## Students Participate In English Experiment

The students of Forest Hills have many opportunities to go as far as they want in their studies. Just one of these special chances is the Advanced English Program.

During the summer, students who will sophomores or juniors in the fall may work in this program. They will obtain a list of required novels, short stories, and poems from Mr. DeWitt, English and German teacher at Forest Hills High, and during the summer they will read the material on this list.

The object is for them to skip English the next year in school, and thus they will be able to pick up another subject. The substitute subject had to be related to English; such as another language, speech, or literature.

The minimum amount of reading is one book a six week period plus something from the text book which are borrowed from the school. Most of the students participating read much more than the required amount.

The students must have a B or better average in English in order to participate. Parents permission must be given in a letter sent home in the spring.

### Benefits Students

Mr. DeWitt feels that this program benefits the students in many ways. Not only are they enabled to take another subject, but they also are spared a year of English, which is often greatly wasted by students who are very good in English.

The students are also encouraged in this program to use self-will and work on their own toward their own advancement.

Another advantage is that of broadening the students' writing ability through their broadened reading field.

Mr. DeWitt did point out that there are also disadvantages. One important one is that these students may miss an excellent course in English through exemption.

In the long run, however, as can be seen, this is a very good plan. Those who have already taken part will testify to this.

## Ada Man Owns Weapon Collection

Frank Gilmore, local sporting goods dealer who has been buying and trading guns for 15 years, is the owner of a fine collection of antique weapons.

Beginning this interest while working at a prison, Gilmore has continued on with it and has interested his son, Gregg, in the hobby.

One very small gun, which was advertised many years ago in pictures on a ladies leg garter, is called a garter gun, and now sells for \$50.

Another very interesting hand gun is a 45 Remington from the Civil War days, valued at \$100.

Another Remington, a 36-calibre made in 1858, would be of particular interest to many. It is one of a limited class of guns since it features both percussion and the metal cylinder. This model was made during the first phase of metal cylinders.

It was pointed out how exactly the hand loading is done. First the powder charge is put in. Next

the wad is placed and then followed by the ball. Finally the cylinder is put in. The cylinder is waxed to give a smoother firing.

Another model, which was carried by a Union Officer in the Civil War, is a Smith and Wesson 32-calibre percussion weapon. It has a nipple which the cap goes on to set off the main charge.

Another early model is a 1894 spin trigger, 41-calibre Remington pocket pistol.

### Other Weapons

It is interesting that the Gilmore's have not only guns, but a few swords, two World War I helmets (a German and an American), and an original horn powder flask. This particular flask is worth about five or ten dollars. The copper flasks were worth much more because of their style and the fact that they are copper.

One of the rifles which the Gilmore's possess is a 32-calibre English-made model. It is rare and sells for \$100.

They also have a Civil War musket which was the style used with the flask mentioned above. It is a 69-calibre used by the Confederate armies.

One of the more modern guns is a 30-calibre Vickers air craft machine gun from World War I. Also from World War I comes one of the swords, and officer's sword with a 27-inch blade, a locking sheath, and a bamboo handle.

Also in their collection are a 31-calibre Japanese Infantryman's rifle, a Japanese 31-calibre tank machine gun, and a Japanese sniper's rifle. From Germany, the Gilmore's have a 9mm Burp gun, and from Africa an original bow and shield as well as a blow gun.

For the person interested in machine guns, they also possess a 45-calibre Police ordinance machine gun from the Los Angeles police force. Due to Federal Law, it, as are all machine guns, is welded. This particular gun sells for \$75.

Among the other guns, swords, and other collector's items, the Gilmore's have a copy of a BAR, (a French gun from World War II), a 303 British Mark I, an Argentine Mauser, and three or four Lodge swords.

Michigan produces 85 percent of cars, trucks, and other automotive vehicles made in the United States.

### Super Highways Need Beautification, Tourists Say

Motoring on today's Expressways is as exciting as staring at a sheet of white paper, enough to drive tourists away, a University of Michigan faculty member said.

Michigan, or any other state, that wants tourists and visitors must offer them something worthwhile to see and enjoy while on the road besides counting the mileage, Ross J. Wilhelm, U-M instructor in marketing, pointed out.

"Unfortunately, most of our highway construction funds are being poured into expressways which by-pass every town, eliminate every billboard, prohibit all or most stores, roadside stands and even rest rooms. We are getting a highway system that discourages touring and traveling."

Every state needs more than one kind of road, Wilhelm said. For example, interesting scenic routes will attract and enable tourists to learn about and enjoy the people of the state, he suggested.

