WHEREAS, said Consumers Power Company has heretofore filed its written acceptance of said franchise, and has requested that the question of confirming the grant thereof be submitted to the qualified electors of the Township, at a special election to be held for that purpose, and has also paid to the Township Board the estimated expense of holding such special election; and,

WHEREAS, there has been heretofore filed with said Board, a petition signed by at least twelve electors, requesting that a special township meeting and election be

called for such purpose;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to resolutions adopted by said Board, notice is hereby given that a special meeting and election will be held in said Township at Precinct No. 1: Cascade Township Hall; Precinct No. 2: Cascade Fire Station on Wednesday the 24th day of June, 1959, for the purpose of voting on the confirmation of the action of said Township Board in granting such franchise.

The polls of said election will be opened at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and will be held open until 8 o'clock p. m., Eastern Standard Time. The Township Clerk will be in her office on the 25th day of May, 1959, said date being the thirtieth day, as determined by statute, preceding the date of said election, for the purpose of reviewing the registration, and registering such of the qualified electors of the Township as shall appear and apply therefor, which registration may be made on said date between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 8 o'clock p. m., Eastern Standard Time.

Said franchise as granted by said Board is on file with the undersigned Township Clerk for the purpose of inspection by the qualified electors.

LOOKING IN ON OUR TV News

This has been a week for visiting in the Junior High, and I apologize for not having visited Mr. Spoelman at Martin school. These Junior High activities came up suddenly, and I will surely call on Mr. Spoelman next week.

Beside being Athletic Director of the High School, Ed Shy teaches English in the eighth grade. For the past three weeks his pupils have studied our two new states: Alaska and Hawaii. They completed this study by making individual notebooks containing as much information, maps, pictures etc., on these states as they could gather. I was invited in to see these books and meet some of the boys and girls who took part in this project.

I always enjoy talking to the students, and this class of about thirty seemed very enthusiastic about our new states. From what they had learned by studying Alaska and Hawaii they all hoped to visit these lands some day. They felt sure that now these states are an official part of the United States the highway to Alaska and transportation to Hawaii will eventually be made more accessible to the average citizen. Most of the students preferred to go to Hawaii because of its climate, beaches, music, and culture.

Roy Charters particularly likes Hawaii. He would like to see the natives build canoes and make other things by hand. Claudia Spooner rather favored Hawaii, but Sue Baker, whose aunt recently visited Fairbanks, Alaska, thinks she might like to go there, at least for a trip.

Notebooks Reveal Talent
After talking about these states, I spent the rest of the time looking at the very fine assortment of notebooks, each so individually done. Judy Beaty included population charts in her book, and Larry Merchant's was neatly typed and contained many pictures. Both Carmine Pugliese and Sandra Wenger took great care with their covers, displaying artistic ability and fine lettering.

Sue Baker charted her aunt's trip to Alaska on road maps which she included in her notebook. Ina VanLoon and Denny Bolhuis showed that they had spent many hours gathering all the information for their notebooks. Susan Jarvi and Nancy Woodall both had a similar idea. They wrote to Congressman Jerry Ford and Ralph J. Rivers who is the Congressman-at-Large from Alaska. Each of these girls received maps and tour guides, the statehood bill, and two pamphlets entitled "This is Hawaii" and "Alaska." These items made interesting and valuable additions to their notebooks, and they both had the experience of writing to and receiving mail from a congressman.

After visiting this class I would think this has been a memorable study for these eighth graders.

Junior High Assembly
Following Mr. Shy's English class I went to the gymnasium, where chairs had been set in place for a Junior High Assembly. This assembly was held under the combined direction of the English teachers in the seventh and eighth grades for a poetry speaking contest. Each pupil had chosen a poem that he memorized. In the classrooms the pupils had voted for certain finalists, and from these the winners were chosen at the assembly.

Mr. VanLandingham and Mrs. Clarence Browder, the art teacher, were the judges, and I was happy to be writing about the contest instead of judging it. This is always a difficult task. The contestants were judged on this basis: 3 points for diction, 3 points for understanding, and 3 points for variety of voice so that the poem was made more interesting to listen to. Books were given for prizes.

Interesting Contest

The Mistress of Ceremonies was Margo Morse. She carefully introduced each contestant and told the name of his poem. Jim Buschman led off with his rendition of "Casey at the Bat." He told this poem with poise and expression. Mary Hoover gave "Beyond the Spanish Main" with fine diction. It was a pleasure to hear every word. Nancy Fites showed good memory work with a very long poem, "The Highwayman." Lynne DeVos did an excellent job with her delivery in her poem, "Report Card," and she was followed by Carolyn Thomas who recited "Children's Party" very well. Other seventh graders who competed were Ann Sytsma, Mike May, and Bob Burkhead.

