

Your itchy nose and bleary eyes may lead into asthma if you rely on antihistamine tablets as the sole answer to your hayfever problems. Dr. James A. McLean (M. D.)

allergist at The University of Michigan Medical Center, warns that asthma can develop in approximately one-third of today's hayfever sufferers unless specific treatment for that hayfever is received. McLean is an Associate Professor of Internal Medicine.

He says allergy victims can avoid the drift toward asthma by acting against the source of their discomfort. Drugs, medicines and trips to non-pollen-infested areas relieve the symptoms, but do not prevent the progression of the disorder, Dr. McLean explains. The superior method of treat-

ment, he says, is hyposensitization. This process involves injections of the offending substance in gradually increasing amounts. The effect of hyposensitization is far more lasting, since the patient's tolerance and allergy status is believed to be altered. Through treatment by innocula-

tion, the recurrence of hayfever symptoms is prevented, and the progression of pollen allergy into asthma is often curbed, Dr. Mc-Lean notes

More than 11,000 children under 15 have been killed and injured in each of the last five years in traffic accidents in Michigan, State Police figures show.

Last year 95 were killed and 3,464 injured, accounting for 32 percent of the 299 deaths and 57 percent of the 6,160 injured in pedestrian accidents. In addition, 18 bicyclists were killed and 1,562 injured in the same age group.

Because nearly half a million buses, motorists are reminded that the two-way stop law requires extra caution to avert mishaps ingetting on or off them, as well as other vehicles affected by the slowng and stopping of buses. Last year five persons, three of





However, according to Eleanor Densmore, County Extension Agent in Home Economics, it needs good care to keep it in tip-top ironing condition.

When the soleplate, or ironing surface is clean, it runs smoothly over the ironing board. But it gives trouble when it is stained or sticky. If the soleplate of your iron needs cleaning, it can be done by running the just-warm iron over waxed paper or a cake of paraffin. Finish by rubbing the iron over a soft, clean cloth.

very mild abrasive, such as whiting. When the iron is cool, use circular motion. A ten-cent supply of whiting will last through a number of cleanings. For very stubborn and rub with the finest steel wool.

Don't, don't, don't, scrape the iron with a knife or harsh steel wool. The soleplate is often of soft metal, and can easily be scratched or marred permanently. A scratched surface does a poor ironing job; and rough treatment in use, such as dragging the iron over buttons or metal fasteners, may also damage the soleplate.







# **More Than Half** Nation's Youths

More than half the nation's college age adults could profit from higher education, a University of Michigan educator suggests.

Prof. Algo Henderson, former president of Antioch College and now director of the U-M Center for the Study of Higher Education, says greatly expanded opportunities for education beyond high school are needed for three reasons:

1. To meet increased demand for trained manpower in all sectors of society.

2. To cope with the growing responsibilities of citizenship, and

3. To fulfill the democratic ideal that all individuals should achieve maximum personal development.

Quality can be maintained as higher education is expanded if the public provides the necessary manpower and money, he writes in a new book, "Policies and Practices of Higher Education" (Harper & Brothers, 338 pp., \$5.75).

"As a nation, we have ample re-

sources and need only be moved to devote a more generous portion of them to higher education." Henderson declares. "We also have a sufficient flow of college graduates to staff our teaching positions, but need to make these positions more attractive relative

to other opportunities.
"Increased enrollment at the undergraduate level soon will work upward to the graduate level. (Then) the supply of new teachers should not lag behind demand, if incentives for teaching are competitive."

During the past half century, enrollments have risen from 238,000 to more than three million, but colleges "today are better equipped, have better faculties, do proportionately more research, and preparation for their careers and for living than ever before," Henderson asserts.

"Formerly, higher education was viewed as training for leadership, and leaders were assumed to be few. Today we know democratic society is strongest when it includes tens or hundreds of thousands of enterprises, institutions, and organizations, each of which requires both gifted leadership and organizations, each of which and intelligent participation.'
