Pancake Supper to Raise Funds for School Equipment at Cascade

Little Red Schoolhouse Still a Good Idea

Superintendent, Harold S. Chambers, who recently attended the Superintendent's convention in Atlantic City, heard much about the return to teaching school on the plan similar to that of the former one room schools.

Research has proven that children learn well from each other. In the one room schools, each child heard older children recite and discuss history and other subjects as many as seven years in succession. Often the older students helped the teacher give instruction to the younger ones. It is almost axiomatic that the best way to learn is to teach someone else.

In Terrance, California, experiments have been conducted during the past five years with what has been called The Little Red School House Plan. In this plan, 33 children, including 11 each of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grades, are taught in one room by a teacher who teaches all subjects, including music, art, and physical education. The first grade children stay with this teacher three years. The 4th, 5th and 6th grade children are organized in the same manner.

In this plan, children are not taught by grades but by groups. A second grader may be learning arithmetic with third graders prizes to be given away on the while learning to read with first night of the dinner.

The Little Red School House idea is based on the fact that children are not alike. They do not learn to read, write, or work with numbers at the same age. Every aspect of their lives and abilities grows with varying speeds.

By putting those children of the 3rd grade, who are behind, in with some of the first grade, all will learn together. Also, by putting the quick learners of the first grade in with some of the third grade, all are learning on their level. It makes sense.

Good teaching is accomplished when individual differences are recognized and instructional techniques organized accordingly.

Some Elementary teachers in Forest Hills have expressed a desire to work along the pattern of the Little Red School House Plan.

Accent of Future School System Will Be Learning

of education which will shape schools of the future was advanced at the Southwest Michigan School Administrators Conference Feb. 8 at Michigan State Univer-

"Today the accent in the schools is on teaching," declared Dr. Archibald Shaw, editor of "Overview Magazine," New York City. 'Tomorrow the accent will be on learning.'

Dr. Shaw explained that, while "teaching and learning are two sides of the same coin," there is a world of difference between the two concepts.

"Now, the educational system is set up for the convenience of the teacher," he stated. "Students are taught by groups-but they learn individually."

"In the schools of the future, the curriculum will be individualorientated," he said. "This change in system is of vital importance if we are to develop our students to the fullest, and stay abreast of the rapidly-developing civilization which sees our body of knowledge doubled every 15 years."

School facilities, too, will be caught up in the change, Dr. Shaw predicted. They will be designed for the benefit of the students, rather than for the convenience

of the teachers. The speaker foresees a "pushbutton era which will make the whole world a campus." All the documents and sights of history will be available at a moment's notice on a television screen, at the flick of a finger he said,

'And if the educators of tomorrow cannot move the experience to the students, they will move the students to the experience,' Dr. Shaw declared.

The speaker said he believed the educator of tomorrow will be a real professional, who will not be expected to know everything but will be a "counselor of learning students."

Dr. Shaw, whose magazine is a publication for educational executives, declined to detail an exact picture of the problems facing education 50 years, or 40 years, or even 15 years from now.

"Who would have believed in 1910 that education would become a cradle to the grave proposition, as it is today?" he asked.

"Who would have thought, even 15 years ago, that in 1959, 100 million persons here would particpate in formal education programs?"


