## Elmer Phillips, 66 Dies Unexpectedly

Elmer R. Phillips, 66, formerly of 1750 Thornapple River Dr., died unexpectedly Thursday evening at the home of his brother-in-law, Gus Barbrich of Coopersville, where the Phillips had been staying since May.

Surviving besides his wife Emma, are two sons, Ernest H. of Holland, and Elmer C. of Chicago; his mother, Mrs. Julia M. Phillips of Spring Lake; two sisters, Mrs. Jack Norton of Talihina, Oklahoma, and Mrs. James Goodwin of Spring Lake; and four grandchildren.

Services were held at 2 p. m., Monday in the Blue Lodge room of the Masonic Temple. Burial was in Rosedale Memorial Park. Rev. Raymond Gaylord officiated at the service. Graveside services were under the auspices of Valley City Lodge.

Mr. Phillips was born in Fruitport and moved to Grand Rapids in 1912. He owned Valley City Ice & Coal Co. from 1925 to 1936, and until his retirement last January operated the Elmer R. Phillips Insurance Agency. He was a great hunter and fisher, and was a member of the South Kent Sportsmen's Club. He was a member of the Cascade Christian Church and of the Valley City Lodge No. 86, F & AM, and the DeWitt Clinton consistency.

Last March Mr. Phillips underwent a heart operation at Butterworth hospital, where an aorta transplant was performed.

He had been hunting Thursday afternoon, and laid down after supper to rest, and when Mrs. Phillips called him to watch a TV program, she found him dead.

## 'Apple Bobbing Bob' Saturday, November 1st

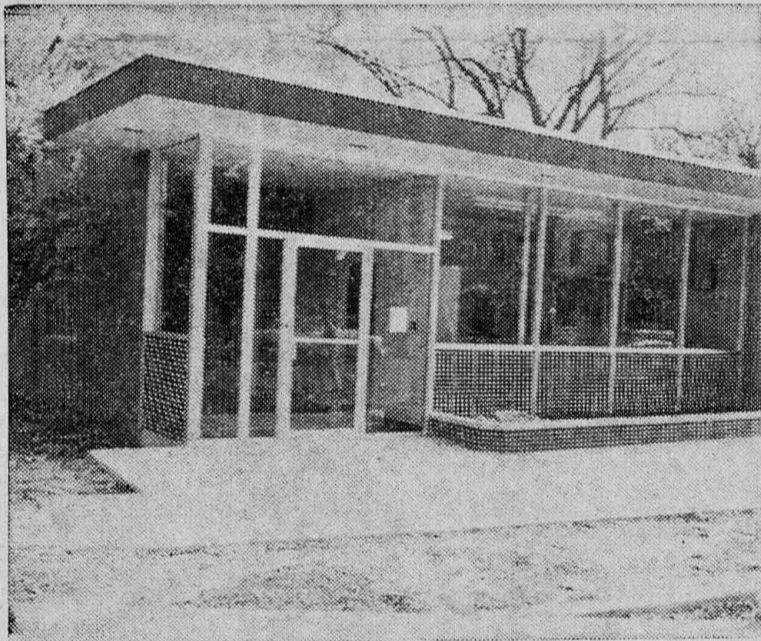

### Food Freezer; Savings or Expensive Convenience?

Buying in quantity for the food freezer doesn't necessarily save you money, claim the food editors. It may be just an expensive convenience if you don't plan carefully just what to buy and store in your freezer.

Here are some hints on using your freezer so that it does cut the food bill:

Buy in quantity when prices are low.

Buy large cuts of meat. A large chuck roast is more economical than a small one, especially if you cut the round end off to cube for beef stew and slice the other end into Swiss steak pieces, leaving the center for a roast that can be eaten in one meal.

Cook for the future. Make twice as much stew, for example, as you need and freeze the rest. It will save gas or electricity—to say nothing of time and energy.

### Landscaping Should Help Common Man

"In the past, landscape architecture has been for the wealthy and most lay people have had very little benefit from the profession," according to Walter L. Chambers, newly appointed chairman of the Department of Landscape Architecture at The University of Michigan.

Chambers also serves as professor of landscape architecture and director of Nichols Arboretum. "I hope to make the Arboretum serve teaching purposes to a greater extent than it has in the past. But above all, I want it to be used for the benefit of people."

"In the past, the low income group has benefited through housing and recreation efforts of the architectural profession, but has been neglected in the area of landscape architecture," he says.

Chambers would like to see the Arboretum used for experimental plots: "The students might design experimental gardens and terraces given over to plants not native to this region to see whether they will thrive in this climate. The people of Michigan would also benefit from this."

Professor Chambers taught landscape architecture at Harvard University for the past 25 years, beginning as an instructor there in 1933. In 1939 he was made an assistant professor; in 1942, an associate professor; and in 1955, full professor. He was acting chairman of the department of landscape architecture, 1940-41, and chairman since 1956.

