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Pancake Supper to Raise Funds for School Equipment at Cascade

Little Red Schoolhouse Still a Good Idea

Superintendent, Harold S. Chambers, who recently attended the Superintendent's convention in Atlantic City, heard much about the return to teaching school on the plan similar to that of the former one room schools.

Research has proven that children learn well from each other. In the one room schools, each child heard older children recite and discuss history and other subjects as many as seven years in succession. Often the older students helped the teacher give instruction to the younger ones. It is almost axiomatic that the best way to learn is to teach someone else.

In Terrance, California, experiments have been conducted during the past five years with what has been called The Little Red School House Plan. In this plan, 33 children, including 11 each of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grades, are taught in one room by a teacher who teaches all subjects, including music, art, and physical education. The first grade children stay with this teacher three years. The 4th, 5th and 6th grade children are organized in the same manner.

In this plan, children are not taught by grades but by groups. A second grader may be learning arithmetic with third graders while learning to read with first graders.

Exhaustive tests and comparisons have indicated that children do better both academically and socially in this plan. An overwhelming majority of parents favor the plan, now that it has been established.

The Little Red School House idea is based on the fact that children are not alike. They do not learn to read, write, or work with numbers at the same age. Every aspect of their lives and abilities grows with varying speeds.

By putting those children of the 3rd grade, who are behind, in with some of the first grade, all will learn together. Also, by putting the quick learners of the first grade in with some of the third grade, all are learning on their level. It makes sense.

Good teaching is accomplished when individual differences are recognized and instructional techniques organized accordingly.

Some Elementary teachers in Forest Hills have expressed a desire to work along the pattern of the Little Red School House Plan.

