A goal of \$55,453 has been established for the entire county with a breakdown of this amount for the various areas as listed below. The first report meeting will be held on Friday, October 10, at 12:07 noon in Fountain Street church.

The chairmen have pointed out this past week that the actual needs of all the participating services in the drive have been stated at \$1,791,500. These needs were examined by volunteers from every segment of the community. They acknowledge the needs as acute, but directed that only the barest essentials should be included in the current campaign. As a result the total needs were pared by \$288,183. This left the figure at \$1,503,317—86 percent of actual needs, a minimum needs goal to be reached.

For three consecutive years the campaign has fallen far short of its county goal. Yet the necessary service has been given. These vital community services have been kept alive for the last three years by past campaign savings which had reached \$400,000 by 1954. Shortages of needed funds were practically made up from this contingency fund. Now there is less than \$100,000 in savings and this amount will be used serving current needs by the end of this fiscal year, according to the co-chairmen. The leaders emphasized: "There is no place to turn for funds now—there are no reserves. If the needs of our community service are not fulfilled in this campaign, it is evident that a drastic curtailment will have to be made in the health and welfare programs of the community."

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

Like the United Community Fund, it is a single organization that decides each agency's fair share of your generosity; then it sets out to raise the money needed, and divides that money fairly among the 27 state and national services it supports.

Unlike the United Community Fund, it does not come knocking at your door. All money raised by the Michigan United Fund is raised through the local community chest, red feather, and torch drives throughout the state of Michigan.

So when you contribute to the United Community Fund, a part of your contribution goes to the Michigan United Fund to be distributed to state and national health and welfare agencies... agencies like the USO, Travelers Aid, the Michigan Heart Association, and the Michigan Epilepsy Center and Association... services that otherwise would have to hold a score of individual drives to raise funds.

But because the United Community Fund includes the Michigan United Fund as one of its benefiting organizations, you are spared the nuisance of many separate campaigns; campaigns by United Cerebral Palsy, by the Heart Association, and the Mental Health Society, and by the other services of the Michigan United Fund. You give to these state and national services when you give to the Michigan United Fund through the United Community Fund. Your one gift includes local services, to be sure; it also includes state and national services.

The Michigan United Fund serves locally. The Grand Rapids or Kent County child taken to Ann Arbor for treatment gets the benefit of up-to-the-minute heart research. The Michigan Hearing Association and the Michigan Epilepsy Association both send mobile units to Grand Rapids and Kent County to make tests and suggest treatment. This makes the service rendered by this "state" agency "local" service; Travelers Aid helps Grand Rapids & Kent County residents whether they are here or in Tala-hassee; the USO is a local service in the sense that it aids your Grand Rapids, Kent County sons and daughters who may be in Nome or Rangoon.

In this sense, all services are local. They help Grand Rapids and Kent County to a happier life. And they deserve a part of your generous contribution.

Back in 1947, Henry Ford II called a meeting of representative citizens from every part of Michigan. To them he said, "I am confronted almost daily with urgent appeals for contributions and for leadership in worthy health and welfare projects... I believe these essential services deserve our full support. But I also believe the growing multiplicity of appeals makes it imperative that a more orderly and businesslike method of financing must be devised.

"A generation ago, the leaders in American communities faced a similar situation. With vision and foresight they developed federated financing and planning for local social services through the Community Chest movement.

"I firmly believe the time has arrived when the civic leaders of this country should create a strong federation of national health and welfare agencies. That movement can start in Michigan now."

It did. The result is the Michigan United Fund.

The Michigan United Fund is an organization of volunteers. Each of the committees that guide it is made up of representative people from every section of Michigan, businessmen, professional people, housewives, labor leaders, and industrialists.

The Admissions and Budget Committee, composed of 213 members, from 65 counties, reviews each agency when it asks to join the Michigan United Fund. They examine that agency's administration, its aims, and its methods, before admitting it to membership. In addition, they meet with the agency every year to make sure the money that agency is asking for is a fair amount.

Robert P. Briggs, executive vice president of Consumers Power Company and Chairman of the Board of the Michigan United Fund, said at the May Annual meeting—11 years after Henry Ford II called his meeting—"We have succeeded in our goal: to reduce the number of drives in Michigan and, by combining them, reduce the fund raising expense of each."

Through the Michigan United Fund, there's order in your giving. Your warm heart is the same; the elimination of waste—in your time and your dollars—

How to Help Your Child in School

The best ally your child has in coping with school is you. Whether he's going for the first time, or leaving home for college, you've got to help him get through the difficult periods. According to the editors, here is the best way to do it.