At Harvard, he had full responsibility and teaching of courses in professional practice, advanced landscape construction, landscape construction, and site engineering design.

Mulling over further plans, Professor Chambers said he hopes to see the department of landscape architecture become a highly developed professional unit. He is particularly interested in developing a program of graduate work for the department.

"Personally, I feel this is important because many universities often have great difficulty in employing instructors and also in advancing them in rank because of the lack of higher degrees in the profession," Professor Chambers says, speaking above a steady flow of FM music from a set on his desk.

"My wife and I have three FM sets and they go with us wherever we go," he said. "They are on from morning to night. I think best to music. I'd like to see music introduced into the drafting room. I think it would help the boys work."

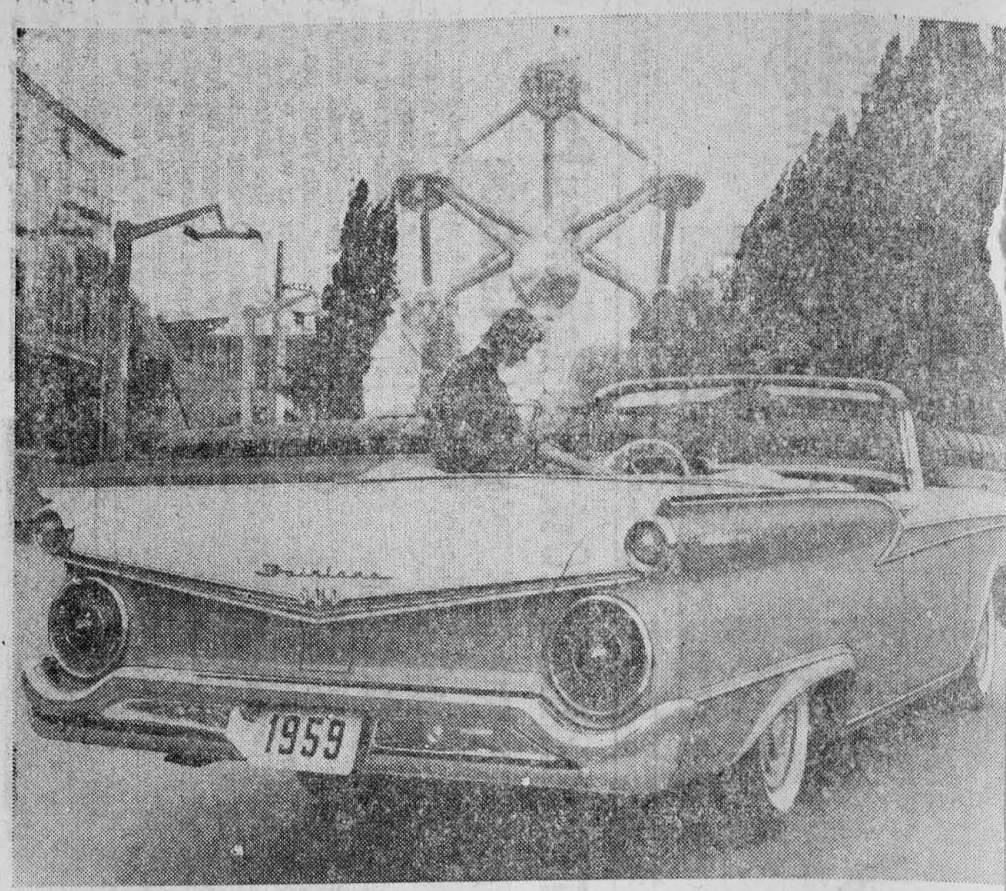
### New Record Set By State Campers

With the year's end still nearly three months away, Michigan campers have already posted a bulky new record for use of State parks during 1958.

To date this year, 132,431 permits have been issued for park camping, a healthy 16.2 percent above the 1957 level. The highest previous year on record was 1957, when a total of 116,119 permits were issued.

Day use attendance, however, continues to run close to last year's mark, which is down from the record year of 1955 when nearly 18,000,000 visitors entered state parks.

To date, 16,017,000 persons have used parks this year, while 16,019,000 had used the parks to this date last year.

## College Entrance Exams Common Now; All Schools Will Have Them in 10 Years

Use of college entrance exams is on the increase, according to the editors; four out of five private colleges test applicants and one of four publicly supported colleges do. Within a decade just about every four-year college will use entrance exams.

The scores count a lot at certain highly selective schools. An extremely high score will almost assure the student a berth at many places. A particularly low grade will be likely to cut you out of consideration at a good many schools. But most colleges rely on

other factors along with the test scores—high school grades, class rank, principals' recommendations, extra curricular activities, etc.

