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Explorer Training Session Held

On Saturday, October 25, at Camp Lion, the Grand Valley Council presented the new National Explorer program in a Basic Training course to leaders appointed by the districts. Milton Heaven, advisor of Cascade Post 2334 was one of the five men from the South Kent District appointed to take the course in the afternoon and evening sessions. The instruction was put on by the District executives. There were between 30 and 40 men present.

Tentative date for presenting this training to all explorer leaders in the South Kent District is December 12, at Camp Lion.

Something New, All New

That defines the new explorer program just released by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

The new program goes into effect on January 1, 1959, and at that time, all explorer activities will be conducted from an explorer post only. There will be no more Explorers in the Scout troop. Boys who wish to remain in the Scout Troop will remain as Senior Scouts.

The new program is completely new all the way through. Research for the new program was obtained through a nation wide survey made by the Institute of Social Research of the University of Michigan. This institute conducted personal interviews with fourteen, fifteen and sixteen year old boys all over the nation; getting a clear picture of boys attitudes, concerns and interests. Through this survey, the new explorer program was set up.

Any boys 14 years old and in the ninth grade in high school, or a boy, 15 years of age, regardless of grade in school is eligible to be an explorer.

They may remain an explorer through their 17th year, regardless of grade, or as long as they are a full time student in high school.

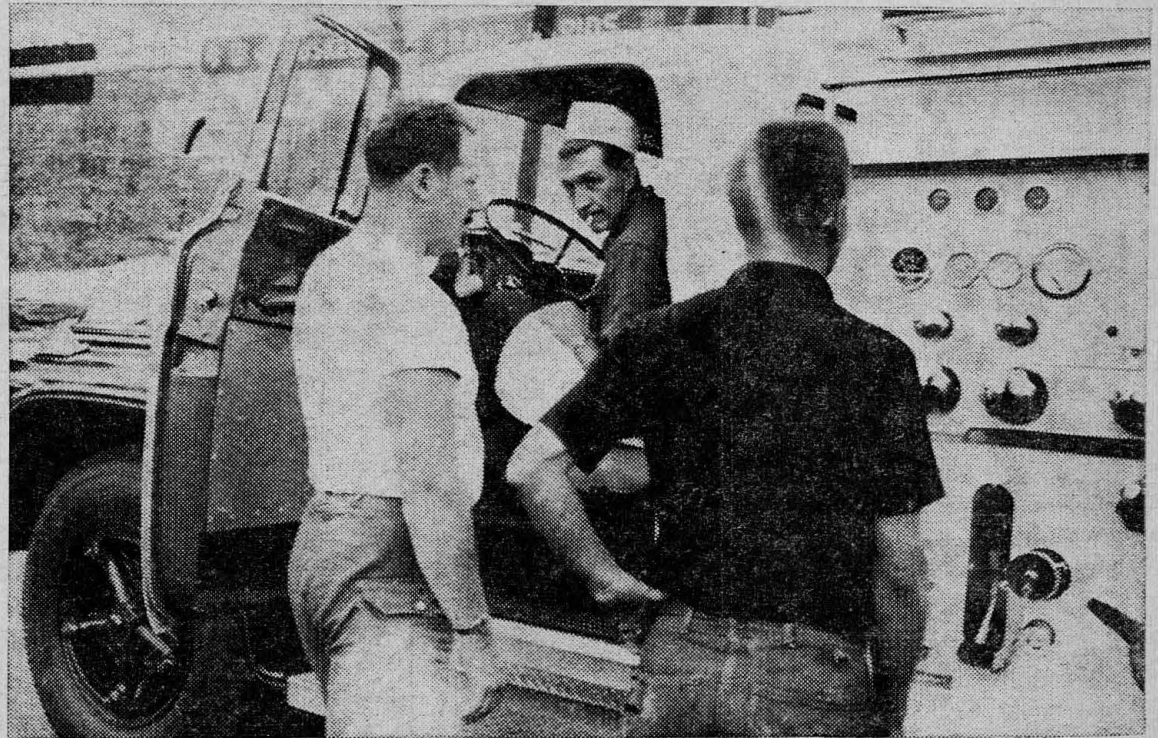
Halloween Party Friday At Ada School

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Tribute to Addie L. Wride

I will try and write a tribute to my mother, if I can put the words down, to convey the meaning, for we all, have had or do have mothers. And as my sister said to me

