G. A.'s bid of 40 cents a pound. Besides the champion, the Cascade I. G. A. purchased the 2nd place light-weight winner, an 810 lb. Hereford, from Lucy Dykstra of Ada; a 960 lb. ## New 'Freeway' to Open August 30th

The last mile of two-lane highway between Detroit and Grand Rapids will be replaced by a new freeway next week, the State Highway has announced.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said a 7.9-mile section of Interstate 96 Freeway from the Thornapple River near Cascade to the east edge of Grand Rapids will be opened to traffic on August 30.

The new freeway will carry the bulk of the automobile traffic around Cascade, through which all Detroit-to-Grand Rapids traffic now travels.

The only remaining two-lane section of highway between the state's largest and second largest cities extends from the end of the present freeway (at Whitneyville Rd.) to the edge of Cascade.

With the opening of this \$7 million section, 50 continuous miles of Interstate 96 Freeway will be in use between Lansing and Grand Rapids.

Mackie said the freeway to be opened August 30 was designed to enhance the scenic beauty of Thornapple River Valley and was unique from a construction standpoint because it included a cross-section of practically every type of Interstate highway construction work encountered in Michigan.

The freeway has a variable median—the two roadways are separated by as much as 900 feet—with independent grades tailored to the terrain for a distance of more than a mile.

Also included are a dual four-span plate girder bridge over the Thornapple River, two cloverleaf interchanges, a Safety Rest Area, a 300-foot long concrete box culvert on timber piles and three grade separations.

The 7.9-mile section from Whitneyville Rd. to Cascade Rd. (US-16 Business Route) includes interchanges at 28th Street (US-16) and Cascade Road.

Mrs. Clarence Klahn, secretary-treasurer of the Kent County 4-H Livestock Sale, reports that the total receipts for the annual event reached \$5,832.75. Sixteen steers, twenty-two market hogs, and seven lambs, the first ever put on the block at the sale, were sold to the highest bidders.

Donating their services to the cause were Logan Wright of Wayland, auctioneer; Mrs. Willis Hatch of Alto, clerk; and Ray Linton of Alto, weighmaster.

The seven lambs grossed \$225.95 in the bidding, with the highest-priced bid of 49 cents a pound being put by the Wayland Livestock Sales on the 120-pound grand champion Suffolk shown at the fair by Shirley Martin, Caledonia.

The 125-pound reserve champion lamb, shown by Patty White of Caledonia, was sold to Hastings Livestock Sales on a 26-cents-a-pound bid.

The 22 hogs consigned to the auction fattened the pocket-books of the 4-H exhibitors by \$1,060.66 with the grand champion entry of Russell Rogers of Caledonia bringing the top bid of 37½ cents a pound. Rogers' Yorkshire barrow weighed in at 230 pounds and was purchased by the Alto Locker Company.

The Michigan Livestock Exchange purchased the runner-up of the hog show, a 195-pound Yorkshire shown by William White of Caledonia, for 23 cents a pound.

The sixteen steers earned \$4,546.14 for the beef club showmen at the annual livestock sale, with Susan Phelps' 910-pound Angus reaching a high of 40 cents a pound.

The 1,080-pound reserve champion steer, an Angus shown by Pam Klahn of Alto, was purchased for 32 cents a pound by the Ada Beef Co. for Daane's Food Market in Grand Rapids.

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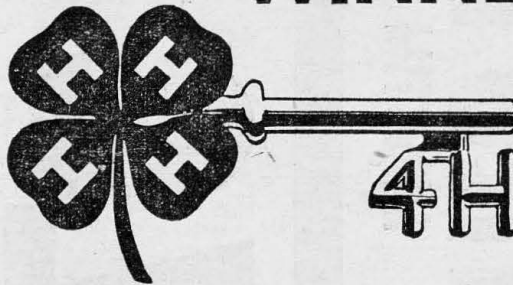

