## High School Accredited By U of M

Forest Hills received notification that they have been accredited by the University of Michigan, superintendent of schools Harold Chambers announced this week.

Achieving this sought after distinction, Mr. Chambers said, is due to the cooperation of many people—the high school principal, the teachers, the board of education and the citizens committee.

The move to become accredited by the U of M began in 1956 when the board and citizens group met with representatives from the university to lay out the curriculum and plan the high school building.

Becoming accredited means that every graduate will be readily admitted to any college in Michigan and most other colleges in the United States.

The next goal of the school system, Chambers revealed, is to achieve membership in the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. Foundation for this high honor have been laid already in the design of the high school building, layout of the curriculum and selection of the staff.

## Topical Fluoride Program Sets March 20 as Deadline For Application Forms

Final requests and fees are now being accepted for the Summer Topical Fluoride program to be held in Lowell. This program is being sponsored by the Child Study Club in cooperation with the Kent County Health Department and the Michigan Department of Health.

Any child who is a pre-schooler, second, fifth, or eighth grader is eligible to enroll in the program. Special cases referred by the family dentist will also be accepted.

## Lynch to Challenge Keena in Spring Vote

In the primary election held recently in Ada Township, the votes received by the various candidates for Township Supervisor were as follows: Carl Keena 302; Richard Lynch 271; Fred Bradley 130; and Allison Roark, 32; and thus it appears that Mr. Keena's election is assured.

Under our direct primary system, the candidate who receives the greatest number of votes is nominated, even though he receives less than half of the votes cast. This is precisely the situation which we now face. Since the total for Supervisor was 735, and since Mr. Keena received only 302 of these votes, it is quite clear that 433 voters preferred someone else.

I feel that an unfair interpretation could be placed on these circumstances. It is not right that any candidate gain his office in such a way that anyone may say that he "backed into the job." In order that the voters may make a clear choice between the two

In the Supreme Court, the offender has the right to have witnesses speak for him. But, if found guilty, the fine he gets is much stiffer. Here the themes start at 500 words, instead of 300.

The Judges for the Supreme Court are Mike Darooge, Pirrko Linna, Fred Sytsma, and Lutz Storbeck.
