## Vote Monday on School Expansion Program

(This special issue of the Suburban Life is being mailed to all school patrons of the Forest Hills District).

To be ready to meet the demands of a rapidly growing school district, the Forest Hills Board of Education, on the recommendation of the Citizens' Committee, has called for a vote of the people on a new bond issue amounting to \$700,000.

The crowded condition of the school district at present is emphasized by the fact that in the Cascade building, for example, an average of 34 students per class room are now enrolled. Conditions at the Martin building were temporarily relieved this year in the use of space in the Collins building. From Orchard View and Knapp communities, about 45 children are being transported daily to the Collins building. In the Carl school an enrollment of 38 is found in one room and 24 in the other. The Murphy building has a normal load. By transferring some children to the new Collins building, the Ada school has a normal load. To help relieve the situation in the Cascade building, the Board has requested the use of the Cascade Christian church for Kindergarten purposes this year. This will still leave a load of 30 per class room in Cascade.

The census of the school district is very revealing. In the first year of operation of the new Forest Hills District, a total of 1,704 children of school age were recorded. In 1957 the total was 1,931. But in May of 1958, the census takers listed 2,204 children, ages 5 through 19.

### State to Pay 25 Thousand to Remove Bridge

The State Highway Department has contracted with Brown Brothers Contractors of Lansing, to remove the old Ada Bridge for \$25,707. Work is expected to start soon.

This action came after investigation by engineers revealed that to put the bridge in good shape and make other improvements in the approaches would cost some \$60,000. Work to be completed by December 31.

This bridge was built in 1919, and is now in need of repairs to put in shape to be maintained by the county.

termined, through study, that at least 4 elementary class rooms should be added to the Orchard View building because the present 4 room building cannot contain the children that reside in that vicinity. There is an overload at present of about 60 students now being transported to Knapp and Collins.

The crowded conditions at Cascade, Ada, and Martin could be relieved by the construction of a 4 room expansible building either between Ada and Cascade or east of the Thornapple river. A careful survey is about to be made to determine the best location.

At the high school, a tremendous problem confronts the district. The new building was planned for 425 children. On registration day just passed, 471 appeared. Next year the 154 children now in the 6th grade will have to be housed at the high school. The year after that there will be an additional 166 (present 5th graders.)

Another responsibility on the high school site is that of providing for a library, advanced shop and home making. There is also a strong demand for a suitable place for band and choral instruction. Both the University of Michigan and the North Central Association of Secondary Schools, whose approval our high school needs, require the inclusion of several items so that the program for the students is rich in content and broad in scope.

### Costs to the Taxpayer For the \$700,000.00


With the present State Equalized valuation of \$13,318,226.00, the cost to each taxpayer in the district will be about \$6 per thousand of assessed valuation for the first year. After that it will decrease as the valuation rises. If your home has a tax value of \$2,000, the cost to you will be \$12 for the first year. The entire indebtedness can be paid off over a period of 25 years. Spreading it out in this manner means that each taxpayer can now pay less per year than under the old law which made it necessary for buildings to be paid in fewer years. It means, also, that families moving into the district even several years from now, will help pay for the buildings which their children will use.

School buildings are built to last at least 50 years.

### Consolidation of Debts

It will be advantageous when we sell bonds, if all the old debts of the former school districts now comprising the consolidated Forest Hills District, can be put into one fund. Each taxpayer in the district will then pay about \$2.93 per thousand of state equalized valuation until all the debts are paid. The following former districts have these debts:

Carl—\$12,000; Present cost per year: \$5.30 per thousand
Cascade—\$56,000; Present cost per year: \$4.90 per thousand
Collins—\$41,000; Present cost per year: \$3.60 per thousand
Martin—\$61,000; Present cost per year: \$3.90 per thousand
Murphy—\$32,000; Present cost per year: \$3.70 per thousand

The schools which do not have old debts will soon have to have buildings erected at the cost of

the entire district. Thus everyone will gain, if the entire indebtedness is paid by all families.

BOND ELECTION MONDAY, September 29, 1958, from 12 to 8 p. m., in the Collins School building located at 4368 Heather Lane. (1 1/4 miles east of the Beltline on M 21)

PROPOSALS: (Abbreviated for quick information)

Nos. 1 and 2 are necessary to consolidate the old debts. The first provides for raising the tax limit up to 4 mills as a maximum to insure sufficient funds to pay the amounts that will be necessary until the debts are paid. In reality, only \$2.93 will be needed. The Board will levy only that which is necessary.

The 2nd proposal actually consolidates the old debts. It uses the words, "Shall the obligation of the original districts...be assumed by the present Forest Hills District."

Proposal No. 3 is the all-important one at this time. It gives authority for the District to borrow \$700,000 with which to purchase necessary land, build elementary and high school classrooms, and to equip them. Should this proposal fail, a serious condition will exist beginning next Fall. At least 175 children will be without a classroom.

### Cost of High School Low

It was a surprise to everyone who saw the new high school, that the cost was so low. The rate per square foot was \$11.90 including covered walks, driveways, parking lot, heating plant, and underground installations to care for future additions. Economy was due to design of building and a favorable building contract. It is believed that similar economy will be possible if we build within the coming year.

# Annual Report and Financial Statement Forest Hills Public Schools

The Forest Hills Schools were very crowded this past year due to the fact that the 9th grade was retained in the district, and of course, due to many families moving into the district. During the year the new high school was constructed, the capacity of which is 425 Junior and Senior High students, in the 16 standard-sized classrooms together with the shop and gymnasium. The installation of a movable curtain in the gym will make it possible for another 30 students to be accommodated. The school census shows that the district is growing very rapidly. Additions to the new high school and to the existing Elementary buildings will be necessary within another year.  
It is recommended that a professional testing program be established for all grades in agreement with a recommendation of the University of Michigan.







Mr. Slater is willing to sell this on a option purchase plan that would allow the township to pay for this property \$3,500 per year over the next ten years. No interest or other charges would be involved and is the only way the township could acquire land unless they bonded for it and that would involve interest and other costs of a bonding program that would add many thousand dollars to the total cost of the property.

### Believe This to be Best Plan

Because of the growing need for a new township hall, the present one is too small and not adequate for a growing township like Cascade, NOW is the time to obtain a site centrally located that can be purchased at the going price of land in this area. With the purchase of this land Cascade Township will be ready to build a new town hall when the time comes. Without a site the job of a new hall would be that much more of a financial problem.

### Low Cost to Taxpayers

The cost of buying the land for the average township taxpayer would be less than \$5.00 a year, but will save him in time to come many times this expense. Land values in this area, as we all know, are increasing every year and this land that is being offered now will not be available again to the township. To provide for the necessary facilities it is agreed we need in the years to come a little clear thinking at this time will save money and provide facilities we all can be proud of.

### Also Provide Park and Civic Center

The 18 acres will not only provide land for the township hall, and other buildings as they may be needed but will provide a park and recreation area for the people of the community. It is well known the difficulties in securing enough play area for a growing population.