in the funeral coach the other day, we all called her Captain, and the name fit her so well. For she was a good soldier through all the years, legs helpless 6-7 years, on crutches before that. But oh! those hands—what they did not do. The beautiful work, bed spreads and table cloths. Oh! I am just knotting up string, she would say. The hand knitted socks and mittens, lost track of the count. The many real doll clothes she made for the little ones with button holes and buttons. The thousands and thousands of cancer pads and never a whimper of her condition. A lovely strong clear hand she wrote, always the same. Keeping up on world affairs by Radio, TV and magazines and daily papers.

Well, I have enough to eat and wear and a warm place to stay. I can sit here and watch the world go by. Why, she said, I have counted over 200 cars in three minutes, going someplace. If you can't do what you want to do, do what you can, she would say. How she loved the grandchildren, great and great, great, and how proud she was of them.

There was many a tragedy in her life. Her husband killed, mashed to the pavement by a speeding car with no head lights. Her only son also killed in an auto accident was a hard blow. A card in memory appeared in the Press every year at Christmas time, since 1940.

The death of two of her great-grandchildren, in a fire, was almost more than she could take. And she loved them so—such darlings, 3-5—just babies yet. A woman with a big heart always willing to give and never asking anything in return.

How interested she was in progress. I have seen three new roads built by here, she said. A farmer's daughter, a lover of the soil, and all it produced, who lived to see the city fairly lapping nearer and nearer to her door.

That was Mother, truly a wonderful woman.

