## Baker Takes Easy Win

Cascade Township voters went to the polls in record numbers on Monday with 1162 votes recorded. Gerrit Baker was opposed for supervisor by Lloyd R. Winslow, who announced he would be a write-in candidate. Mrs. Edna Osmer, Township Clerk revealed that the vote count gave Winslow only 57 votes against 885 for Baker. The clerk stated that even if every vote written in on the machines were given to Winslow he would have only had about 100; many votes were spoiled by writing the wrong name or wrong first name.

### Immunization Clinic At Caledonia Saturday, Apr. 6

The second in a series of special immunization clinics for Kent County residents will be held on Saturday, April 6, at Caledonia Elementary School, according to Dr. W. B. Prothro, City-County Health Officer.

Dr. Prothro said the clinic is one of two which were established at the request of local community groups for the purpose of raising the immunization level of children. The clinic will also be open to older children and adults. All regular immunizations will be available without charge.

The Caledonia Clinic is sponsored by the Caledonia Extension Groups and Paddy's College.

The next session of the other special clinic will be held on Saturday, April 20 at Beech Grove School.

### Tornado Plans Set At School

In cooperation with Civil Defense, the Forest Hills Schools administration and the Forest Hills Council, parent organizations and the staffs of the eleven elementary schools have prepared plans for the evacuation of the buildings: Specific parent drivers will return the children from school directly to their homes. The "parents' emergency plan" will go into effect upon notification from the school administrative office to the individual schools that a tornado FORECAST has been officially determined. The elementary school buses will NOT be used in these cases.

The buses will return the Junior High and High School students to their regular stops. These students will be well informed of tornado safety precautions to be observed on their way home.

There has been much confusion about tornado weather terminology. Mr. Chambers has checked with Civil Defense, the Sheriff's Department, and the United States Weather Bureau to determine specific definitions. The United States Weather Bureau uses two, and only two, terms: FORECAST AND WARNING.

### Tornado Forecast

A FORECAST means that a tornado may be imminent (Threatening) within a defined area and within a state time period. There are three (3) degrees of forecasts:

1. 1 or 2 tornadoes possible within a prescribed area.
2. A few tornadoes possible within a prescribed area.
3. Numerous tornadoes possible within a prescribed area and/or period.

### Tornado Warning

A WARNING means a squall line or tornado has been sighted. The necessity of taking cover is immediate. These squalls can come up within twenty minutes; it would be dangerous for a child to leave school under these conditions. Teachers and parents must be well informed and rehearsed as to precautions to be taken in the event of a tornado WARNING. Should there be a WARNING after the buses have left the schools on their regular schedule (as happened last Fall), it would be necessary for parents to pick up their children at the regular stops, of course.

After the WARNING has been lifted, the children may be returned home by the "parent plan".

When a FORECAST has been made: Please do not call the school. Please do not go to the school unless you are scheduled to work as an emergency driver.

Inform your children and the emergency driver where your child will go, should you not be home. This is not to be the decision of the driver.

### 1st Trial Run

It is hoped that each elementary school will have an emergency evacuation drill some time during the week of March 18. Notification as to procedure and drivers participating in the plan will be made to parents by the individual school. Each child will be assured of reaching home as rapidly as possible.

### Meeting

Because we anticipate many questions and some confusion following the first drill, a meeting has been scheduled: Emergency Evacuation Meeting (Multi-Purpose Building (High School) 7:30 p. m., Tuesday, March 26

### 2nd Trial Run

We hope all elementary schools will have a second drill the first week in April to "iron out the rough spots".

### All School Drill

By the week of April 8th, we should be well prepared to try an "All Forest Hills Schools Drill". Remember to tell your friends and neighbors that this will be just a drill!

The tornado season is not far off. This area has averaged five FORECASTS annually. The Administrative office is equipped with a Civil Defense monitor and radios, and the office staff keeps a log of weather conditions during each day. Our bus drivers have been informed as to procedures which apply to them. We may never have to use the "Parents' Emergency Plan", but it is so much better to be prepared than to be sorry later.