There isn't any "passing" score. Each college judges the score in its own way. The exams are graded on a scale from 200 to 800 and a 500 score is average for college candidates. A score below 425 signals trouble. But you won't be automatically shut out at most places, especially if you're strong in other ways. Even at tough colleges where the average of those admitted may be around 625, some

do get in with scores as low as 400. At not-so-tough schools the average of successful applicants is about 525; but some get in with scores under 400. And at some colleges using the tests you can get in even if you score below 300.

Do coaching and cramming help to raise scores? Actually, they don't. Careful studies show that they barely affect scores, certainly not enough to warrant the hundreds of dollars some private coaching schools charge. But review of a particular subject during the year in which you are taking the exam may help.

How then do you prepare for the exams? By preparing all through your elementary and secondary schooling. Chances are that

if you get good marks steadily, you'll do well in the exams.

Broaden your outside reading. Students who read widely all through their school years usually do well.

Consider taking the tests in your junior year. That gives you a chance to improve your score, and the score itself gives you a good idea of the type of college you ought to aim for.

## Buy Washer That Meets Your Needs

You need a new washing machine, but what shall you get—automatic or non-automatic?

In spite of convenience features of an automatic washer you may feel a non-automatic is a better choice for you, point out home management specialists at Michigan State University.

An automatic washer saves your time and energy. Although total washing time may be longer, you can do other activities while the machine does the work of washing. However, you'll probably have to make some changes in your work habits in order to make best use of an automatic washer. Instead of a special wash day you may find "a batch a day" more convenient with the automatic machine.

You do not need wash tubs with an automatic, unless you choose

one that saves suds for a second washing load. If your laundry space is limited, this may be an important consideration as well as the fact that less work space is needed around an automatic than around a non-automatic.

Don't forget to consider the comparative purchase price, installation requirements, probable need for more service calls with the automatic, and the necessity of an ample supply of hot, soft water for satisfactory operation. ## Most Stair Fall Victims Slip or Trip

Slipping or tripping, not obstructions, are the major causes of falls on stairs in farm homes.

Two agricultural engineers at Michigan State University report this finding after studying 100 home stairway fall accidents. Only about 3 per cent of the victims reported stepping on obstructions on the stairs.

The engineers, Joe Miller and Merle Esmay, conclude that a safety problem exists from the standpoint of stair covering materials and step uniformity. As a result, they have begun other tests to learn more about the "slipping potential" of various covering materials.

Another important finding of the study is that 11 per cent of those who fell were not even intending to use the stairs. This figure included people who chose the wrong door in a strange house and found themselves stepping directly on the stairs. Others chose the wrong doorway when it was dark. These types of accidents point up the problems of home design especially of stair and doorway construction and location.

More than 2,200 farm people die each year as a result of falls. Tumbles on stairs and steps cause about one-third of these accidents.

## Great Lakes Help Protect Michigan From Rabies Spread

Michigan's people can, in part, probably thank their lovely Great Lakes that the dread disease—rabies—isn't too serious in the state, a University of Michigan wildlife expert says.

"Michigan's water surroundings may be helping to hold back the spread of rabies to its wildlife," says Prof. A. B. Cowan of the U-M School of Natural Resources. "By checking the spread to wildlife subsequent potential transmission to and loss of valuable farm animals is also checked," he adds.

In neighboring Wisconsin, rabid skunks are a serious threat to livestock. Illinois, Indiana and Ohio have rabies in both skunks and foxes, but no rabid foxes have been reported from along the Michigan state line.

"Unlike the situation in Wisconsin, Ontario is experiencing an outbreak of rabies in its foxes but not in its skunks, which are also quite numerous there.

"It is somewhat of a puzzle yet as to why some areas which are inhabited by both foxes and skunks, outbreaks have occurred in only one of these susceptible species," Professor Cowan states.

In Michigan most of the reported cases of rabid wildlife have been skunks from the Southern part of the state, Cowan says.

"There were a few exceptions last summer when rabies was found in some foxes and a coyote killed in the eastern end of the Upper Peninsula," he adds. "Some authorities have speculated that the disease may have been brought in by rabid foxes crossing on the ice from Ontario last winter."

The biggest problem is not necessarily concern for infection of humans, Professor Cowan says, "but of transmission and subsequent death to farm animals, a great potential economic loss."

In conclusion, he says: "We would like to keep track of rabies in Michigan and would appreciate learning about any occurrences of rabid wildlife in the state."

