#### No New License Plates Issued in '60

Judging from inquiries at 250 Michigan Department of State Branch Offices there are many people in Michigan who are not aware that they will NOT have new license plates in 1960.

Instead, starting on November 1, 1959, owners of passenger vehicles will, when registering, get a metal 3¼ by 1½ inches in size, tab. which is affixed to the upper right hand corner of the 1959 license plate

The tab carries a serial number etched in the metal and the number '60 in green on a golden yellow background. This is the reverse of the 1959 plates which carry yellow numerals and letters on a green background. The serial numbers will not be identical with the twoletter four-digit county-designated license plates but will run numerically starting at 1001. According to Secretary of State, James M. Hare, the low numbers will be shipped to Upper Peninsula branches and the highest numbers, which run into seven digits, will be sold in Wayne. County branch offices.

"Production on these tabs is well under way at Jackson Prison," Hare said

"Inasmuch as a new law passed by the Legislature this year calls for completely reflectorized plates in 1961, we will not be able to use the 1959 plates for three years as we had originally intended," Hare added. "It was our goal to save a quarter of a million dollars over

Many Republicans are taking another look at State Senator Carlton H. Morris of Kalamazoo, figuring that a new party chief is emerging from the GOP tax victory.

Morris is being mentioned as a possible candidate for the nomination for Governor, Some of Paul Bagwell's most ardent supporters are wondering whether the Kalamazoo Senator would not be a strong candidate for United States Senator.

For it was Morris who held Republican legislators together during the dangerous weeks when many leaders were ready to surrender to Gov, Williams by enacting a corporation income tax.

In the end, victory resulted from teamwork that had been lacking St. Clair, the caucus chairman, ty work, made the compromise possible by insisting on tax relief for the small O. 
But in command of the long battle was Senator Morris, who was given control of the tax bills by Senator Clyde H. Geerlings, of Holland, chairman of the tax committee, in a generous gesture of party loyalty.

Morris arrived in the Senate in January, 1949, when Gov. Williams was starting his first term. Unlike many first termers, he remained quietly in the background-a handsome six-footer who appeared from the start to have qualities of statesmanship.

For 11 legislative sessions, I had a desk on the Senate floor facing Senator Morris and only 12 feet Yet he remained somedistant. what of a stranger. He never sought publicity. He never volunteered information, although he would answer questions readily if able. He was not a part of the nightly political gatherings in the cocktail bars.

At work in the Senate committee rooms, he was a nervous floorpacer, a chain smoker of cigarettes; sometimes quick tempered when the road was rough, but always just as quick with an apologetic smile.







When we picked up Chicago we were in the midst of a "restricted area", the Pan-American sailing were slugging it out, and a races beautiful sight it was. When we came into the harbor at Belmont, over the loud speaker boomed a voice, "Ahoy Heather! Welcome!" In the midst of all the excitement of a busy Sunday afternoon, with all these sailors from the two Americas, and all those boats, fellow yachtsmen recognized and welcomed us. We had a wonderful time visiting with friends we had made while cruising these last few years And David enjoyed practicing his conversational Spanish on the Chilenos and Columbians.

There are no guest moorings in this harbor, and we are moved from one mooring to another whose owner is away on vacation. During these few days we are here the skipper is working on his strip, making business calls, getting needed gear and information; we shop, and we "socialize." Relatives and friends make us welcome, feed us and show us a good time, their movies, and we are thoroughly enjoying our stay here.

Friday we start down the Illinois waterway, and we will be on our way once more.