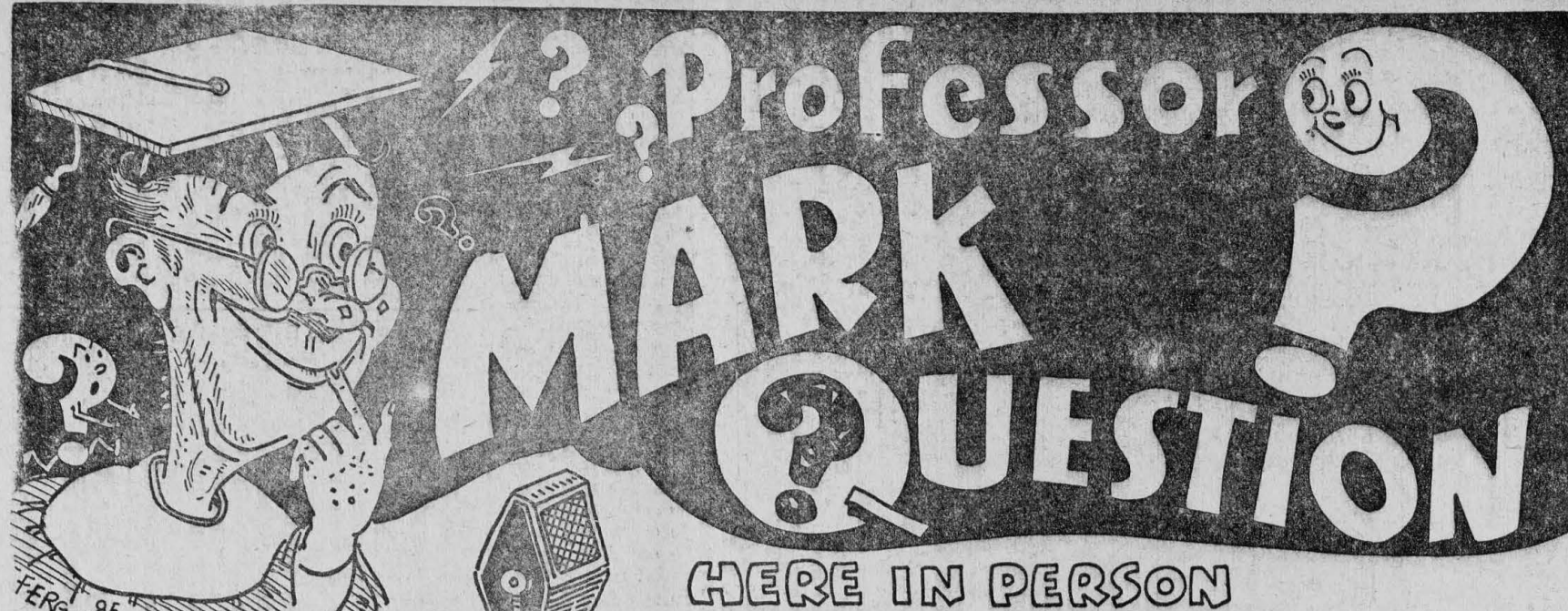

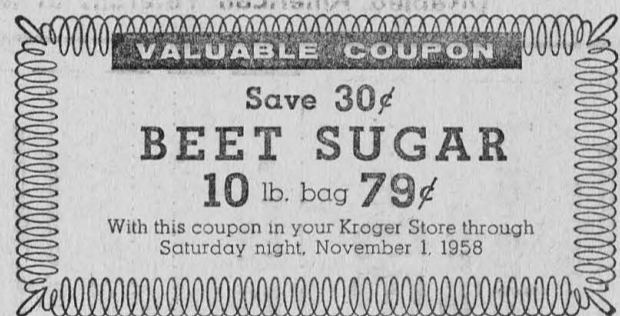

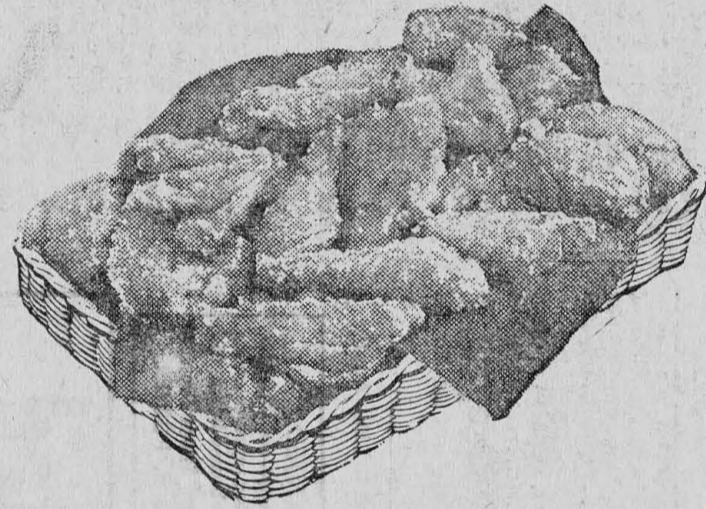

Community Planning Very Necessary To Attract Industry to A Community

Community planning is becoming a more important consideration in a program for attracting new industry. Manufacturers are convinced it is advantageous to place new plants in areas that have plans for future growth.

A plot of ground no longer is sufficient to attract an industry. What is wanted is a suitable location in an area that permits expansion in a community that has an orderly program for future growth.

Industry takes a broad view as it determines location of a new plant. It is interested in a community that has a master plan that provides for adequate streets, designated areas for residential, commercial and industrial growth, schools that provide sufficient classrooms, municipal sewer and water services that can be expanded to meet local growth.

If your community does not have a planning commission and adequate zoning, it should take steps to see they are inaugurated as soon as possible. If there is a planning commission, efforts should be made to have a master plan adopted. If there is a master plan, residents of the area should make certain its provisions are implemented in an orderly manner.

These things cannot be accomplished by municipal officials without public support.

Need for adequate planning is outlined in an industrial development advertisement carried in this newspaper today. The advertisement is the sixth in a series of 26 sponsored by Michigan Press Association and the Michigan Economic Development Department. The series of advertisements is being carried in 306 Michigan newspapers.