### First Aid Measures To Be Shown

April ushers in another dangerous wild fire season in Michigan as thousands of landowners take to their yards and fields to burn leaves and other debris. It's during this month and May that the costs of carelessness run particularly high, posing a serious threat to private property as well as public land values. Last year, wild fire damage to real and personal property (houses, barns, livestock, orchards, etc.) totaled tens of thousands of dollars with much of the toll caused by spring debris burning. Of some 6,265 acres damaged state-wide by fires in 1962, nearly 5,000 burned during April and May. Residents are reminded they must obtain a free permit at Conservation Department field offices or at local fire departments before starting open fires. A good "before-burning" rule calls for making sure debris is well out of the danger zone of buildings. Where and whenever possible, use a safe incinerator to burn debris. It doesn't pay to take chances.--Mich. Dept. of Conservation.

## To Deliver Girl Scout Cookies

Recently, the Girl Scouts have been taking orders for cookies. These cookies will be delivered by the girls during the weeks of April 8 and April 15. They may be paid for at the time of delivery. The following recipes using the Girl Scout cookies have been tested and recommended:

- I. SAVANNAH TOFFEE TORTE  
½ Box Savannah cookies rolled  
¼ cup chopped nutmeats  
¼ lb. oleo or butter  
1 cup powdered sugar  
1½ squares baking chocolate  
3 eggs  
Pinch of salt  
Cream butter and sugar; add beaten egg yolks. Melt chocolate and add to above with salt. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Grease an 8 x 8 x 1 inch pan. Sprinkle half of cookie crumbs and nuts on bottom. Pour mixture in. Then sprinkle on the other half. Refrigerate for 12 hours before serving.

- II. "MINTED BROWNIE PIE"  
14 chocolate mint cookies  
3 egg whites  
dash of salt  
¾ cup sugar  
½ teaspoon vanilla  
½ cup chopped nutmeats  
Sweetened whipped cream (½ to 1 cup heavy cream)  
Chill cookies in refrigerator for a few minutes. Break, cut or roll between folds of waxed paper to even crumbs. Beat egg whites and salt together until soft peaks form. Gradually beat in sugar, beating until stiff peaks form. Fold in cookie crumbs, nutmeats and vanilla and spread in buttered 9-inch pie plate. Bake in a slow oven 325 degrees for 35 minutes. Cool thoroughly. Serve with sweetened whipped cream on each wedge; or, spread sweetened whipped cream over top. Chill 3-4 hours and garnish with curls of shaved unsweetened chocolate.

## Paris Grange Plans Ninetieth Anniversary Dinner, Wednesday, April 10

Members of Paris Grange will hold a dinner on Wednesday, April 10 honoring the 90th anniversary of the founding of the grange. Present officers of the Grange: C. A. Jasperse, Master; Mrs. Hazel Reed, Lecturer; Mrs. Laura Darling, Secretary will lead the Grange in its celebration.

### Colorful History

Paris Grange No. 19 was organized on April 10th, 1873 with twenty-six charter members. It has remained organized continuously for ninety years and is the second oldest Grange in the State. Another Grange in Berrien County was organized a few weeks prior to the organization of Paris Grange. Descendants of some of the original founders are members of the Grange today. At about the same time Burton Grange was organized and an interesting excerpt from the early minutes reads as follows: "The reasons for calling this organization 'Burton Grange' are that Barney Burton, a pioneer of Kent County and of the town of Paris, and having built the first barn in Kent County, and also having been an honest man—it was thought appropriate to name this Grange Burton Grange." It is apparent that Burton Avenue was named after this same individual. In 1879, Paris Grange completed a new Grange Hall on the corner of Breton Road and 28th Street and occupied this hall until it was burned in 1938. A new hall was built immediately and the Grange meets there regularly the second and fourth Fridays of each month.

