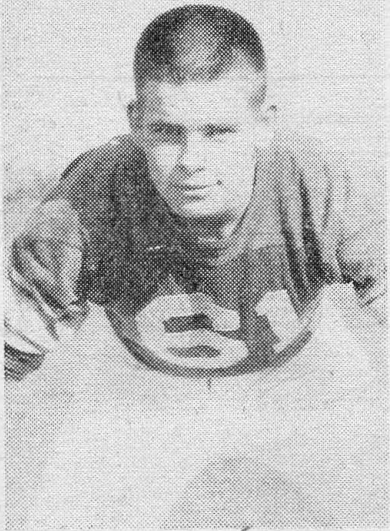

Meet the Rangers

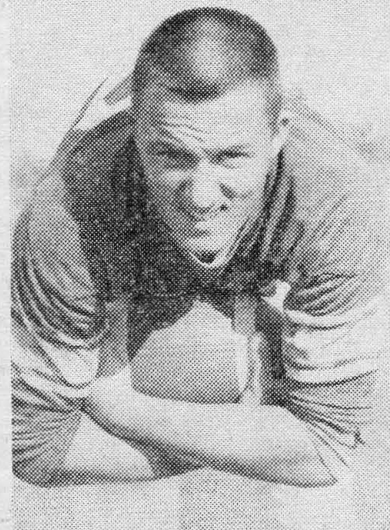
This begins a series of articles on the Senior members of the Forest Hills football squad. These articles will run each week for the remainder of the football season.

**Egg for Breakfast
Good Start of Day**

You do your family a favor when you fix breakfast for them, says Virginia Helt, Michigan State University Food Marketing Agent for the Grand Rapids area. Research has proved that regardless

of age, sex, weight or occupation the body is more alert and capable when one-fourth to one-third of the day's food needs are eaten at breakfast. Same old story, but true today as yesterday. That mid-morning energy slump is more serious if one has not eaten since the night before. How can one without breakfast expect to keep pace with one who had breakfast.

So what does this mean to you? If your family doesn't already have the "egg-for-breakfast" habit, now is the time to try again. Eggs taste good, they are low in calories, and they provide that essential protein so often lacking in many breakfasts. It's the protein that provides the "staying power" to a breakfast. If you serve scrambled eggs, omelets or French toast for breakfast, your best egg buy is the small size.

**Education From the Sky, or From
The Ground, Its Results That Count**

Starting in February, lessons will be televised to school children of Michigan and five other states from an airplane five miles above the earth.

The project will cost \$7 million, a sum that would build a lot of classrooms down on the ground.

No one can explain exactly what our educators are trying to prove. The lessons will be made on video tape. The tape will be loaded four days a week on a huge DC-6 equipped with television broadcasting devices. The plane will take off from a landing field at Purdue University, where a new runway is being constructed for the purpose.

When the plane is between four and five miles high, the broadcasting will start on an ultra high frequency channel and entranced children will watch receiving sets in classrooms in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin, Illinois and Kentucky.

It is difficult to understand why movie film cannot be sent by mail to the schools participating in the program, thus saving the cost of an airplane. And no one has explained why education will be more effective by this strange me-

chanical process than by the old-fashioned method of book-learning guided by a teacher.

The programs will be received by both elementary and high schools and will include lessons in general science, physics, social studies, humanities, government, art, music and the Russian, French and Spanish languages.

Ultra-modern educators, preparing for ultra-high televising, cautiously point out that the experiment is being undertaken by a \$5 million grant from the Ford Foundation and that another \$2 million is expected from other contributors.

But no one should conclude that this educational advance is entirely free. School districts will need money from taxpayers for receiving equipment. Technicians and public funds. And if our educators conclude the project is worthwhile, the states and the local districts will be expected to finance it in the future.

One outcome certainly will prove that this writer, whose father scoffed at those who had faith in the telephone, is far behind the times.

I remember Miss Edison. She taught a class of 34 boys and girls from the fourth grade through the seventh, advancing with us each

year. She was short, slightly plumpish, slightly gray and very determined that each of us should receive the basic training which is the purpose of elementary school. She made us read aloud from Dickens and Wordsworth and Tennyson and Scott. We learned the sounds of consonants. We learned penmanship by exhaustive exercises, and we learned basic arithmetic that opened the door for algebra and geometry.

History was easy under Miss Edison because she imparted to us her love for mankind and the struggle of man for freedom and justice. There were six or seven of us one year, weak in spelling, who met once a week at night in her home for special help. That was when I discovered she played the harp that was in the home where she roomed. Somehow, the harp was not inappropriate.

A major regret of my middle age is that I failed, during the busy years of struggling for a living, to visit Miss Edison, before she died at 82, to thank her and to kiss her goodbye. Perhaps the adults who will be running this nation in 1990, if they become sentimental, can express their gratitude by embracing the old television set in the corner of their old schoolroom.

**Processed Potatoes
Are Popular Items**

Potatoes in boxes are encouraging folks to eat more potatoes these days.

Consumers are tempted by boxes of instant mashed potatoes, hash browns, potato puffs, potato patties and au gratin and scalloped potatoes. Consumers are "sold" on frozen french fries, the most popular vegetable in the frozen food case.

Mary Holmes, consumer marketing information agent at Michigan State University, says people in the United States have been cutting down on their potato eating over the past 50 years. But new potato products may help stop this decline.

The appeal of these convenience foods is not limited to homemakers who work outside the home and look for minute-saving menus. The products are just as popular with non-employed homemakers. There is a small charge for "built-in-maid-service." But homemakers often find processed potatoes cost no more than fresh ones when time, energy, storage space, waste, quality of product and family preferences are considered.

Mrs. Holmes adds that all processed potatoes are not sold in small "home-sized" boxes. Public eating places bid for a good share of the market. In 1959, restaurants, cafeterias and schools served dehydrated potatoes for ov-

er 50 percent of the mashed potatoes on their menus.
