

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
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

## **Whooping Cough Outbreak Exists**

The conditions exist in which several current, localized outbreaks of whooping cough in Kent County could develop into epidemic proportions. These conditions exist because the immunization level is too low, says Dr. W. B. Prothro, City-County Health Officer.

Immunization for whooping cough should be given in infancy along with immunizations for smallpox, diphtheria, tetanus and polio. The initial immunization needs to be followed in one year with a booster shot and with a second and final booster no later than the age

The incidence of whooping cough has been low here in recent years with only nine cases reported last year. As a result, the public has become lethargic about having children protected. The low incidence of the disease also reduces the number of people having the natural immunity acquired from having been exposed to the disease.

Some of the current cases of whooping cough are occurring among high school age students and among the adult population. The disease is especially dangerous to infants, the aged, and infirm who may strangle as a result of the convulsive coughing. Lengthy school absences caused by whooping cough may seriously

retard a child's school progress. Three weeks isolation are required. If one child in a family has whooping cough, all other children in the same family who have not been immunized must be excluded from school too. Then, if those children get whooping cough, after or near the end of the isolation period, they are confined for another three weeks. If there are other children in the family who have been immunized, they are not excluded from school.

### Read Labels On Lawn Mixtures

With Michigan citizens spending \$6 million to \$8 million a year for 10 or 12 million pounds of lawn seeding mixtures and turf grass seed, Director G. S. McIntyre of the Michigan Department of Agriculture advises purchasers to read the labels on seed contain-

ers before buying. The labels show germination, purity of seed, and the varieties of grasses making up the mix-

> The best fine leafed perennial turf lawns are established by planting Kentucky bluegrass varieties or red fescue varieties. The higher the content of these ingredients as shown by the label, the better the turf is expected to be.

Some cheaper mixtures contain high percentages of temporary turf grasses. The big ingredient is rve grass. The cheaper the lawn mixture in price, the greater the percentage of rye grass or other temporary turf grasses.
