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Highway Dept. Announces Expressway Construct'n in Cascade; Build Rest Area

Two contracts calling for slightly more than four miles of US-16 expressway and four structures to 28th St. These four miles will connect at Whitneyville rd. with the 41 mile stretch now in use westerly from M 100 in Clinton county.

One contract will provide two miles of expressway, two structures, and a rest area from Whitneyville rd. westerly to Thornapple River dr. Completion date—June 30, 1961. Bids will be taken February 17.

Build Rest Area

The rest area will be located north of the expressway just east of Thornapple River dr. and will

serve westbound traffic only. The area will be about five acres and will have parking facilities for approximately 20 trucks and 55 automobiles. Other facilities in the area include telephones, sanitary facilities and an information bulletin board.

Structures on this section are: **Thornapple River**—A dual bridge to carry the expressway over the river. It will be 440 feet long and will carry two 30 foot roadways separated by a 60 foot open median. **Thornapple River dr.**—A grade separation to carry Thornapple River dr. over the expressway. It will be 289 feet long and will carry a 26 foot roadway.

The second Kent county job calls for two miles of US-16 expressway and two structures from Thornapple River westerly to 28th St. Completion date—June 30, 1961.

Structures on this section are: **Kraft rd.**—A grade separation to carry Kraft rd. over the expressway. It will be 302 feet long and will carry a 26 foot roadway. **28th st.**—A dual structure to carry the expressway over 28th st. Each will be 264 feet long and will carry two 30 foot roadways.

The C. Y. F. banquet will be held at the Central Christian Church for the price of 65c, and will be served at 5:30 p. m.

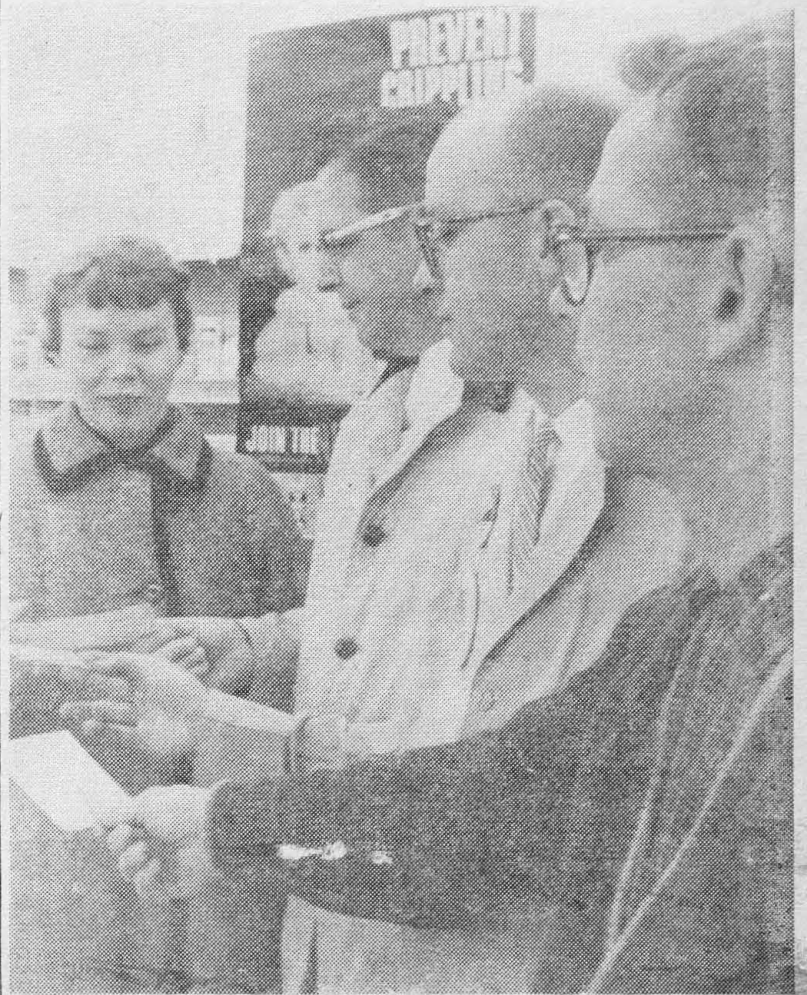

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Teaching Use of Leisure Time Requirement For Modern Living

After man has earned his daily bread, he begins to seek ways to occupy his leisure time and develop his creative abilities. Archaeologists uncover evidence that ancient man also faced this problem. While no written records remain, we learn of them through a study of the artistic objects and the musical folk lore they have left behind. Consequently, art expression and music are as much a part of man's needs as are his reading and writing skills.

Perhaps, we can best illustrate this by this story. Mandy was industriously chopping wood while Mose was leisurely sipping soda in the hammock in the shade. When asked why this arrangement, Mandy replied, "Well, I'se makes the livin', but Mose makes the livin' worth while."

Few are the people who do not enjoy an attractive design, a well-proportioned ceramic piece, a colorful picture, a comfortable, well-designed home. Few people do not enjoy music, whether classical, pop or rock-and-roll.

In schools, the arts classes (including music) are included to furnish students and others an opportunity to find a way to express their creativity in a constructive manner. The classes are introduced to a wealth of media to try. Without these opportunities, many people never develop their latent creative skills. They never realize their fullest potential.

