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Rangers Await Invading Hudsonville Eagles; Win Over Lee 28-0

The Hudsonville Eagles will invade the Forest Hills Gridiron on Friday night in the first Homecoming game for Forest Hills.

The Eagles have a 2 won, 1 loss, and 2 tie record this year. Their attack is spearheaded by the running of Don McClaw, a hard-driving halfback. Their defense is led by Clarence Robart, an all-conference tackle.

Coach Shy was happy with his teams offensive effort against Lee last Friday, especially with the pin-point passing of quarterback Spencer Wilcox.

Hudsonville is a good passing team so Coach Shy will spend plenty of time this week on pass defense. The Eagles feature a "lone-some end" offense.

Trips Lee 28-0

The Forest Hills Rangers spoiled Lee's Homecoming game Friday night by a 27-0 score. The Rangers struck early in the first quarter on a 63 yard run off tackle by Joe Gillard. Doug Stiles converted.

Moments later Spencer Wilcox led his team to the 1 yard line on some brilliant passing from where Doug Stiles went over for the touchdown. The conversion failed and the Rangers led 13-0 at the quarter.

In the second period Jim Jackson scored an 8 yd. end sweep. Stiles converted and the score was 20-0 at half.

Intercepts Pass

Doug Beckett intercepted a Rebel pass on the last play of the first half and returned it 40 yds. to the 1 foot line before he was driven out of bounds as the gun sounded.

In the third period Larry Wentzloff scored on an 11 yard sweep and Doug Stiles converted to make the score 27-0. Reserves played a great share of the third period and all of the fourth period for the Rangers.

Wilcox Stars

Every player on the Ranger team saw considerable action in the game.

Spencer Wilcox starred for the Rangers by completing 8 of 11 passes besides directing the team to its first offensive performance of the year.

The "little" Rangers took command over the Lee Rebels Thursday night in a low-scoring game. The offense shoved across two touchdowns, while the defense held Lee to one tally.

The Reserves first score came when Gary Knapp shook loose for 6 points. Wayne Blocher was not satisfied with Knapp's score so he added one of his own.

The defense loosened momentarily, allowing the Rebels to push their lone score across the goal line.

The victory hiked the Rangers higher in the first division, while lowering Lee in the league standing.

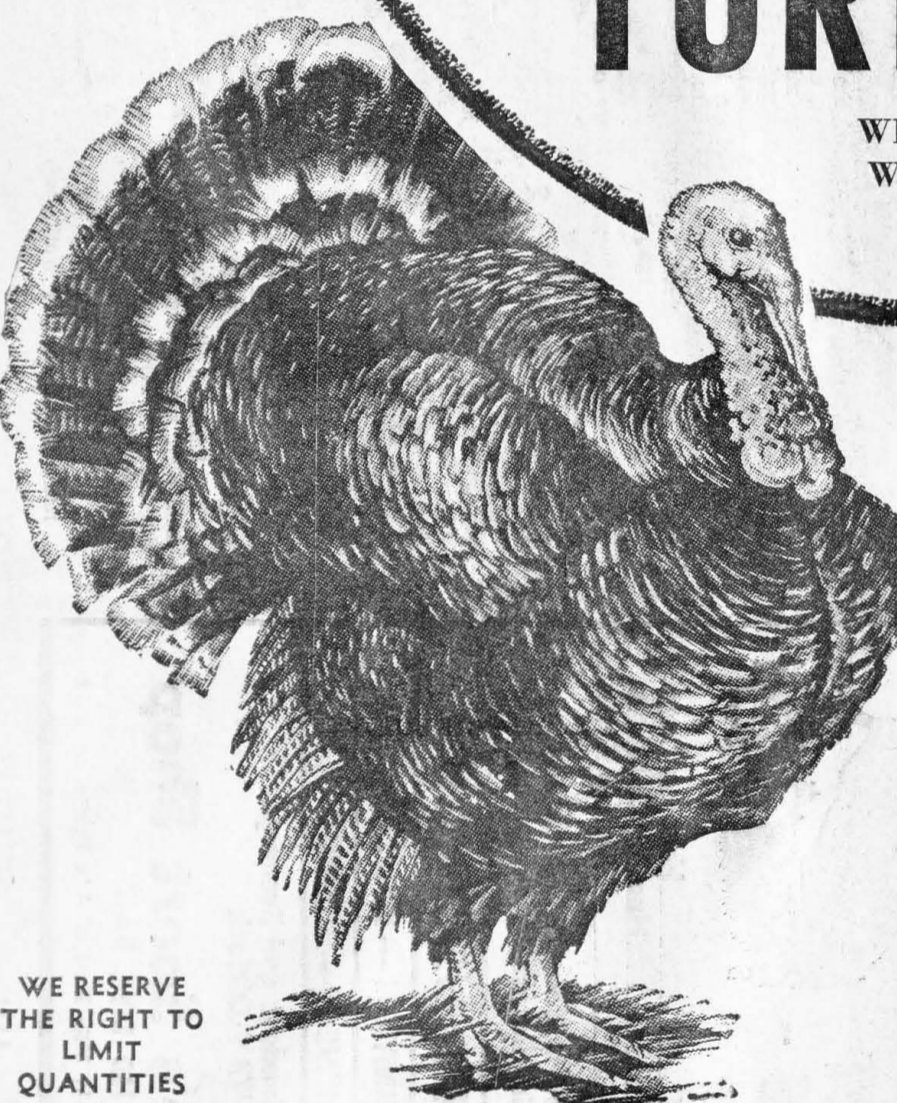

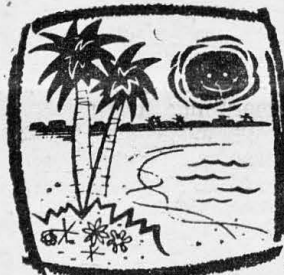

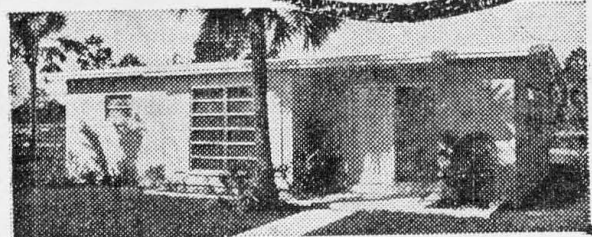

Penny Shoemaker Feted for Standing In National Merit Scholarship Test

Dean VanLandingham, Principal of Forest Hills High School, has announced that Penelope Shoemaker, Forest Hills Senior, has been honored for her high performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test given last spring, and has received a formal Letter of Commendation signed by the school principal and the president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation gives recognition to two groups of students who achieve high scores. The semi-finalists group is composed of the highest-scoring students in each state and in U. S. territories. Some 10,000 semi-finalists will take a second exam in December to establish further their eligibility to receive Merit Scholarships.

To increase their opportunities to obtain financial assistance if

they need it, the Merit Corporation sends the names, home addresses, and test scores of all commended students to the two colleges they indicated as their preferred choices at the time they took the qualifying test.

Miss Shoemaker was among the high school juniors in more than 15,000 schools who took the test last March. The test is a three-hour examination that covers five separate areas of educational development. It was the first step in the 7th annual Merit Program. This year's program will conclude about April 26, 1962, with the naming of students who will receive four-year Merit Scholarships to the colleges of their choice.

The commended students and the semi-finalists who do not win Merit Scholarships are considered for certain other scholarships that are offered through the facilities of the National Merit Scholarship Corp.

Scholarship awards are made from the resources of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and through sponsoring business corporations, foundations, associations and individuals.