In the early grades. Best way to help him is to learn what his pace is. Some kids learn to read faster than others. Don't pressure him needlessly. You can stimulate him, however, by talking with him about nature, games, books; by taking him on trips to museums; by reading to him; by helping him build a library.

In the middle grades. Conferences with the teacher should begin early. Some things you'll want to know: Is he working at his full capacity? How does he measure up to the standards of his grade? How does he get along with others? Does the teacher have any suggestions about how you can help him?

In junior high school. By the eighth grade the child has had a good chance to demonstrate his academic potential. Batteries of tests help spot his aptitudes and vocational interests. This is the time for talk about high school curriculum, education after high

school and career.

By now your boy or girl should be able to study effectively on his own. Don't hound him to get down to work. Help him understand the importance of setting a definite schedule and adhering to it. See that he has a study place. Help him with his homework only when necessary and only by helping him find the way toward a solution, never by doing the work.

In high school. More understanding than ever of his strengths and weaknesses, and of his need to do what other teen-agers are doing. Keep in touch with what he's studying and with his teachers and friends.

Don't wait too long to discuss the choice of college. Suggest that

he visit the schools he has in mind. Talk over finances with him early.

In college. He's on his own. Your job is to be proud of him, and to be available when needed.

Better Schools In Population Center Districts

Community school districts formed around centers of economic, educational, recreational and social interests, can help Michigan's rural children get a better education.

That's the belief of John F. Thaden, rural sociologist at the Michigan State University Agricultural Experiment Station. Thaden says that a 12-grade community school district formation is the right path in school district reorganization. Educational opportunities are more universal in these community districts than in partial-community districts or in districts where people have little in common. The sociologist believes that a child should be able to get a 12-grade education within his own school district.

Thaden stresses that the community districts ought to be organized around natural groupings of people and around relatively self-sufficient multiple service centers. The natural boundaries of

communities and the extent and nature of interdependence of town and country people within these boundaries must be taken into account.

A community school district, as described by Thaden, is one in which less than 10 per cent of the pupils in grades 9 to 12 are non-resident. This ideal district should also have the five basic services of a bank, weekly or daily newspapers, doctor of medicine, dentist and a movie theater. Only 44 per cent of the 534 12-grade districts in the state have all five of these services.

Many 12-grade districts are being forced to refuse any more non-residents from non-12-grade districts, points out Thaden. And this

tight classroom situation will continue. By 1962, junior and high school enrollment is expected to be 53 per cent more than in 1954-55. Enrollment in grades kindergarten to 6 is expected to increase 44 per cent over 1954-55.

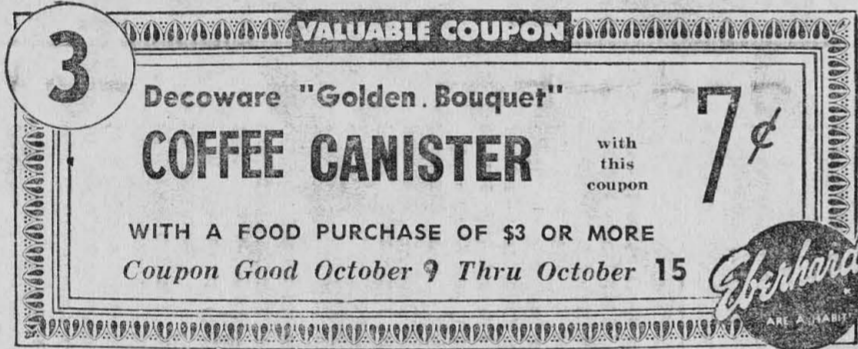

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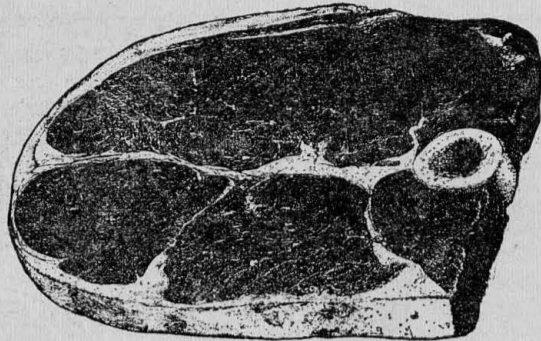

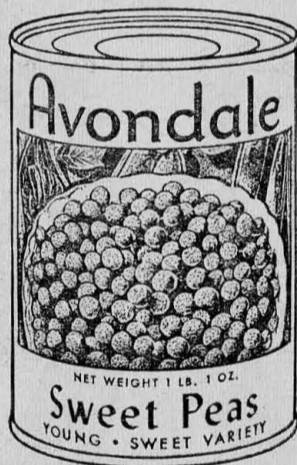
