Communities Ready For Michigan Week

Communities and citizens of this area are preparing for participation in the ninth annual Michigan Week.

Free chicken dinners at Zeeland; a gigantic parade in Sturgis; a week long industrial carnival in Battle Creek; a big day for senior citizens at Muskegon, and a city wide clean-up by the youth of Alpena.

These are but a few of the hundreds of events and activities that will take place during Michigan Week which actually will spread over more than a week during the latter part of this month.

In every section of the state and in practically every community from the most obscure country crossroads to the heart of Metropolitan Detroit, people and organizations will be participating in the greatest program of boosting their own communities and the state that has ever been undertaken.

While Michigan Week itself is scheduled from May 20 to 26, inclusive, many of the activities will take place before these dates and other events will extend beyond in keeping with the main objective that the job of selling Michigan should be continuous throughout the year.

On Thursday, May 18, four of Michigan's Agricultural queens representing the Apple, Bean and Cherry producers and the famed Blossom Festival at Benton Harbor, will take off from Willow Run airport on a Michigan product selling tour that takes them to the west coast for television appearances in Hollywood and to the world's fair at Seattle.

Preceding the departure of the queens on May 18, Michigan's product and achievement-of-the-year will be selected by judges in Detroit from among 16 regional winners from all areas of the state.

On Saturday night, May 19, the Michigan queens will appear on the Lawrence Welk show, and before they leave Hollywood they will be on three additional network shows—"Truth or Consequences," "Seven Keys" and "Porom-Pacific." The queens will visit San Francisco for public appearances before going to Seattle.

The big day in Sturgis, kick-off of the whole Michigan Week program, will start with a civic luncheon at 11 a. m. with Edwin O. George, Detroit, general chairman for Michigan Week; Herbert G. Davenport, Grand Rapids chairman of the Michigan Week program board, and other officials participating.

What the Sturgis Chamber of Commerce expects will be the biggest parade in the city's history, will start at 1:30 p. m. At 5 p. m. Governor Swainson will present awards to two Sturgis firemen who were responsible for a new industry locating in that community.

On Sunday the official opening of Spiritual Foundations Day will be held on the state capital steps in Lansing with clergymen of Protestant, Catholic and Jewish faiths participating along with Governor Swainson and Michigan Week leaders.

Sunday afternoon the Michigan Week Industrial Exposition will open in Battle Creek, marking the beginning of the week long program which combines the annual Cereal City Festival with Michigan Week. It will include a carnival, parade, band concerts, sporting events and other activities.



In Escanaba the day will be highlighted by a meeting of the Upper Peninsula Tourist Association and a civic banquet at which Governor Swainson will be the main speaker.

Bernard Van Ark, Forest Hills Instructor, Selected for N.S.F. Training

Bernard J. Van Ark, 1155 Edna SE, Grand Rapids, Michigan, a teacher at Forest Hills Junior High School, Grand Rapids, Michigan, has been selected for five weeks of study in modern mathematics at Bowling Green State University July 19-Aug. 23.

The program, the third annual Summer Institute for Teachers of Junior High School Mathematics, is supported by a grant from the National Science Foundation.

Dr. Bruce R. Vogeli, associate professor of mathematics at BGSU and institute director, said the 54 teachers were selected on the basis of the excellence of their academic record, previous success in teaching mathematics, and their potentiality for development as teachers of mathematics in junior high school.

Participants will receive a stipend of \$375 each plus allowances for dependents and travel.

Grants for institute in junior high school mathematics are given by the federal government to improve the teaching of mathematics in the nation's schools by providing opportunities for outstanding teachers to supplement their training.

Forest Hills Treasurer Replies To Letters on Finances in District

Dear Sir:

Your last two issues have carried letters about Forest Hills School district finances, written by Cary P. Stiff, B. I. Freeman and O. S. Myers, all residents and taxpayers of the district. These letters are thoughtful, serious, and deserve careful attention.

Naturally, there is a difference of opinion as to the right conclusions to be drawn from the facts. The school Board will, as usual, find both extremes of opinion disagreeing with the course it follows. Perhaps a few more facts will help others make up their minds.

Mr. Stiff quite fairly and reasonably points out that, in the period 1959-62 pupil enrollment in our school system has been multiplied by 1 1/2, while total revenues and total expenditures have about doubled. This, of course, does not mean that the load of each individual taxpayer has doubled; there are more taxpayers, and more taxable properties in 1962 than in 1959. But the load is heavier.

The cost of instruction is the place of largest increase. This is attributable to the higher salaries of teachers—the heart and soul of any school system. Here is the comparison:

Advisory Committee Head Calls For Correction on Suburban Life Letter

Dear Sir:

Your issue of May 10th carries a front page headline over a letter by B. I. Freeman. I would like to point out a number of inaccuracies in this letter, and attempt to correct a wrong impression, which your publication of this letter has created.

The Citizens Advisory Committee of the Forest Hills School District has been in continuous existence since the original consolidation of our component elementary school districts. This committee now consists of approximately 36 members, who represent each of our elementary districts and our high school. Mr. Freeman is not a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee, nor was the action taken by the group of citizens on May 1, 1962, an action of this committee. This meeting was an open public meeting and was attended by many of our citizens, who felt that the School Board should request more than 6.5 mills. Mr. Freeman makes it quite clear that this group passed

his resolution by a vote of 22 to 16; however, he fails to mention that this same group supported a second resolution by a vote of 33 to 3. This read as follows: Resolved that this group will support and back their school board in any millage request that might be put on the ballot for the June election.

Mr. Freeman states that the taxpayers of our district have refused repeatedly to vote in requested millage as supported by this Board of Education. To my knowledge, the close defeat of April 10, 1962, is the only time that our people have voted down a millage request by this Board. Our voters have on several occasions in the past voted additional operating funds, and bond issues for construction of school buildings.

Mr. Freeman also states that our School Board has lost the support of our teachers and that all have refused to sign their contracts for 1963. This is an incorrect statement. Many of our teachers have signed their contracts for 1963.

(Note: Several districts have announced general raises for next year, which are not included in this table.)

Near the top of this list we find "fast company." East Grand Rapids is backed by average taxable property of \$15,834 per child and levied a total of 17 mills operating taxes this year. Grand Rapids has an average of \$20,322 per child and levied 10 1/2 mills. Our district has \$10,228 per child and levied 11 1/2 mills operating tax. (Notice that with only 1/2 the average tax base of Grand Rapids, we would have to levy 21 mills to get the equivalent of their 10 1/2 mills.)

Additional teachers hired and the general salary increase given the teachers a year ago to meet the competition cost the district about \$60,000, resulting in an expected operating deficit of about that amount. Meanwhile, the 2 1/2 mills operating tax which was voted in 1957 has expired; and teachers' annual salary increments for another year go into effect in September, and children come into the schools faster than taxable property is added to the district. This is why 6 1/2 mills is needed to replace the 2 1/2 expiring—a 4 mill increase. We would then have about 15 1/2 mills operating tax next year compared with 11 1/2 mills this year.

Our people are determined to give their children the best possible education. This is both a competitive tool for the individual who will be making his or her way in a complex and technical society; and an investment which can never be wiped out by casualty or economic depression.

It takes more than money to reach the result. Our district has a keenly interested, active citizenry, where school affairs are concerned. If emotions can be controlled, and a reasonable amount of cooperation & agreement reached, the system should continue the progress of the last 6 years.

More detailed facts are available at the Superintendent's office or from Board members for any who wish them. Material will be published in the next few weeks to cover most of the information for which there has been a general demand.

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




