## Vote Sept. 29 on School Bond Issue

Forest Hills School Board announced this week that on Monday, September 29, the district will vote on a bond issue of \$700,000 to finance additions to elementary and high school installations, and to consolidate the debts of the district.

The election will be held in the Collins School, from 12 noon to 8 p. m. Further information on the bond issue will be published in Suburban Life next week.

## Special Meeting In Cascade Oct. 1; Discuss Hall & Fire

A special meeting has been called by the Cascade Township Board for Wednesday, October 1, to present a plan to obtain 18 acres of land for a site of a new township hall, and to also discuss the purchase of new fire equipment. A vote is being taken at the meeting to put the site proposal on the November ballot. The fire proposal for new fire truck is already set for the November election.

### New Site Proposal

The Township Board, Businessmen's Association, and the Civic Planning Commission have endorsed the plan to purchase 18 acres from Hugh Slager, that lies between US-16 and 28th Street. Frontage on US-16 is 250 feet, and a 60 access is provided from 28th Street. The land can be purchased over 10 years on an option agreement for \$3,500 a year.

With the land available, the sponsors of the plan feel that at some future date the township could then build a new town hall, civic center, as the need arises. Also available at the same time would be playground and park area. At the meeting on October 1, the citizens will be asked to vote on putting this proposal on the November ballot.

### Vote on New Fire Truck

Already on the November ballot, will be the proposal to purchase a new high pressure fire truck to allow the department to fight fires where little water is available more advantageously. The new equipment, Sy Dykhous, fire chief reveals, is of particular importance in case there are two fires at one time, or if Cascade equipment is assisting one of the neighboring departments they have working agreements with.

The new truck would cost about \$15,000, and could be financed by a one-mill levy over three years. This is a small cost for each taxpayer for better fire protection and maintaining a low insurance rate, the fire department stated.

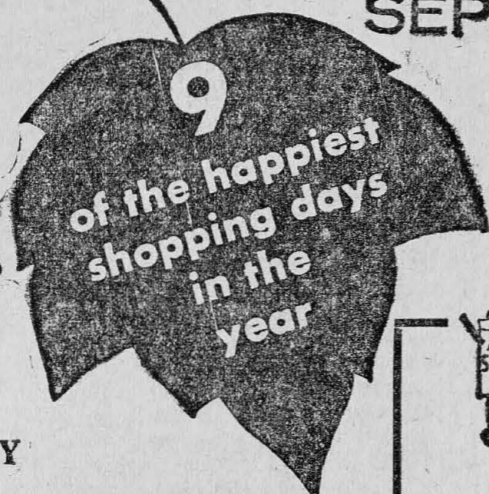

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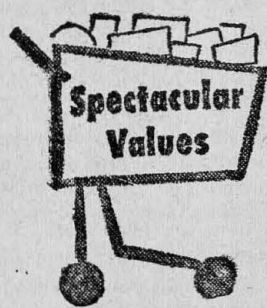

**Mealtime Should Be Pleasant**

A little planning and a pleasant atmosphere can go a long way toward making mealtime with young children a satisfying time, according to Lennah Backus, extension specialist in parent education and child development at Michigan State University.

Try to put aside your troubles at mealtime. Mother and dad, you might want to relax in the living room with a cup of coffee or glass of juice before dining. If you can come to the table in a relaxed and expectant frame of mind, mealtime then becomes a pleasant interlude in the day. In this way food is more apt to be appetizing and enjoyable. A smile helps young children sense this pleasant feeling.

Take into account what children are doing when you call them to the table. If they're in the middle of an interesting activity, a few minutes warning gives them time to finish what they're doing and get ready to eat.

A short or a quiet TV program can help get children in the mood for a pleasant meal. Dad might take over during this period to let mother put finishing touches on the meal.

Children, like plants and animals thrive on regularity in their nourishment. If meals are late Johnny may come to the table too hungry to eat, and upset. When a meal is going to be held up, you might feed young children in the kitchen as soon as the main part of the meal is ready. They can join the family for dessert later, concludes Mrs. Backus.

**Hobbyists Should Search for Semi-Precious Stones**

An avid group of hobbyists take advantage of Michigan's summer weather and geologic treasure chest to gather gem stones along Great Lakes shorelines and in inland areas.

These collectors find a wide variety of minerals, fluorescence and crystals throughout the state. These semi-precious gem materials often are turned into attractive and valuable jewelry by lapidaries, those who cut and polish stones.

