# FACTS You Should Know

# about the Forest Hills School Tax Issue

Next Monday, June 11th, you are asked to vote on a 61/2-mill school operating tax...a continuation of the present 21/2 mills plus an additional 4 mills needed to meet the Board of Education's school budget for the school year starting in September.

The following Questions and Answers are designed to give basic facts concerning the need for the tax increase and the ways the money will be used.

### Q. WHAT WILL WE GET FOR THE ADDITIONAL

- A. Four major items: (1) Nine additional teachers, cost.....\$47,000 (2) Funds for present teachers' salary
  - increases already guaranteed, es-
  - timated cost ...... 18,000 (3) Better maintenance of buildings and
  - grounds (primarily at elementary schools) .....
  - (4) Continuation of the present level of school operations without expenditures exceeding income, as they

did this year, requiring ..... 64,000

Of this \$135,000, about \$106,500 will come from the 4-mill tax increase, if approved. The balance will come from state aid on an estimated 130 additional pupils expected next year and from an anticipated higher county allocation.

### Q. WHAT WILL BE DONE FOR THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS?

A. According to present plans, 7 of the 9 additional teachers needed next year will be assigned to the elementary schools, as follows: 3 additional classroom teachers.

1 additional supervisor. The system now has only one supervisor for 11 elementary schools. Two are needed to insure that good teaching methods and uniform curriculums are maintained throughout the school system.

3 special instructors - for art, music and possibly physical education respectively. Training in these fields is now very inadequate in the Forest Hills elementary schools and below the levels of most other school systems of comparable size.

Also, as pointed out in the first question-answer, most of the \$6,000 additional maintenance funds will be spent on elementary school buildings and grounds.

(Apart from any additional staff or improvement, a "YES" vote June 11th is absolutely necessary if the present level of teaching efficiency is to be maintained. With a 22% loss of revenue facing the school system if the millage is turned down, drastic economy cuts will have to be made. These include elimination of substitute teachers, as well as many teaching aids and supplies, that will directly effect the elementary schools.)

### Q. WHAT ABOUT TEACHERS' SALARY INCREASES?

A. In item 2 above, \$18,000 is allocated to teachers' salary increases, but these are "increment" increases guaranteed to our teachers as a condition of their employment, not a general raise. Such increment raises are given for length of service with our system and for academic degrees (such as a masters degree) earned during the summer or in night school.

### Q. WHAT IS THIS "DEFICIT" IN THE OPERATING

A. On the basis of the current year's budget, expenditures will exceed income by \$64,000. However, the school system started this year with a carry-over from previous years' school income. This, together with economies effected by the Board during the years will leave the system solvent for this year. But there will be no carry-over funds left for next year's school operation and a few of the economies (such as reduced building and grounds maintenance last summer) can be

The simple fact is that, if the proposed operating millage is turned down by the voters June 11th - and even with stringent economy measures - Forest Hills schools will operate in the red next year.

### Q. WHAT WILL THE PROPOSED TAX INCREASE
