According to plans submitted by the company the gas line will be installed down Ada Drive from Eastmont to the Village of Ada. Gas Mains will be laid on all the village streets and down Thornapple River Drive to the new subdivisions in that area, joining up with a line from Cascade which will also have gas mains.

## Safety Check For All Cars A Real Need

Although the number of passenger cars in the United States has more than doubled since 1940—the total is now nearly 70 million—only 16 states and the District of Columbia require vehicle inspections at least once a year, according to a recent report.

Results of last year's National Community Vehicle Safety-Check, indicates that every fifth car a motorist meets on the highway is a potential menace. In fact, the motorist may himself be driving the one-in-every-five-cars that failed to pass the mechanical check-up.

Anticipating the increased traffic ahead during the vacation season, the editors of the report recommend the following list be checked the next time the car is lubricated (and again at least every six months):

Lights, front, parking, rear, li-

ense plate, backing, stop—all should be checked. Check all bulbs, whether headlights work on both high and low beam, headlight focus, whether turn signals are operating.

Brakes. Is there at least a two-inch clearance between pedal and floor board when they are fully applied. Does the brake pedal sink under constant pressure? Do brakes fade or grab in a quick stop?

Tires. Are treads wearing thin? Do treads and sidewalls have any cracks or cuts? Are there any patches or "boots"—they are not safe at highway speeds.

Steering. Are there more than 2 or 3 inches of play when the steering wheel is turned? Are front tires worn unevenly? Does the car shimmy at any speed?

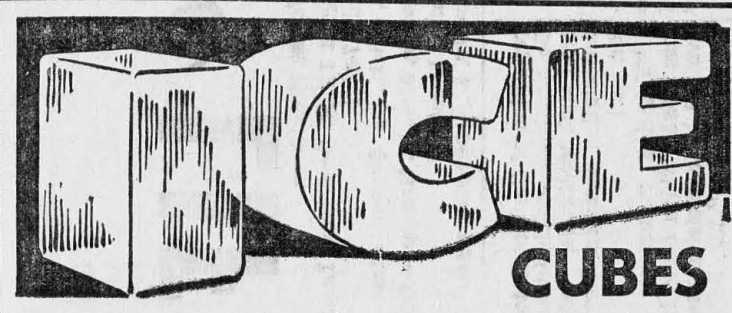
Exhaust system. Are there cracks or holes in the muffler or exhaust pipe?

Windshield wipers. Is the rubber deteriorated or dried out?

Glass. Are there cracks or discoloration in the window glass, especially the windshield? Is the rear mirror cloudy or cracked?

Checking the whole list takes about fifteen minutes, the article notes, and it holds at least one key to highway safety.

## Thirty-Five Die In Water Accidents

With 64 water accidents claiming 35 lives and injuring 28 so far this year, the State Police are urging extra care as the water sports season gets into full stride.

Of the accidents, 33 were fatal, 17 involved personal injury and 14 were property damage only. The information is based on reports received through June 9.

The 35 persons drowned included eight boat operators, five boat passengers, one swimmer or wad-

er, one skin diver, four children who strayed from their parents and into water, five suicides, and five who fell through ice, four into rivers, one from a bridge and one from a dredge.

Water sports activity is expected to begin reaching its peak in the three-day July 4 weekend and the State Police urge vigilant attention to safety precautions.

Under state law, all water accidents involving death, injury or property damage in excess of \$50 must be reported to enforcement agencies which in turn send this information to the State Police.