Studies by sociologists reveal that very few of our juvenile delinquents and convicts have any hobbies or creative outlets for their energies.

Art and music classes are not the total answer to this problem. They furnish only an opportunity. If they would save one potential

delinquent a year, they would more than return the cost.

It would be a dull, drab society if we removed music and the artistic from our midst. Perhaps one could say the Arts are the things that raise man above the status of animals because they are expressions of man's soul, his spirit, his creativity. They must come to us from our Creator because only man has this means of expression.

In Forest Hills, the Fine Arts program is this:

(a) Junior High Band, Senior High Band, Music Sectionals which meet during scheduled periods once a week. As time merits, an orchestra can become a part of the curriculum.

(b) General Art for all students. This involves experiences in everything one could call art which it is possible to provide for our students with present facilities. Advanced Art for those who have more talent and who wish to develop this talent for their own benefit.

(c) Choir for all who wish to study vocal music, music history and music appreciation.

Early in the spring, the teachers of these areas will present a program where you as patrons will see the results and values of the instruction.

School Construction Continued at High Level During 1959

During 1959 a high level of school construction, both public and non-public, was maintained with projects approved in 59 of Michigan's 83 counties, according to a report released by the Department of Public Instruction's Division of Administrative Services.

Last year plans were approved for public school construction of 240 elementary school projects totaling 1,713 classrooms and 140 secondary school projects for 1,460 classrooms. In addition, five projects totaling 101 classrooms were approved in public higher education institutions locally operated or governed through the State Board of Education.

Non-Public Schools

In this same period plans were approved for non-public school construction of 61 elementary school projects, 331 classrooms; 19 secondary school projects, 184 classrooms; and eight projects totaling 58 classrooms in non-public institutions of higher education. Non-public school construction was carried on by five different religiously oriented groups and by two non-religious corporations.

Other construction included 168 multipurpose rooms, 145 public—23 non-public; 155 lunch program kitchens, 131 public—24 non-public; 62 gymnasiums, 53 public—9 non-public; 20 auditoriums, 18 public—2 non-public; and 10 swimming pools, all public.

The report also stated that over 80 percent of all secondary and 90 percent of all elementary facilities constructed was of one story height. It is only in areas of high population density where adequate sites are at a premium that multi-story schools are being built in any volume.

GRAND SLAM

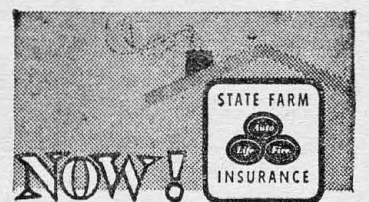

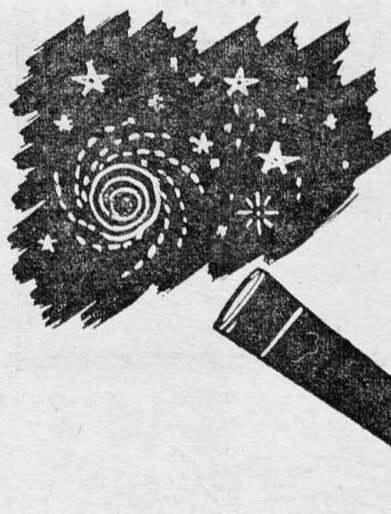

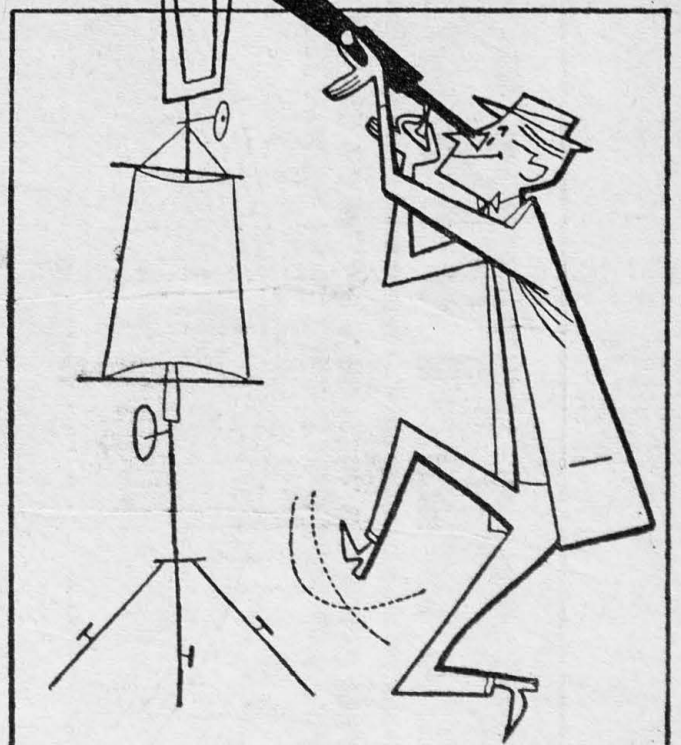

On Monday, February 1, there will be a Safety assembly at the Forest Hills High School put on by the Kent County Sheriff's Department.

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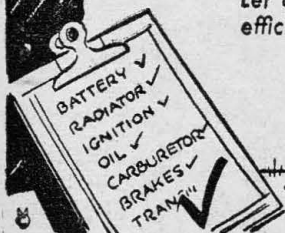
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