Clarification of Bus 'Stop' Laws Sought

In an attempt to clarify some of the misunderstandings concerning Michigan's new highway laws concerning school busses, Homer Earl, bus driver education coordinator at Western Michigan University, has worked out some standard procedures with area law enforcement authorities.

Earl states: "When a school bus approaches a stop to load or unload passengers, the bus driver will place in operation the alternately flashing signals, located on the front and back of the bus. The warning is to be timely, allowing sufficient opportunity for drivers of other vehicles to stop safely for the stopped school bus. The flasher lights should not be operated for excessive distances when approaching a stop, because traffic from in front of the bus may not be able to determine the proper place to stop. The bus driver will turn on his flashers to give ample warning so all traffic can stop. When flashers are turned on all other vehicles should stop, with the lead cars not closer than 10 feet to the school bus.

"School bus drivers are required by law to operate the flasher lights whenever and only when the bus is stopped or about to stop for the purpose of loading or unloading school children.

"The new two-way stop law requires traffic from both directions to stop when a school bus is loading or unloading passengers.

"All school buses must stop off the paved, or main-traveled part of the roadway, whenever and wherever possible. Other traffic must stop on the roadway."

Buying a House You Can Afford; Don't Let Income Formulas Fool You

You shouldn't let those rules-of-thumb—such as "pay no more than two and a half times your income"—guide you when you buy a house. These formulas just don't allow for important individual differences, say home planning experts.

Take family size, for instance. A family with several children needs a bigger house and may have to spend more of its money on a house than a childless couple would. Even the children's ages matter. If they are near college age, you would not want to commit too much future income to paying off a mortgage.

Rules-of-thumb encourage you to buy on the basis of this year's income. According to the editors, your true buying ability depends on future income. A man whose income will be reduced by retirement five years hence would be foolish to buy a house costing two and a half times his pre-retirement income.

Second incomes are another problem. One lender gives credit for half the wife's income if she is a professional and under 32, full credit over 32, and no credit for a non-professional working wife under 32.

Differences in living standards count too. People on low incomes spend more for housing than people with big incomes. If your income is good, go easy on blowing every last cent on a house. You might have to pare down your style of living.

Sewing Easier When Planned

You will sew faster and more easily if you organize your sewing before you begin, says Bernetta Kahabka, extension specialist in clothing at Michigan State University.

Make sure your equipment is in good condition and comfortable to use. Frequent removal of dust and lint from your sewing machine, along with an occasional oiling, will keep it working well. Your machine and chair should be of the right height to prevent strain and fatigue. Usually a machine 28 inches high and a chair 16 inches high are comfortable. Furniture cups may be used to raise the machine to your best height.