Today's super highways and expressways have reduced the entire country to a boring sameness, it is no longer any fun to go on a long motor trip, he said.

"The basic problem of the dullness of our highway system lies in the fact that we have lost all sight of human values and all consideration for the enjoyment of people. We act as if the only value that should be recognized in designing a highway is the minimization of travel time from point A to point B," Wilhelm concluded.

He expressed his views in a U-M Broadcasting Service (WUOM) program, "Business Review."

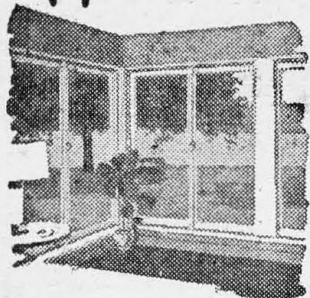

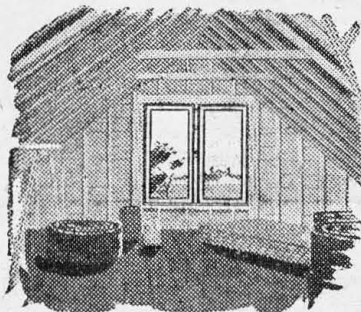

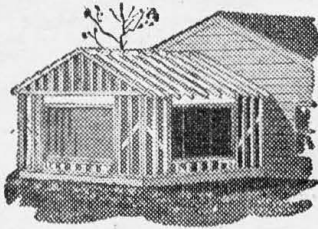
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## Let's Spend the Fourth at Home

## Child Discipline Should Be Uniform Within Family

Grandparents should "stay out of the area of discipline" in relationships with their grandchildren, says a University of Michigan psychiatrist.

"The amount of help a grandparent can give a parent in a matter of discipline is probably very small," reports Dr. Stuart M. Finch (M.D.). "Grandparents are likely to be either too strict and rigid, or to have become overly-mellow to the point where they are unable to see the grandchild disciplined properly."

In a recent talk co-sponsored by the U-M and the State Medical Society, Dr. Finch recommended that grandparents "follow the parents' lead in how their child is to be disciplined."

He said a three-year-old child is quite capable of manipulating his grandparents against his parents if it serves his immediate purpose. If the child detects the slightest bit of disagreement between the two, he will quickly learn how to produce more disagreement in order to get what he wants, and his techniques will improve with age.

Dr. Finch, director of the Children's Psychiatric Hospital at the U-M Center, urged that grandparents adopt a mild supportive role in their relations with the younger family. They should respond to appeals but should not keep offering help and advice in the area of discipline without being asked.

The ability to master the responsibilities of parenthood comes only with growth and experience, Dr. Finch said. "If grandparents insist on being parents, they will often hinder the emotional growth of the young couple. Grandparents must think of their married children as adults and deal with them accordingly."

## Meat, Eggs, Dairy Foods Take Half of Food Budget

The average family spends about 26 per cent of the food money for red meat, or 26 cents in every dollar. An average of nine cents of every food dollar is spent for poultry and eggs, and 15 cents for dairy foods. This makes a total of 50 cents of every food dollar the average family spends for protein foods, says Virginia Helt, Michigan State University Food Marketing Agent for Grand Rapids area.

Today, poultry and eggs represent thrifty food purchases. Turkey supplies are abundant and almost every week, fryers are featured by retailers in some food market. Year in and year out, eggs and dairy foods represent economical food values for the money spent.

Shoppers can save a few cents if they use chuck roasts for swissing as well as pot roast. Chuck roast comes in several styles; namely, blade cut roast, English cut, round bone cut and boneless chuck. Blade chuck roast demands fewer cents per pound, but there is more bone in this cut as compared to the amount of bone in the English and round bone chuck roast. Boneless chuck roasts demand the most money per pound, but, in this case, there is no bone waste and there will be more servings in a pound.

When you bake rolls for the freezer, take them from the oven as soon as the rolls have reached maximum size and are just beginning to brown. Home economists at Michigan State University say the rolls should be cooled gradually before they are wrapped and frozen.

**Pecan Pie**

3 eggs  
 1/4 cup soft butter  
 1 cup white sugar  
 two-thirds tablespoon flour  
 1 cup Light Karo syrup  
 3/4 cup pecans  
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
 Mix sugar, butter, and flour. Beat eggs slightly. Add other ingredients, placed in unbaked shell. Bake 375 for ten minutes and 350 for about 50 minutes.