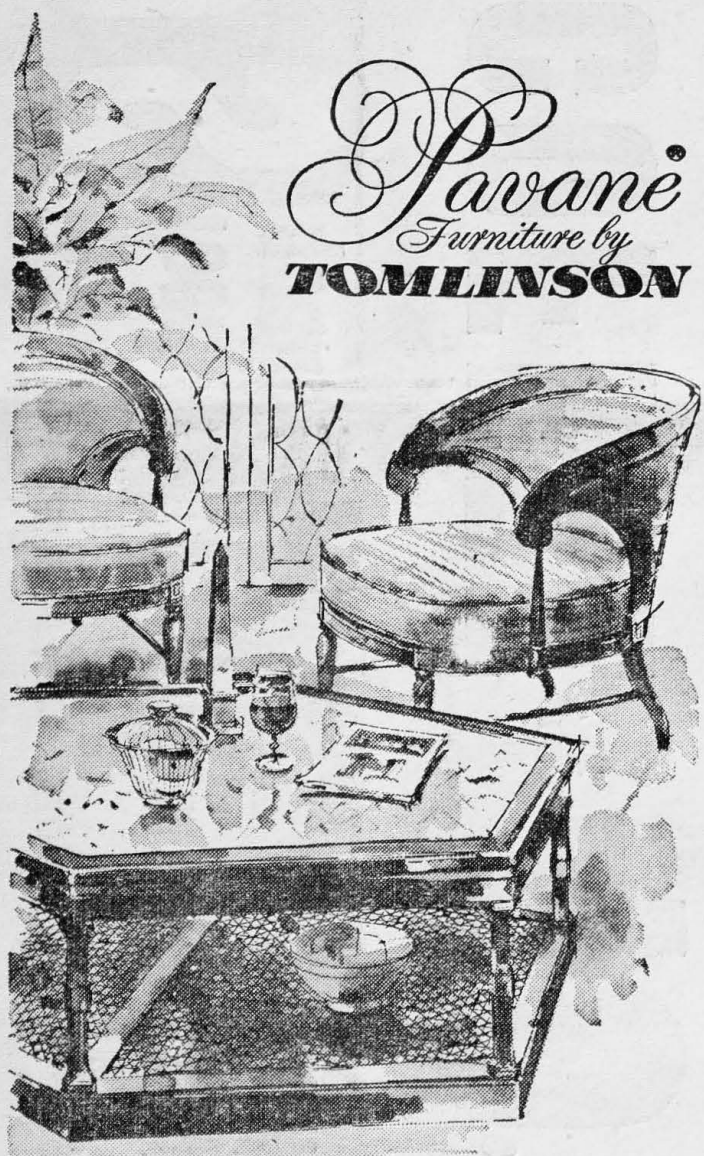

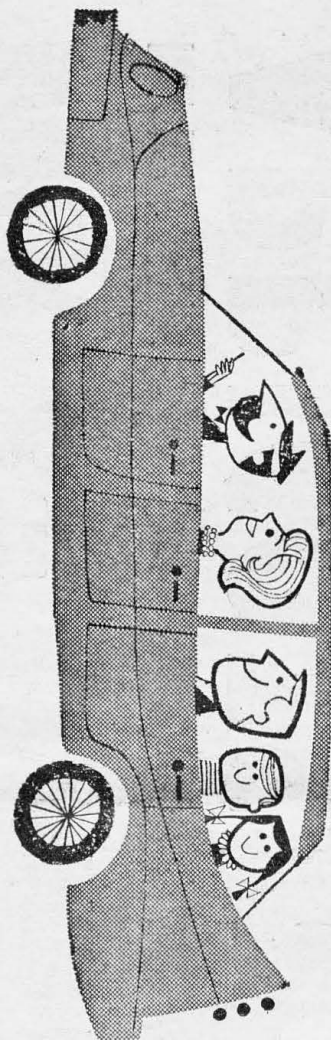

### Larry Hoffman, 17, Killed In Car-Scooter Accident

Services were held Saturday in the Roth Funeral Home in Lowell for Larry Leroy Hoffman, 17, who was fatally injured August 16 when the motor scooter on which he was riding was struck by a passing motorist three-quarters of a mile west of Hoffman's home at 9300 Vergennes Road, N. E., in Ada.