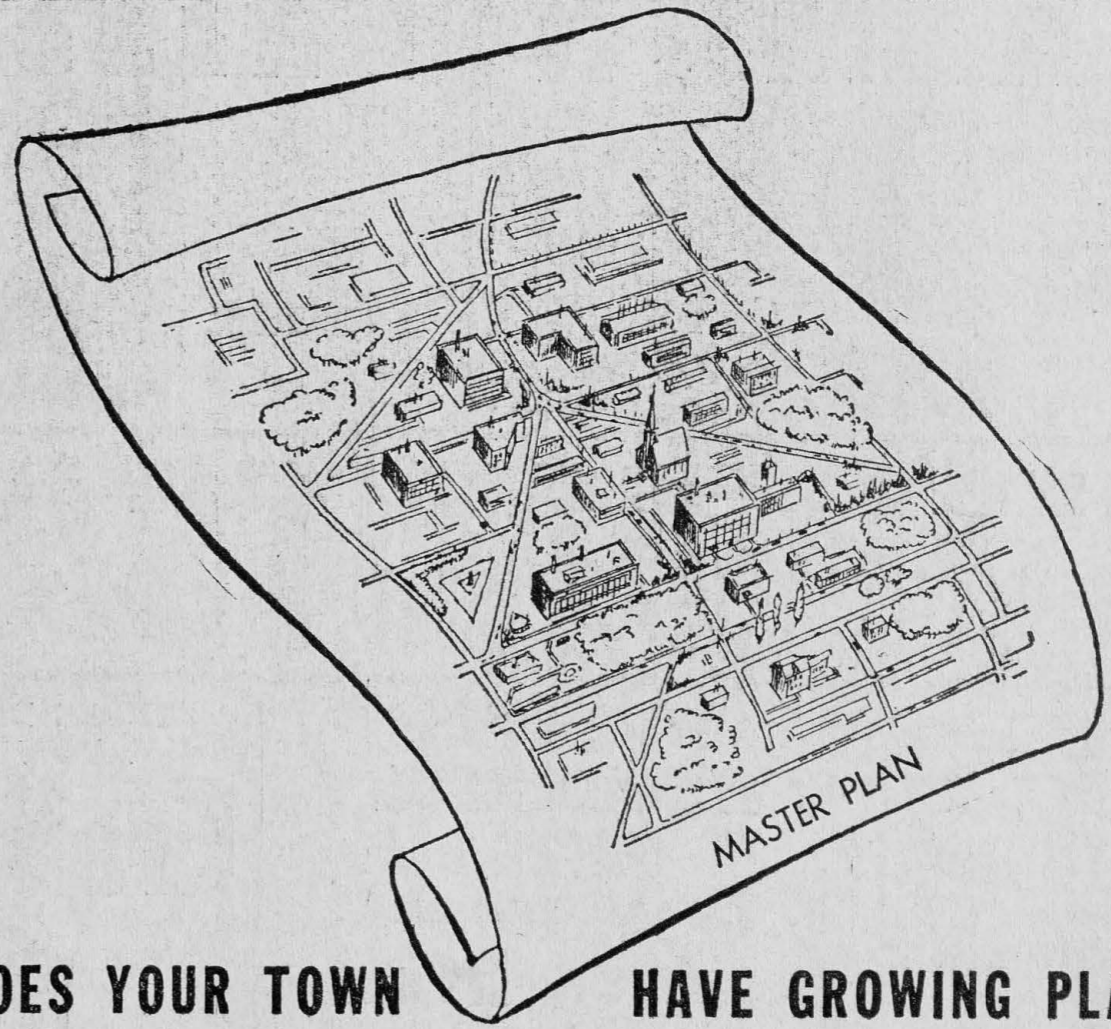

Unmarked Cars To Be Replaced

Semimarked State Police patrol cars will replace unmarked cars on highway patrol to increase the hours of effective traffic law enforcement and reduce nighttime accidents.

For a number of years unmarked cars have been used to supplement the regular blue and gold marked cars, but their operation was restricted to daytime operation as the only identification was that of the uniformed officer.

The semimarked car has the reflectorized State Police shield on both door panels and the stop light on the hood, but there are no other exterior markings. It is equipped with a portable oscillating red light with a magnetic base to place on the top when stopped for an accident or other emergency.

The cars are standard colors and have regular license plates. Regular patrol cars have State Police gold and blue plates.

They were first used on an experimental basis in high nighttime accident areas such as Flint, Lansing, Flat Rock and Pontiac and are now being gradually extended to other areas and will replace the unmarked fleet.

Semimarked cars have proved very successful in checking the willful type of violator who observes the law only when a marked patrol car is in sight. The semimarked cars cannot be identified as police cruisers from either the front or rear, but are easily recognized from the sides when they come into view of a motorist's headlights.

Half the fatal accidents at night occur on rural highways. Although the traffic volume drops, the percentage of speed law violations is considerably higher and there are many more run-off-road single car accidents.

Foreign Languages For Grade Schools Is MSU Proposal

Better foreign language teaching in Michigan schools is the goal of a new program proposed by language professors at Michigan State University.

Improved teacher training and language study for grade school youngsters are key elements in the new plan.

The M. S. U. proposal calls for new courses in the university's Evening College and Summer School, a summer workshop and ways of supplying teachers with the latest in teaching aids and information.

Four main objectives of the proposal were outlined by the M. S. U. foreign language educational committee. They are:

To prepare foreign language teachers to fulfill the increasing demand for their services in both grade and high schools.

To offer a master's degree combining education and foreign language work.

