Forest Hills Supply Fee **Covers Many Items**

Patrons of Forest Hills Elementary Schools will doubtless appreciate knowing what the \$3.00 supply fee covers. There are a total of 221 different items, including various sizes and colors, used in Elementary classrooms. Not all items are used in every grade since Kindergarten children, for example, must use certain items not suitable for older children and vice

The list includes the following: Brushes, cards, chalk, clay, crayons, envelopes, erasers, brass paper fasteners, ink, pen, marking pens, paint, paper, paste, pencils, pens, pipe cleaners, gummed reinforcements, rubber bands, rulers, seals, staples, stik-tak for display of work, twine.

The above items are consumed in use by the children. Besides these there are about 50 items supplied each classroon not covered by fees. Examples of these are: flags, large scissors, sponges, scotch tape, mimeograph stencils, ditto masters, first aid supplies, games, etc., which are used on behalf of the students but are not consumed by them directly.

Through the fee method, children are supplied with all basic items necessary during the school year. as life itself, the actual number of There will also be an opportunity items used during the year is greater than the above list. 


