been closely following developments and endeavoring to protect the interest of the association members. However, it should be reali zed that all of the recent publicity is relative to engineering sur veys and proposals and as yet has not resulted in a definite program. Nevertheless, the program requires close surveillance and planning at this time.

Wyoming and East Grand Rapids authorities have been formally advised of the association's objections to the possible diversion of water from either the Cascade or Ada Backwaters.

The matter has been discussed with the Consumers Power Company, and the association has informed them, if water is to be taken from the Thornapple Valley, that it be taken from below the Ada Township Supervisors, Gerrit Baker and Richard Lynch, and the Irving Alexander, Tyler. association is coordinating activities with them.

Contact has been made with the appropriate state agencies and the association members will be advised of suggested action within the near future.




