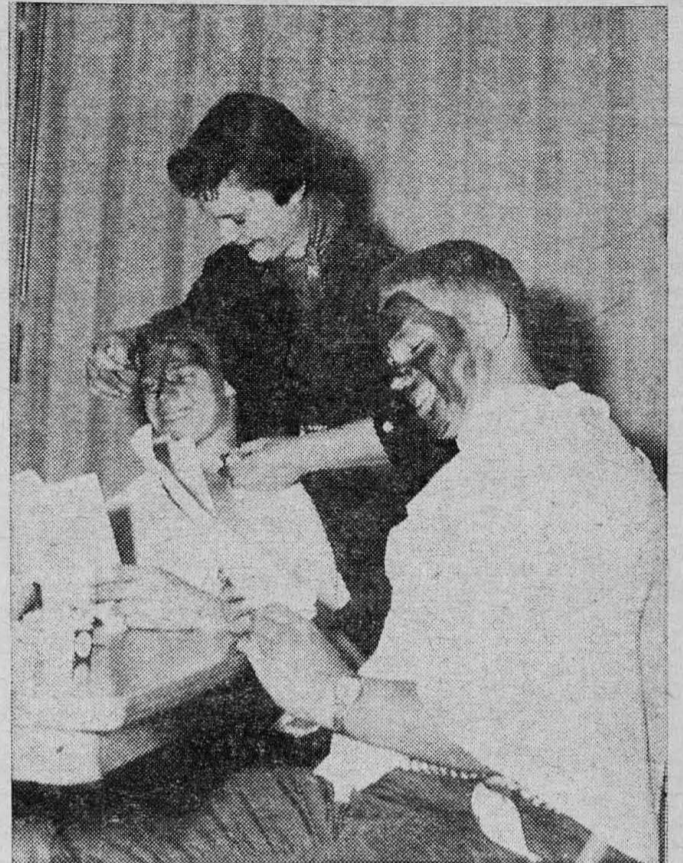
The Misses Thompson will teach in the Grand Rapids school system in the fall.

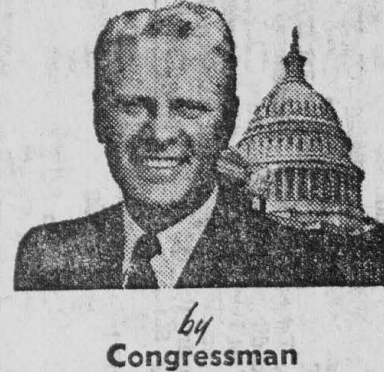

## Your Washington Review



### by Congressman JERRY FORD

Testimony before the House Committee on Astronautics and Space Exploration supports the contention of the Committee's first report that in time the advance in space, like other discoveries, will easily pay for itself in hard-cash terms of revenues against expenditures. The savings to agriculture and industry that will come from developments in weather forecasting are beyond comprehension. The Director of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory predicted that weather forecasting will become an exact science when

accurate, vital information can be gathered daily from the satellites circling the globe. He stated that this "alone in its value to the country will outweigh the cost of the entire program."

An Air Force general pointed out that "if the space age is entered by the United States with the boldness it deserves, the next five years should see all talk of unemployment in this country replaced by the greatest labor shortage in our experience. . . . The benefits of the space age will be spread directly through an ever-widening circle of subcontractors and specialty manufacturers, both large and small." The United States cannot ignore or postpone the entrance into the space age. Our survival, prestige and economic progress demand that we face its problem forthrightly.

**Alaskan Statehood:** The debate over statehood for Alaska had members of the House of Representatives on the run last week. On Wednesday there were five quorum calls and one yea and nay vote on the motion to take up for consideration the Alaskan bill. On Thursday there were four more quorum calls. Comparing these nine in two days with the total of 28 quorum calls from January 7 through May 20, we see that there was great concern with attendance on the floor for this debate.

Personally, I have consistently favored statehood for Alaska and was ready to vote anytime.

**In Memory:** Your Congressman was requested to act as one of the 28 official delegates to represent the House of Representatives at the special services to be held on Memorial Day for the burial of two additional Unknowns at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. One of these will symbolize the servicemen and women of World War II and the other will represent those who served in the Korean conflict. Interment will be at Arlington National Cemetery with appropriate ceremonies in the Amphitheater at 3 o'clock on May 30.

The American Battle Monuments Commission announced recently that it was prepared to furnish to the Next-of-Kin of those service-

men who are buried or memorialized overseas, an aerial photograph of the cemetery in which the individual is buried with a photograph of the individual headstone mounted thereon. In the case of the Missing, a photograph of the section of the memorial wall where the name is recorded will be shown.

**Onion Futures:** The Senate Committee on Agriculture has favorably reported with amendments, H. R. 376, the bill passed by the House to prohibit trading in onion futures on the commodity exchanges. One amendment removes the trading in onion futures from jurisdiction of the Commodity Exchange Authority while the other provides penalties for those who engage in such trading on any board of trade or in an organized market.

