A telephone call to either office will also do; your permit will be filled out over the phone and mailed to you. Per-mits are also available from conservation officers, fire officers, and towermen. An issued permit means that weather conditions are "A-OK" for burning in your area. It also tells Department field men where you'll be burning so they can come to your