The westbound motorist, Glen D. Perrott, 50, of Grand Rapids, told state police officers that the scooter darted out of a driveway into his path.

Troopers said the victim was killed outright, apparently suffering head injuries and fractures of both legs.

Born in Marne on April 29, 1944, Hoffman attended Lowell High School and was employed on the Ada farm of Dr. J. Clinton Foshee.

### Hiroshima A-Bomb Model on Display At Lowell Air Show Next Sunday

Every conceivable maneuver within the realm of aviation will be displayed this coming Sunday, August 27, at the Big Air Show in Lowell, sponsored by the Lowell Airport Association, according to Hollis Marsh, newly elected President of the group.

Loops, Immelman turns, rolls of all kinds, every type of spin, the Falling Leaf—plus a few tricky embellishments of their own—will be performed by some of the nation's leading civilian and military stunt pilots.

Booked for the Air Show, in addition to Major Arthur J. Davis, world-famous racing and stunt pilot are: Howard Libersky, who will do a trapeze act from a low-flying plane, picking up a handkerchief one foot above ground; Don Magnun, who will transfer from a speeding car to an airplane, an act which obviously requires split-second timing; and the incomparable stunt flying of Ray Henry, who does things with an airplane even a bird wouldn't try!

Last minute arrangements have been completed, Marsh said, for the display for the first time in Western Michigan of an exact replica model of the first Atomic Bomb—the one dropped on Hiroshima. This should prove to be of highest interest since no pictures or details have been officially released on the bomb up until now.

The Aircraft display, another feature of the Air Show, will have the latest 1961 models of Beech, Cessna and Piper airplanes for business and private use, and the newest 1961 Brantly B-2 Helicopter, the nation's lowest-priced two passenger machine which takes off and lands in the average backyard.

Gates at the Lowell Airport, located just one mile north of Lowell, on M-91, will open at 11:30

a. m., with the Air Show scheduled at 2:30 p. m. Refreshments will be served by Association members throughout the day.

Scores of pilots are expected to fly in for the Show, and all those arriving by plane will be admitted free. Ample parking for both cars and planes has been provided. Aviation gas will be available.

President Marsh pointed out that Federal Aviation Agency requirements for programs of this type are very rigid, for the protection of pilots and spectators, and FAA officials will be on hand to see there are no infractions. No parking on roads adjacent to the Airport will be permitted, and these roads will be patrolled by Police.

Lowell Jaycees will help the airport boosters stage the air show, which is being staged to raise money for the improvement of the airport grounds, and for the installation of gas pumps, a telephone, and other services which will enable the Lowell field to be licensed by the State.

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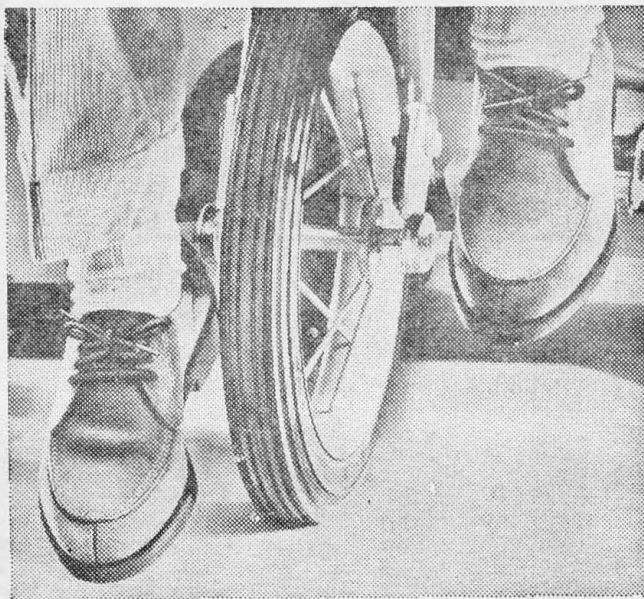