If the Senate approves the bill as amended, it will go to a Conference Committee composed of representatives of both Houses for adjustment of the differences in the Senate and the House versions. The bill in its final form must be approved by both bodies of the Congress. Onion growers and shippers in Western Michigan are vitally concerned with this legislation.

**Obscene Literature:** No objection was made in the House last week to the passage of H. R. 6239, the bill to strengthen the power of the Federal Government in combating the interstate shipment of obscene or crime-inciting material. The bill is now with the Senate where we trust it will receive prompt and favorable consideration.

The enactment of H. R. 6239 will authorize the prosecution of those who mail or ship obscene or crime-inciting matter from one state to another not only at the place where the material originates, but also at the place to which it is sent.

**Star-Spangled Banner:** Our National Anthem, both its words and music, was the subject of consideration by a House Judiciary Subcommittee last week. It is surprising to learn that we have no single, standard, authorized version of

"The Star-Spangled Banner." The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare has reported that "many versions of 'The Star-Spangled Banner' are being used at the present time and . . . there is a need for a simple, direct, and unadorned version of our national anthem which would be recognized as an official version."

To accomplish this, a number of bills and resolutions have been introduced, and the Subcommittee may soon find itself involved in some delicate poetic and musical conflicts in an attempt to establish by law an official version of words and music.

The "Star-Spangled Banner" was 116 years old before it became our national anthem on March 3, 1931, when President Hoover signed Public Law 823 of the 71st Congress.

**BITS O' BUSINESS**  
 A Detroit wholesale firm employing 45 persons has guaranteed all steady work for the balance of the year, exhorts them to "go out and spend, your jobs are secure."

A cost-conscious publishing firm gives key editors a three-minute "hour glass" to use when making long-distance calls, as a reminder to keep the conversation short.

South Florida businessmen, hotelmen and airlines will spend \$5 million plugging Florida summer vacations in an effort to recoup losses from the winter cold spell.

### Frequent, Close Mowing Hurts Lawn

The turf on many lawns is ruined by too frequent and too close mowing, say turf specialists at Michigan State University. This is especially true of shady lawns, where the competition of trees for water and plant food is great, and on open lawns which are injured by drought in summer. Better turf will result if such lawns are mowed less often. Maintain such lawn grasses as Merion and Kentucky bluegrass and red fescue at a height of 1½ to 2 inches in open, sunny areas. Keep red fescue and rough bluegrass grown in shade at 2 to 2½ inches.

Keep your lawn mowed as recommended until about June 15, then put the lawn mower away. Bring it out only if summer conditions are so favorable that the grass is likely to become unsightly.

**THINGS TO COME**

**YOUR DOG AND D.O.**

 If your dog has D.O. (doggy odor), it doesn't necessarily mean he needs a bath. If he's healthy, kept clean and regularly brushed, he should give off nothing more than a mild and rather pleasant aroma. If it's stronger, you should check for a cause.

It could be his ears. If they're the long floppy type, lift them up and take a sniff. A bad odor

means there is something wrong. It could be from ear mites, irritation from a grass awn or other foreign material in the ear, from infection, cancer, or from poor ventilation of the ear duct. If the odor is bad, find out what is causing it and have it corrected. Chronic ear trouble is difficult to correct, so get the job done early.

Bad breath is often the cause of D.O. Whoever coined the phrase "Clean as a hound's tooth" didn't know much about hounds' teeth, for tartar collects on dog molars just as it does on human teeth. Tartar is the greatest single cause of bad breath in dogs. Removing tartar is a common practice in most veterinary hospitals. Halitosis may also be caused by infected teeth, broken teeth, foreign bodies lodged in the mouth and from tonsillitis, stomach trouble, or diarrhea.

D.O. may be caused by infection of glands of the skin such as those between the toes or the perianal glands.

Even dogs that have been out in the rain should not have D.O. if they're properly dried with a terry-cloth towel or a chamois.

If your dog has D.O., have a veterinarian determine the cause and correct it, if possible.

**Feeding Tip:** If you're feeding your dog a dry prepared dog food, it's a wise precaution to keep it in tin or plastic containers so that it stays in its original crisp, dry condition.