In the eighth grade Larry Merchant gave "The Charge of the Light Brigade" and Howard Aylesworth delighted his audience with "Alumnus Football." Other renditions were given by Brenda Reintges, Jane Hillman, and Sue Baker. Then in another section of the program the Prelude to "Evangeline" was given by Roger Hargesty, Donna Edison, and Susan Stovall. The climax of the assembly was reached when the winners were announced by Mr. Doele. In the seventh grade first place was awarded to Lynn DeVos, while Jim Buschman received second place recognition. In the eighth grade Howard Aylesworth won first place in the free choice classification, and Donna Edison was awarded first place for her delivery of "Evangeline." It was indeed a pleasure to have been invited to

attend this interesting assembly.

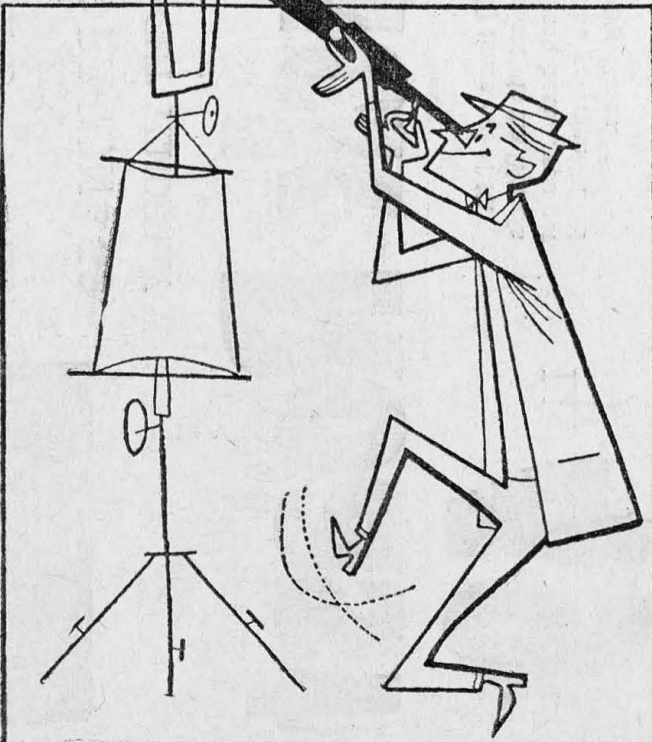

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Mrs. Matthew Verhil To Head Fluoride Committee

Dr. W. B. Prothro, City-County Health Officer announced May 13, the formation of a Kent County Central Fluoride Committee. Dr. Prothro said that the new group is composed of the fluoride chairmen of each of the 15 individual community programs organizing a series of topical application of fluoride treatments to children's teeth.

Dr. Prothro said, "The summer topical fluoride program is a state-wide program administered by the Dental Division of the Michigan Department of Health in cooperation with the Grand Rapids-Kent County Health Departments. It is

a series of four applications of a 2 percent aqueous solution of sodium fluoride. The first treatment is preceded by a cleansing of the teeth, the other three treatments consist of the application of the fluoride. Students from the University of Michigan School of Dentistry and Dental Hygiene and University of Detroit Schools of Dentistry and Dental Hygiene will give the applications."

Dr. Prothro said that the Central Fluoride Committee was formed to better administer the preparation, scheduling, promotion and education of the programs in the community. It is also hoped that the Central Fluoride Committee will be in a stronger position to purchase the necessary equipment for carrying out the program.

'Suicide' Topic For Talk

Suicide, one of the five leading causes of death in Michigan in the age group "15 through 44 years" will be the subject of a talk by Kenneth E. Pitts, psychiatrist with the Detroit Receiving Hospital on Thursday, May 21, at 8 p. m. at the Morton House Hotel auditorium.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Kent County Chapter of the Michigan Society for Mental Health and will be open to the general public at no charge, according to Harold E. Samuelson, Chapter president.

The title of Dr. Pitts' talk will be "Suicide—Why? Samuelson said that Dr. Pitts has been closely associated with an intensive study on the background of cases of suicide brought to Detroit Receiving Hospital.

