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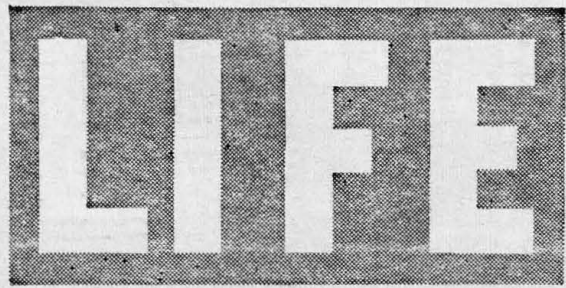

## Richard Matthews Attends United Nations Seminar

Richard Matthews, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Edmund Matthews, 1550 Thornapple River Dr. S. E., and a Sophomore at Western Michigan University, has been elected to attend the Christian Citizenship Seminar for students at the United Nations. This is sponsored by the W. S. C. S. (Women's Society Christian Service) and the Methodist Michigan Student Movement. Students from all Universities in Michigan were eligible, and from this group, Richard was elected.

He will be at the United Nations from February 14 through February 17, and in Washington D. C., from February 18 through February 21, where he has appointments with our State Senators and Representatives.

There will be a visit to the Soviet Embassy; an address by Dean Ernest S. Griffiths, School of International Service, American University; a talk by Justice Harold Burton; a talk on "Reorganization of Welfare Services" by the Honorable Arthur Fleming, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare; "Implementation of Civil Rights Legislation" by Gordon Tiffany, Staff Director, the President's Commission on Civil Rights; "Segregation and Desegregation in the South" by the Honorable Everett Jordan, Senator from North Carolina; "The U. S. Defense Policy" by the Honorable Donald A. Quarles, Deputy Secretary of Defense; he will attend the Opening of Congress. "An Appraisal of U. S. ## Lowell to Vote Feb. 24 School Addition

The electors residing in the Lowell school district will vote on a \$160,000 bonding proposal on February 24, between the hours of 7 a. m. and 8 p. m., in the village hall located at the corner of Main and Monroe Streets in Lowell. If the proposal passes, the funds will be used to add eight rooms to the Runceiman Elementary building, and to add to the site or sites. Although the proposal would authorize the Board of Education to increase the fifteen mill limitation by four mills, it was pointed out that this would not be necessary and that this issue of bonds and the existing issue on the Runceiman building would both be retired within the five mills already being levied—and within a twelve year period.

The total indebtedness of the district would be \$350,000—or less than five percent of the existing state equalized assessed valuation of the district.

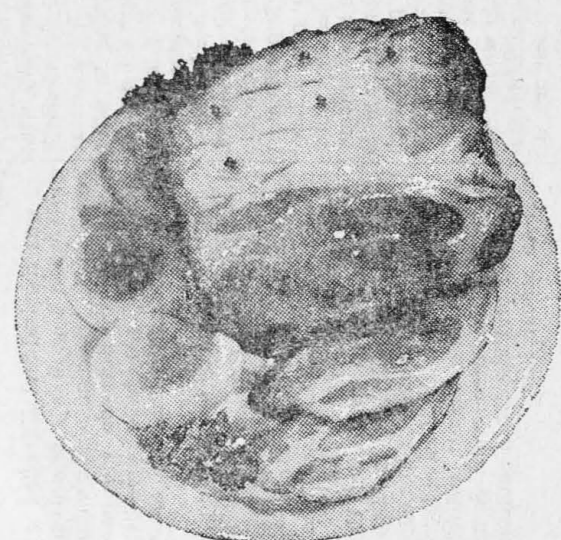

## Letter to Editor

Dear Editor of Suburban Life:

Permit me to speak out in defense of one of the best friends Cascade Township has ever had. **An Open Letter to All Cascade Township  
 Citizens**

I feel very strongly that in asking for your support for public office, I must also state my views on the various issues affecting Cascade Township. Since it would obviously be impossible for me to visit with each of you in your homes, and the possibility of open forums has been ruled out, this open letter is the only means left to accomplish that purpose.

Cascade Township is an area of peaceful, pleasant family living with good homes in a rural suburban atmosphere. A wonderful place in which to live, raise our families and enjoy scenic beauty and recreational advantages. It must always remain thus although I feel that improvements can be made in road conditions, safety measures to protect our children and, in general, make this a still better place in which to live.

Of the total county taxes paid by each taxpayer, only 7.12 percent is used for the maintenance, operation and upkeep of Cascade township. The remaining 92.88 percent is for county and county welfare, handicapped children, school operating and debt service. This 92.88 percent of your tax dollar is beyond the control of the township board or supervisor. The 7.12 percent of your tax dollar is for the township budget which is made up annually by the township board. All taxpayers have the right to express their views and ideas on expenditures at the annual meeting. In other words, it is only the taxpayers themselves through their vote or their duly elected officials who can set the budget and thus determine the amount of TOWNSHIP tax dollars each should pay.

An article recently published in Suburban Life clearly stated

that the Kent County Dept. of Equalization will conduct a study of assessments in Cascade Township this spring. Mr. Harold Linn, Director of the department, stated "Selection of the property to be checked is by the equalizing investigators. No local person has any part in selecting these sample units. A large number of units are checked in all areas of the township to give a clear picture of the overall assessment. This will be used in setting up the equalization for the next year." This assures the taxpayer of a FAIR assessment equalization study with no local person involved. Also this study will take place regardless of the outcome of the coming election.

In business, in our personal family lives and especially in community government, I feel it is essential to have a sound, long range plan for the future good of all. Therefore it is necessary to have a planning commission of qualified, interested citizens to help guide the township board in their decisions and planning for the future.

There is a strong possibility that the airport question will be placed on the April ballot for a decision by the entire population of Kent County. IF it is the wish of the Kent County voters as a whole and IF the present Kent County Board of Supervisors insist upon the Cascade site, then I feel that it is the obligation of our elected township officials to make maximum use of the tax benefits this would bring. Extra tax dollars paid by airport facilities and buildings would help relieve the tax burden on all taxpayers in Cascade township.