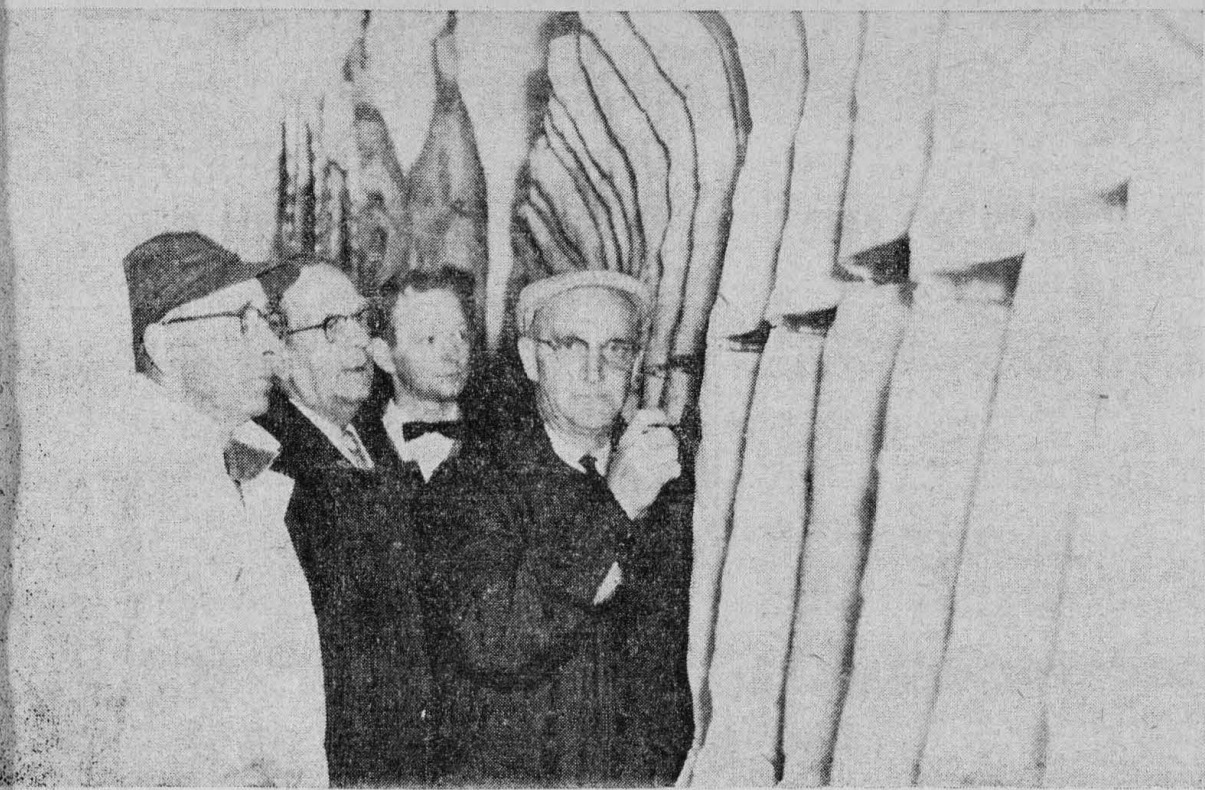

## Use Caution With Treated Seeds

Many lots of field seeds that have been treated with various poisonous compounds do not bear adequate warnings so that seedsmen, farmers and the general public take proper precautions in handling, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture's seed testing laboratory at Lansing. Mercurial-treated seed grains must bear a "poison treated" label and be stained with a color contrasting with the natural color of the seed. This makes the treated seed easy to recognize should it become mixed with untreated seed entering food or animal feed channels. Even so there is a hazard because of the fumes given off by mercurials which are volatile.

In the opinion of the chief seed analyst, John Garver, unusual care should be used in handling treated

seed, particularly mercurials that can be absorbed through skin contact or breathed into the lungs through vapors in a poorly ventilated place.

Many seeds like hybrid corn, vegetable seed and small seeded legumes and lawn seeding mixtures are often treated with certain sulphur compounds. Although classed as economic poisons, they are actually not toxic like mercurials and organic phosphates. Sulphur compounds are irritants to many persons, and some persons are highly allergic to them. Better labeling of treated seed to inform persons of the dangers is Mr. Garver's suggestion.

"It appears," said Mr. Garver, "that many seedsmen are failing to fully inform the user to take adequate precaution when using treated seed. Some individuals could suffer a bad reaction from seeds treated with these compounds."

A new filter cigarette about to be marketed will contain charcoal as one of its two filtering agents. Soon available commercially will be a noiseless ultrasonic dishwashing machine that scours unscruped dishes, pots and pans by means of sound waves in a fraction of the time required for conventional machines.

## U-M 'Itch Crew' Studies Snails Helps Swimmers

Researchers from the University of Michigan Museum of Zoology and an "itch crew" from the Michigan Department of Health have combined efforts in an all-out battle against snails carrying parasites which cause irritable "swimmers itch."

The U-M project is concerned mainly with research on the snails. The Health Department is interested in ridding Northern Michigan beaches of snails.

Henry van der Schalie (PhD), professor of zoology and curator of mollusks (shelled animals) at the Museum of Zoology, heads the U-M research, which is sponsored by the U. S. Public Health Service. It began in 1955 and continues through September 1 this year.

Dr. van der Schalie, widely-known authority on mollusks and a specialist in mollusk vectors (snails acting as carriers of the hated parasitic worms), says the project is progressing rapidly.

"We have been encouraged by the excellent liaison that has developed between our group concerned with the pure aspects of this problem and the crew engaged by the State to relieve owners of beach frontage and other areas of snails carrying this disease.

"This mutual interest and co-operation," he adds, "has proven helpful to us and we are encouraged to find our project has been instrumental in helping the state group to understand better the biology of the animals they are eradicating."

The "swimmer's itch" problem is being attacked from two angles: 1. Biological research on the mollusk vectors; and 2. Extermination of the snails.

Although the disease is mainly confined to Michigan's Upper Peninsula, it has also been reported along southern beaches.

From the U-M's standpoint the problem is to learn more about the physiology of the snails involved and their ecology, life history and distribution.