To make the master's degree available through the Evening College or Summer School.

To provide courses for the staff and general public.

The plan calls for intensive courses in first and second year French, Spanish and German, conversation and literary masterpiece courses in these languages and special courses for teachers who have had the basic requirements.

Another part of the proposal calls for an information bureau on foreign languages at M. S. U., sending speakers to meetings of the P. T. A. and similar groups, starting a library of tape recordings to be loaned to teachers, and inviting teachers to attend classes.

Group Test Given to Detect Hearing Loss

Group tests to find previously undetected cases of hearing loss have been given to 2,052,942 Michigan school children since 1942, the Michigan Department of Health revealed today in a 15th anniversary report on Michigan's state-local hearing conservation program.

Michigan's first group screening by a locally employed technician

was done in Isabella County in the fall of 1943. This year, 60 such technicians are working in all parts of the state and will screen about 350,000 school children. Group technicians are paid by schools, local health departments and other local organizations.

When the Michigan hearing conservation program was started 15 years ago, 4.02 per cent of the children were found to have hearing defects. In 1957-58, the defect rate was 2.2 per cent.

Courtney D. Osborn, chief of hearing conservation for the state health department, attributes this improvement in part to the hearing conservation program and also to improved surgical and medical methods for treating hearing defects.

Of every 10,000 children given group screening, 50 to 75 are found to have losses that handicap or can't be corrected medically. These children, depending on their type of loss, may be given hearing

aids, special training, or may be referred to another agency such as the Michigan School for the Deaf. Hearing specialists from the Michigan Department of Health perform or help provide consultant services for these children.

Children who must wear hearing aids can attend short courses that teach them how to wear and use the aid. These courses have been conducted at the Michigan School for the Deaf since 1950. The state began to purchase hearing aids for

medically indigent children in 1947 and since then has purchased 463 aids.

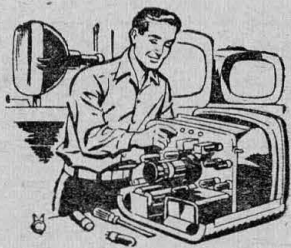

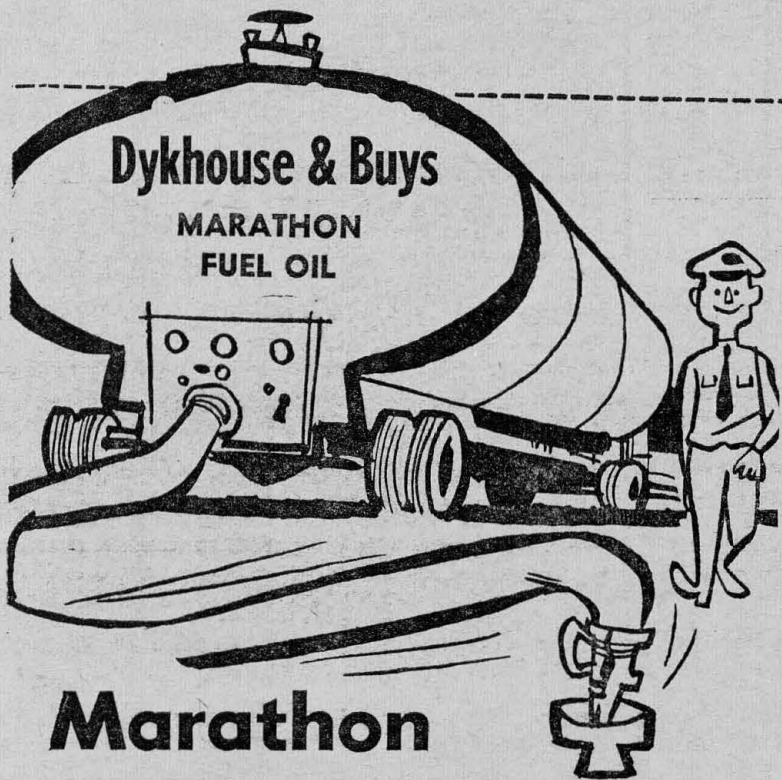