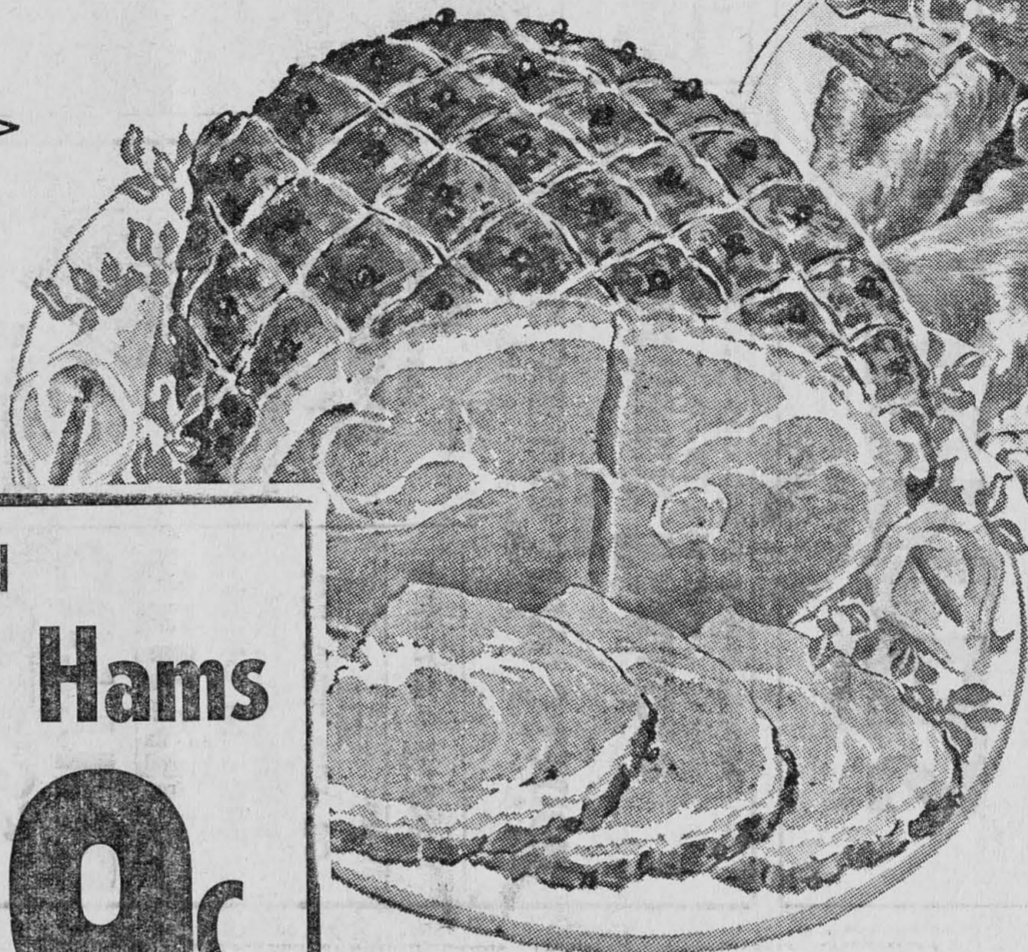

# Male Pheasant Sports Harem

Michigan's pheasant—large, long-tailed, brilliantly colored game bird—has a right to look exotic.

"The handsome birds you often see fly up from the fence rows startled by your car on a Sunday afternoon drive are for the most part Chinese ring-necked pheasants with a considerable amount of Mongolian pheasant blood mixed in," says George Hunt, assistant professor of wildlife management at the University of Michigan.

Native to Asia, the bird was long ago introduced into England and other parts of Europe. Its color is chiefly rich chestnut or golden brown, barred and laced with black. The head and neck are mostly iridescent greenish blue.

"But Michigan pheasants are essentially a new strain, slightly different from their Asian ancestors—really typically Michigan now," he says.

"Last year about one and a quarter million pheasants were harvested in the state and expectations are that we will have as good a population of them this year as last. Hunting season this fall begins at 10 a. m., Oct. 20, and ends Nov. 10.

"Pheasants were introduced into Oregon from Asia in 1881. They had such a great increase that within a few years there was a hunting season. This attracted the attention of other states. Michigan first began stocking them in 1917. In eight years they had increased to the point where we could have a hunting season.

"One reason pheasants have been so successfully introduced here is the fact that the males are polygamous, sometimes collecting a harem of females up to around 12. Also, since the males can be identified so easily by their brilliant plumage, it's possible to have a hunting season on males only.

"Mating season occurs in the spring. The female raises just one brood a year. However, if the first nest is destroyed, she will nest a second or third time, so at least a good share of the hens are able to bring off a brood every year.

"The hen lays anywhere from 10 to 20 eggs usually about 12. From these, an average of six will survive until the fall hunting season. The incubation period is a little better than three weeks. As soon as they are hatched, the young birds leave the nest and begin searching for food. Their wing feathers develop early and by two weeks of age they are capable of short flights.

"They breed at the age of one year. As a general rule, pheasants don't live too long. About 80 per-

cent of the males that are shot each year are birds of the year, hatched that spring."

The age of discretion is when a man puts the small bill on the outside of his roll.