In recent years, another activity called "tumbling" has captured much interest. In "tumbling," rough, irregular materials are placed in a revolving drum with water and abrasives. After hours or days of churning, the stones are smoothed to create "baroques"—well-rounded pieces having a high luster. These are then made into pendants, earrings and other jewelry.

Information on specific collecting sites usually is acquired by experience and diligent search, or through contact with veteran "rock hounds." A list of gem hunting grounds in Michigan also can be obtained from the Conservation Department Geological Survey, Lansing 26.

Some of the more popular sites include shores of Lake Superior and Lake Michigan, Isle Royale, once a popular hunting ground, is out-of-bounds to gem collectors, however, under National Parks Service regulations.

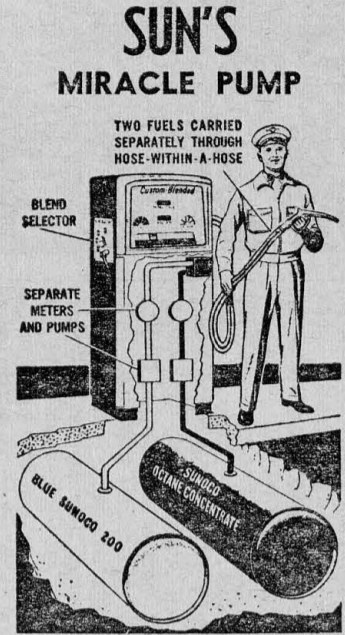

#### Option on Land Secured

The township board in cooperation with the Civic Planning Commission and the Cascade Businessmen's Association have looked over the sites available near the center of population and have secured an option from Mr. Hugh Slager on 18 acres. This property has 250 feet of frontage on US-16 and allows for a 60-foot right-away for access from 28th St.

Mr. Slager is willing to sell this on a option purchase plan that would allow the township to pay for this property \$3,500 per year over the next ten years. No interest or other charges would be involved and is the only way the township could acquire land unless they bonded for it and that would involve interest and other costs of a bonding program that would add many thousand dollars to the total cost of the property.

#### Believe This to be Best Plan

Because of the growing need for a new township hall, the present one is too small and not adequate for a growing township like Cascade, NOW is the time to obtain a site centrally located that can be purchased at the going price of land in this area. With the purchase of this land Cascade Township will be ready to build a new town hall when the time comes. Without a site the job of a new hall would be that much more of a financial problem.

#### Low Cost to Taxpayers

The cost of buying the land for the average township taxpayer would be less than \$5.00 a year, but will save him in time to come many times this expense. Land values in this area, as we all know, are increasing every year and this land that is being offered now will not be available again to the township. To provide for the necessary facilities it is agreed we need in the years to come a little clear thinking at this time will save money and provide facilities we all can be proud of.

#### Also Provide Park and Civic Center

The 18 acres will not only provide land for the township hall, and other buildings as they may be needed but will provide a park and recreation area for the people of the community. It is well known the difficulties in securing enough play area for a growing population. With all these advantages in mind we urge you to attend the meeting on October 1 and support the proposed plan.

## CODE OF FAIR CAMPAIGN PRACTICES

There are basic principles of decency, honesty and fair play which every candidate for public office in the United States has a moral obligation to observe and uphold, in order that, after vigorously contested but fairly conducted campaigns, our citizens may exercise their constitutional right to a free and untrammelled choice and the will of the people may be fully and clearly expressed on the issues before the Country.

I shall immediately and publicly repudiate the support of any individual or group which resorts, on behalf of my candidacy, to the methods and tactics which I condemn.

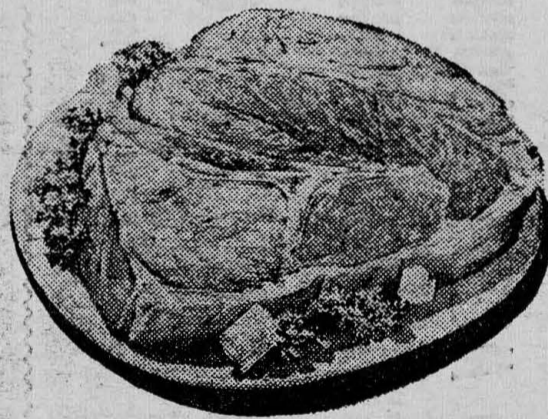