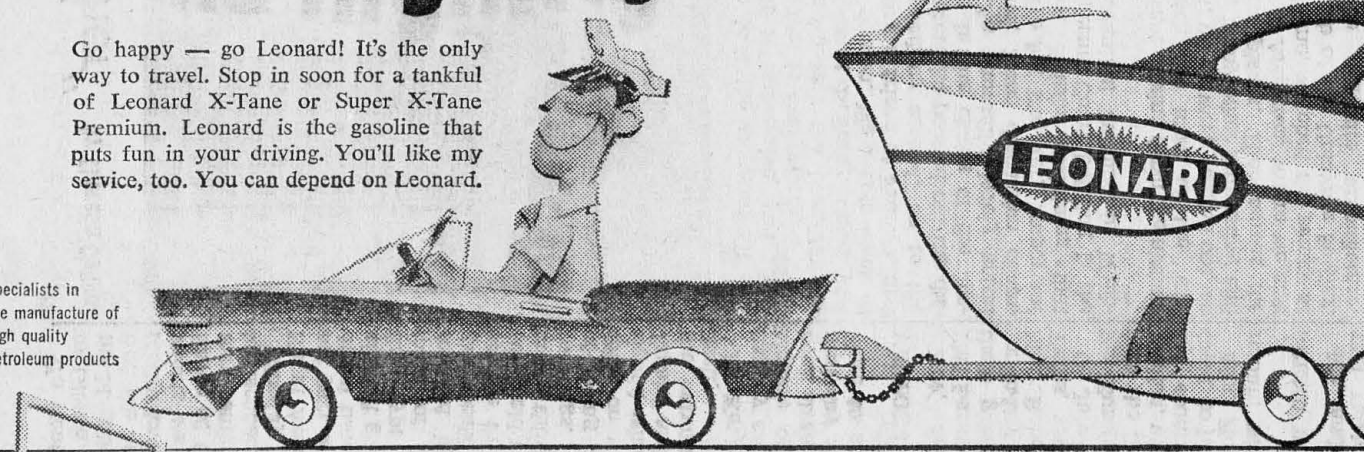

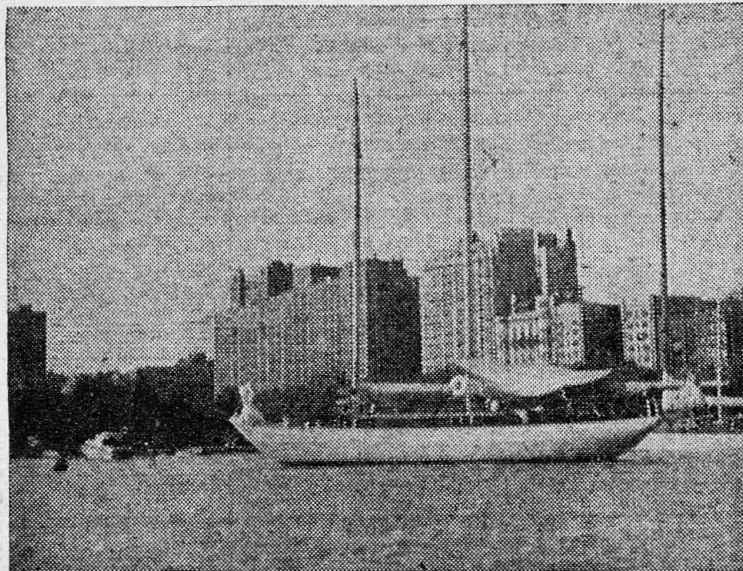

We liked to anchor in Apa Creek, with Annapolis on one side and Eastport on the other. There were homes with gardens that ran down to the water. Children swam. Suddenly Kevin said, "Let's get our things and move down here where we can have the Heather out in front of the house."

Sightseeing was fun, as there are quite a number of 200 year old houses, invariably handsome. We loved the State house. It once served as the capital of the country. It is a very handsome building, and the enlarged building added onto it at the rear is most skillfully done. We just loved the old senate chamber which has been restored exactly as it was in colonial times. The place where Washington stood when he resigned as Commander in Chief before the Continental Congress is marked by a bronze tablet. We thought the architecture and furniture truly beautiful. The new chambers for the senate and the delegates are handsome also. The governor was away, so we saw his office, which is the same as all Maryland's governors used.

It is a lovely town, and we would have had to remain a long long time to have seen everything.

Annapolis is only 40 miles from Washington, and we wanted to see some cousins who lived there. Unfortunately at the last minute Krieh couldn't go, so David and the twins and I got on a bus, and one hour later were met by a smiling pair, Frank and Frieda Collins. (Some of you readers who served in North Africa during World War II will remember Col. Frank Collins). Now everyone knows that it is fun to visit with kinfolk you're fond of. If they happen to turn into guides to show you the high points of the world's most beautiful city, you're sure to have an unforgettable experience. Driving in Washington is hectic for anyone not used to it. Frank drove with ease, pointing out sights on the way. "There's Ford theatre where Lincoln was shot, and there's where he died." He took us to the Capitol. First we visited the visitors gallery in the House, which was not in session. Did you know that our congressmen do not have desks? Just chairs. Then across to the Senate. Past the Vice-President's office to the visitors gallery. The senate was in session, but only a few of them were at their desks. Most business is transacted elsewhere in committee rooms, and they all show up only for special things, like voting. The Capitol is being renovated and

doesn't look the same at all outside. It is impressive, you sense it and feel it everywhere.

Next we saw the beautiful Supreme Court Building. Court was not in session. We met a clerk of the court, a friend of Frank's, and he showed us around, up to the front where he pointed out the difference in the chairs of the Justices. An unusually lovely spiral staircase. Some discussion chambers. We felt like Very Important Persons. Frieda maintains that the Supreme Court building is the most beautiful building in Washington.

We went driving down the avenue on which are most of the embassies, which were pointed out, as well as many other interesting and beautiful places. Then across the bridge to Arlington, where we saw Lee's home, watched the sentry at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, saw the exquisite amphitheatre. Then the chapel, the home of the chief of staff. We even drove thru exclusive Georgetown before we went to their apartment for a visit before supper. They own a lovely apartment in a beautiful co-op, built and formerly owned by Queen Wilhelmina. The visit was all too short, we wanted to see more of Frank's trophies and photographs, but it was time to go out for supper. They took us to a Chinese restaurant. The boys wanted to try chopsticks, so Frank asked for some, and showed them how to use the things. They tried bravely enough, but gave up and finished with forks. But Frank completed his meal with them, which really impressed the boys. Then back to the bus and to Annapolis.

We went for a week end cruise to Gibson Island. The scenery up the Magothy River is just beautiful. And the harbor at its head is perfectly lovely, and all filled with yachts we had seen anywhere. The flavor of these rivers is idyllies—they remind you of lovely pastoral landscapes.

Monday we went to visit the Naval Academy, all by ourselves, not part of a tour. We had a wonderful time inspecting planes, anti-aircraft guns, the balls, the chapel, the crypt below it where is the tomb of John Paul Jones, surrounded by paintings of his engagements and mementors of his service to the country. The museum held much of interest, ever so many things, including some fine paintings. I got a big thrill out of seeing the table from the Missouri on which the armistice was signed which ended the war with Japan, and on it photographs of the ceremony and the document itself.

As Kevin said, we could have happily settled down here, in this historic old town with its story book streets, but we upped anchor next day and took off up the Bay. More to see. Much farther to go.