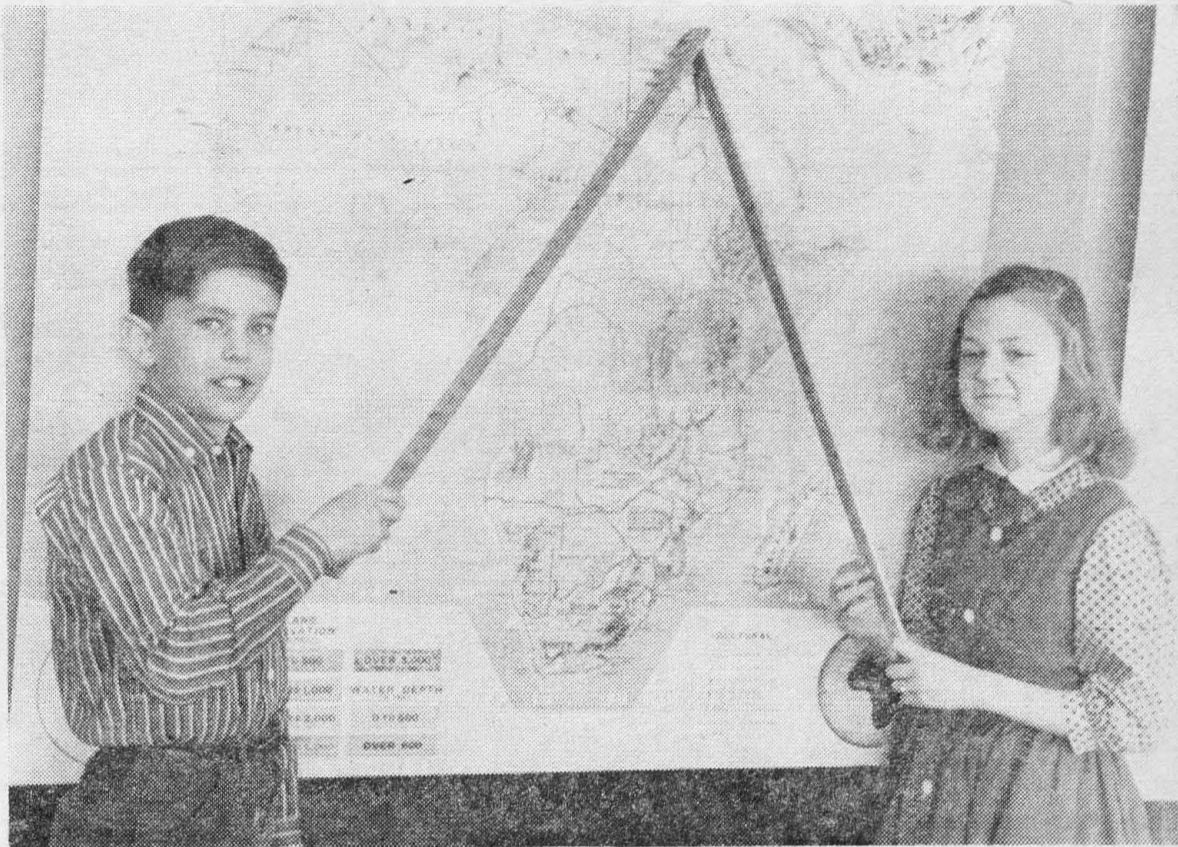

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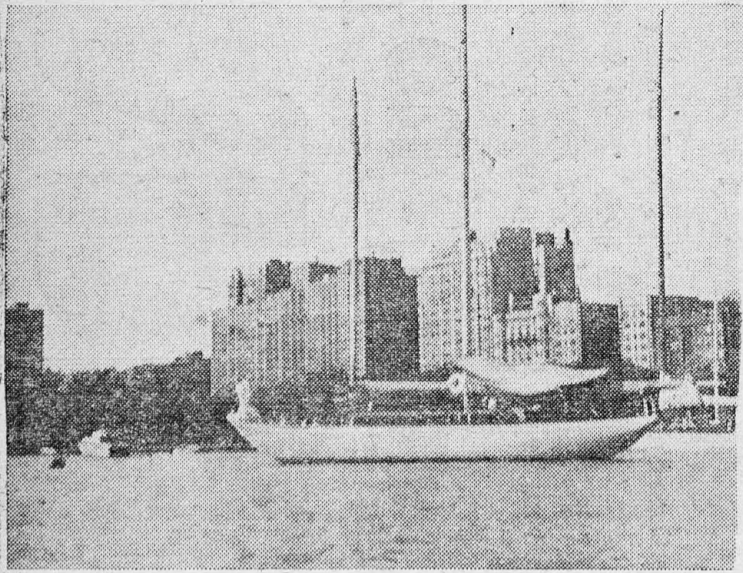
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"Aboard The Heather" by Theresa Collins



Winter in Miami! Or any part of Florida! Marvelous! Last year we decided that is what we would do. We did. It wasn't easy, there was a lot of hard work and expense involved, and now that we're here, we're mighty glad of it.

This winter has been a usual one. We never used to like to come down to Florida until the middle or end of February, when we came in a car and took a cottage. Then we could count on nice warm to hot weather, and could take full advantage of the beaches. So far this winter we've done very little swimming and playing on beaches. Just after we arrived at New Orleans all the life guards went back to college or something, and the children went back to school and the pools and beaches were closed. This seemed so silly to us. Then we worked our way around the Gulf and found the same thing everywhere. But we had no trouble understanding the shift in interest from aquatic to other sports, for there are many other outdoor activities.

This yacht harbor where we've been staying since January 18, is a lovely place. When we first came to Florida for the winter of 1935-36 it was the base for the Pan American Clippers, huge flying boats that took off for all points south of here. Now that airfields have been established almost everywhere for land based planes which are better, this beautifully protected area has been made into a yacht harbor. The one time headquarters building is now the Miami City Hall. The one time airplane hangers are now ship yard sheds, where boats are worked on. The place where once the huge amphibian planes were hauled out of the water, now has hoists for raising boats for hull painting and repair. The city has built dock after dock as the need arose for more and more, as the interest in boating grew. To the north of this marina are the Biscayne Bay Yacht Club and the Coral Reef Yacht Club. To the south of us is the Coconut Grove

Sailing Club. Each has docks, and anchorages for more boats. A nice week-end sees the most amazing amount of activity. Certain areas are white with sails as races are going on. The channel out to deep water has a constant stream of traffic of bigger boats going out for a days sailing or fishing, or just being out. There is a tremendous amount of deep sea sport fishing centered here. They really catch a lot of fish.

Right beside the waterfront area where the five huge docks of the Dinner Key Marina jut into the harbor is a municipal auditorium—a huge shed. It is completely surrounded by a tremendous parking area. Just after we arrived they staged a sport car show. We did not get around to taking that in, but we certainly saw an amazing variety of sports cars in the parking lot as we went about our business. Shortly after that was all cleared up they started preparing for a horse show. That was a tremendous undertaking. Temporary stalls were put up in sections, then roofed over by tents. Tons of dirt were hauled in and a ring made in the arena. Horse vans came from everywhere. We took in the show on Saturday night—no school next day. At eleven o'clock the twins were protestingly hauled home. They were having a fine time, and wanted to stay to the end! After the show was all over it took a week before everything was all cleaned up again. Then they started getting the boat show ready. This was so big that a huge circus tent was pitched next to the building to house more of the exhibits, with outdoor exhibit area for still more boats. As the twins came home from school each day they gave progress reports on what is going on now.

Of course we went to the boat show. Looking at it from a small boy's viewpoint it was mostly exhibits of big to little motorboats, largely plastic. Lots of motors, every type of outboard to well staged displays of the really impressive

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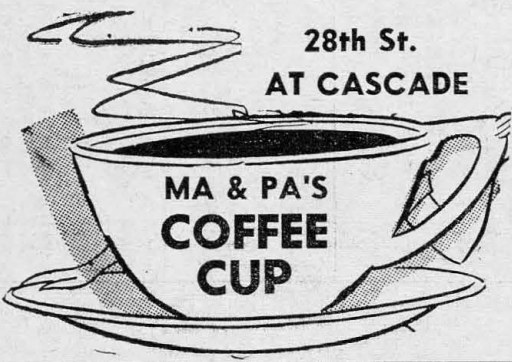
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