As a result of the long study at the Detroit hospital, Dr. Pitts and other Detroit hospital researchers have formulated the new "rescue theory" of suicide, according to Samuelson. The theory, he said, involves the subconscious belief on the part of the victim that rescue will take place even though every effort is made on the part of the victim to make the suicide successful. Dr. Pitts will also discuss the phenomena of a greater number of suicides during prosperity as contrasted to a recession period.

Samuelson said that the local Mental Health Chapter is bringing Dr. Pitts to Grand Rapids as part of the chapter's year-round educational program. Latest figures indicate that suicide is the fourth leading cause of death in Michigan in the age group "25 through 34 years." It is the fifth leading cause of death in the age groups "15 to 24 and 35 to 44."

Dr. Pitts is a graduate of the Washington University Medical School in St. Louis, Missouri, served his internship at University Hospital in Ann Arbor and served his residency at Ypsilanti State Hospital in 1952. He is presently a staff psychiatrist at Detroit Receiving Hospital and serves as a consultant to the Child Guidance Clinic in Grand Rapids, the Detroit House of Correction, the McGregor Center Child Out-Patient Department and at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Ann Arbor.

Citizens Committee Asks Approval of Additional Operation Money for School

A Letter from the Citizens' Advisory Committee to the Voters of the Forest Hills School District:

The Citizens' Advisory Committee has recommended to the Board of Education that money should be raised to continue the improvement of our school system. This recommendation has been made because of numerous requests by parents and parent groups for additional staff, higher teacher salaries to attract and keep top flight teachers, and improved academic and athletic facilities for the Elementary and High School system.

Since the existing operating taxes and State funds are not sufficient to finance this improvement program, the Board of Education decided that the taxpayers of the Forest Hills School District should be given the opportunity to vote whether the necessary funds should be provided. Among the proposals for improvements, the following items are considered to be very important to keep our schools up to the high standards which so many of you desire:

1. Employ additional staff for art, music, physical education, audio-visual instruction, corrective reading, guidance and testing, especially in the elementary schools.
2. Increase teachers' salaries.
3. Provide the following materials and facilities:
 - A. High School library books at least to the extent required by the University of Michigan and the North Central Association.
 - B. Dictionaries, supplementary readers, library books, music books, art and science supplies, etc. for each elementary school building.
 - C. Globes, maps, charts, filmstrips, microscopes, workbenches, audio-visual aids, kindergarten equipment, library furniture, etc., for the Elementary buildings.
 - D. Athletic fields.
 - E. Improved grounds around all buildings, including leveling, spreading gravel, installing limited hard surfaces, fences.
 - F. Playground equipment to meet actual needs.
 - G. Some other items such as making up for any deficit caused by failure of the State to provide its expected revenue.

The cost of this improvement program is large in total, but, if spread over a number of years, it becomes reasonable and well within the community's ability to pay. Specifically, the maximum annual cost of the program to you as a taxpayer will be about \$10 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. On June 8, 1959, the Annual School Election will be held and

at that time you will be asked to approve a tax of up to five (5) mills for five (5) years on the State Equalized valuation of your property. This means that the Board of Education would be able to adjust the tax to the actual cost of the improvement program each year, but in no case can the tax be more than the 5 mills in any one year.

The Improvement Program and Tax Plan outlined above has the full support of the Citizens' Advisory Committee and many other members of the community. Because this is your program, we urge you to vote "YES" at the June 8 election.

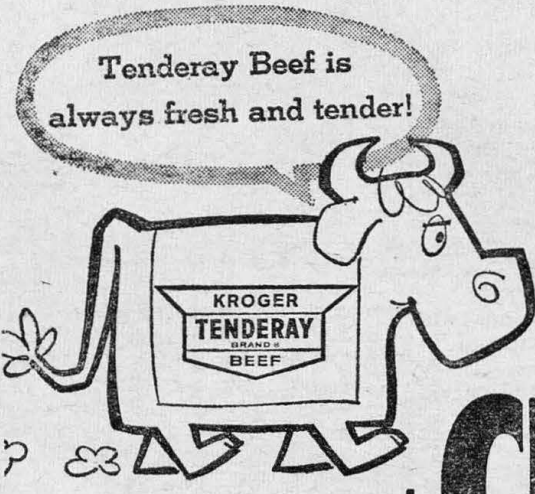

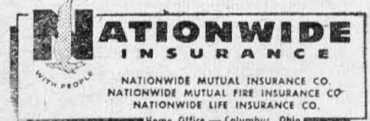
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
