Communities With Sound Growth Plans Will Attract Industry

'Communities with sound plans Bagby believes Industrial Parks for the future are more likely to should provide large areas for bas-

Scott Bagby, former Grand Rapids City Planner and now planning consultant for several other Michigan communities, made this comment recently after seeing advance proofs of an advertisement entitled "Have We Planned For Growth?", which appears in this newspaper today.

"After all," Bagby said, "industry puts a great deal of emphasis on planning and it only makes sense that an industry looking for a plant location will pick the community that has planned for growth over one that hasn't, all other factors being equal.'

Bagby is a strong advocate of the development of Industrial Parks-large protected areas where new industry may locate and will have adequate room to expand.

"For years, builders have platted areas for new housing develop-Bagby said. shouldn't the same thing be done for industry rather than locate new plants in a helter-skelter pattern?

"It's important for industries to be located near each other so they out having to truck materials and as a public service. supplies great distances."





Health Dept. Insists All Water Be Treated

Water from lakes, streams and springs may be contaminated even in the heart of the deepest forest and shouldn't be used by humans without being boiled or treated

The Michigan Department of Health said today that water can appear to be clear as a crystal and at the same time contain thousands of deadly germs so small they can be seen only with a micro-

Even when there are no human sources of contamination, germs can get into water through wild animals and birds, the department

To make water safe for human use, the department recommended processing it in any one of the following ways:

1-Add three drops of any standard laundry bleach to one gallon of clear water and let stand for 30 minutes.

2-Add three drops of tincture of iodine to one quart of clear water and let stand for 30 minutes.

Diseases that can be spread by water include typhoid fever, other intestinal diseases, tularemia and infectious hepatitis.

All surface and ground water should be boiled or treated before being used for drinking, cooking brushing the teeth or washing dishes, the department said.







Hints For An Easier Ironing Day

Planning to do your ironing today? Here's one sound advice that can make the job faster and easier. It comes from extension specialists in home management at Michigan State University,

In the first place, why iron everything? Such things as bed linens, towels, and knitwear can be left just as they are when taken from the clothesline or dryer. Simply straighten them as you hang them up, or, if you use a dryer,

remove them before they are bone dry. Smooth them out before they finish drying.

In setting up an ironing center make sure there's convenient storage nearby for ironing equipment and supplies. Besides an adjustable ironing board and comfortable chair, your ironing center should include a laundry basket, table and clothes rack.

By the way, have you tried sitting while you iron? You'll save energy if you do, say the experts. If you usually stand, it may take a little practice to learn to sit.

Place your ironing equipment around you in such a way that work will flow easily. You should be able to reach everything from your seated position.

Your work will be easier if you use both hands when ironing. You can arrange, smooth, and fold clothes with one hand while you iron with the other. You can also learn to handle the iron in your left hand for parts of the job.

You don't have to lift the iron to an iron-stand everytime it is necessary to set it down. If you pause for just a moment to smooth or move a garment, rest your iron at the point where you last used it instead of returning it to the right end of the board.

While you're ironing, move the finished section away from you. It's best to use long rhythmic strokes, ironing with the lengthwise grain of the fabric.

Make sure each ironed section is perfectly dry before starting the next section. There's no need to press hard; let heat and moisture do the work for you.

Let the ironed clothes dry thoroughly before you fold them and put them away. You may also want to sort clothes as you iron and fold; in this way, you'll save time putting them away.





SOIL and WATER **CONSERVATION**

We've had a pleasant time assisting Emil Kober & Sons, Sparta with their basic conservation soil and water farm plan. The Kobers were former Ottawa District Cooperators and therefore were very much interested in a farm plan for their new location.

Son, David takes an active part in the Holstein herd management. The eradication of orchard grass in their hayfields and the production of alfalfa-brome-ladino instead is one of their goals. Birdsfoot trefoil is planned for some of their pasture land. Contour strips and field strips will be used where needed

We found both the Kobers and their neighbors, the Norm Bradfords, "plow planting" corn at the same time. Discing and field cultivating sod previous to plowing makes for easier plowing and less loose surface sods to interfere with planting and cultivating.

Unseasonable, above average, early June temperatures have brought on many grassy corn fields. Hay is ready to cut and corn must be cultivated. Cooperators who have planted corn in the rear tire tracks have found the first cultivation can wait a few weeks and they can turn to that "first Pre mergence weed cutting." sprays, applied at planting time, have also paid off.

The hot weather was good "haying weather." Gerald Kayser, NE Kent Director from Caledonia, cut his first hay May 30, and baled top quality hay. Director Milton Wylie, of Tyrone Twp., cut an excellent first year alfalfa crop on June 5. A hay crusher speeds up the curing time for Milton, Many Kent farms report heavier hay yields as compared with last year's first cutting.

Mrs. Jim Cook, "associate" farm manager of the Thomas and Cook, Lowell Twp., dairy farm says that their new Birdsfoot trefoil mixed seeding produced over three tons of grass silage per acre last week. They draw about five tons per truck load. Their front end side unloader moves grass silage quickly to the blower conveyor. Mrs. Cook mentioned that much of the hay they have purchased other years, with a few exceptions, did not provide top milk production since it was cut too late, and die not have the feed value in it.


Thomas and Cook add molasses to most of their grass silage. They report milk production from their grass silage equals that from corn

Vernie Groenke, Tyrone Twp., has installed over 50 acres of field strips, 84 feet wide on the west side of Barber Creek Road, Section 15.



Surgery Helps Many Restore Their Hearing

Modern surgical advances are helping many deaf persons regain normal hearing, say two specialists from The University of Michigan Medical Center.

Dr. John Magielski and Dr. Merle Lawrence (Ph.D.) of the Department of Otolaryngology report that many hearing problems can be corrected by surgery if the cause lies in certain parts of the ear.

If the difficulty lies in the external ear canal, ear drum or a part of the middle ear, hearing can often be restored. "But surgery is useless," the doctors point sound waves to the brain is not functioning properly."

In normal hearing, sound waves vibrate through several chambers to reach the inner ear. Then auditory nerves carry the signal to the brain. An interruption anywhere along this chain can create a hearing problem.

The simplest form of hearing interference is a bone blocking the external ear canal, sometimes can create a new entrance for the

Enlarged or infected adenoids often back up fluid in the middle ear and cause a hearing loss. The surgeon can correct this problem by removing the adenoids and draining the fluid through a small incision in the ear drum.

Other operations deal with detures behind it in the middle ear, ficiently, the ear drum should be intact and skin grafts are sometimes used by otolaryngologists to repair any punctures.

Surgeons can also reconstruct other defective parts of the ear, but have been unsuccessful in correcting damage to the nerve itself. Your physician can determine the kind of hearing loss you have

Get names and addresses of witnesses.


Make notes of pertinent details that may be useful later.