Shortly after Paris Grange built its new hall in 1879, Burton Grange joined with Paris Grange. Most of the early minutes of both Granges are preserved and items from these minutes are especially interesting. In 1874 we find the Grange had arranged a feast. The secretary has this interesting comment in the minutes of that meeting: "All partook of a most bountiful

repast. It was a feast of fat things and lean things, of hot things and cold things, of wet things and dry things, of sweet things and sour things, of things animal and vegetable, of things frosted and unfrosted, of things cooked and uncooked, of doughnut pies and pies that were not doughnuts, of pound cake and cake that was not pounded, of Durham chickens and Shanghai beef, of tea in cups and coffee in mugs, of fruit just picked from the rooster tree, and pickles served up with potato bugs."

Many interesting topics were discussed at these early meetings. "Panics and Their Causes", "The right or wrong and the expediency of Female Suffrage", "Is it right for the farmer to keep poor fences", "Does it pay to set trees for shade and protection", "What to do about tramps", etc. In the minutes of one meeting we find that \$5.25 was collected for relief to destitute farmers in Iowa and Nebraska who had suffered from grasshoppers.

Last week 14 seniors were picked to represent Forest Hills in the National Honor Society. This, as the name implies, is an organization in existence all over the country.

The members were picked by sponsor Mr. DeWitt and the faculty on the basis of scholarship, character, leadership, and service. As many as 15 per cent of the senior class could be chosen and Forest Hills placed 14 on the roster, including our two foreign exchange students as honorary members.

Of nine juniors in the society last year, six returned this year as seniors. The juniors will be chosen later in the year, and the ruling is that 10 per cent of the class may be chosen. These students should be proud of the special recognition they have earned and we should be proud of them.

Mrs. Numberger and Mrs. Fisher assisted Mrs. Schalk on this trip.



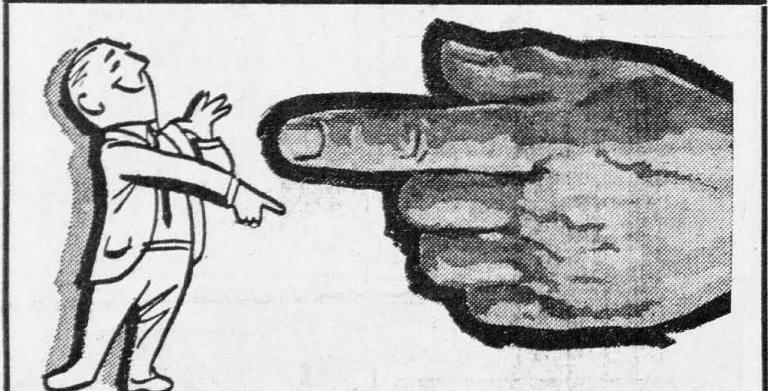
## Ski Enthusiast Is Senior of Week

The R. L. Werner family, Forest Hills Ave., immensely enjoys skiing, and spends every snowy weekend on the slopes.

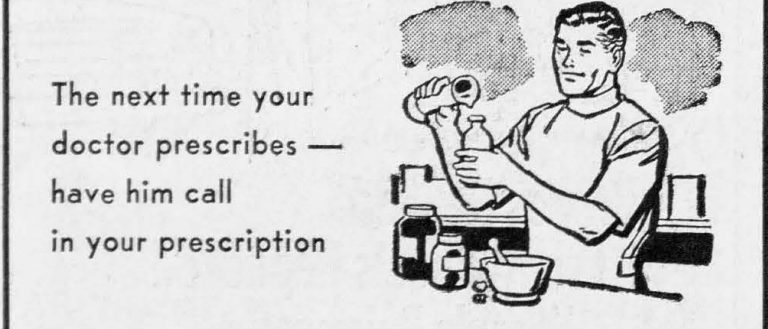

**Nature Notes**

by Edith Jarvi

The first wild flower of spring, blossom of the stunk cabbage, is not pretty. It has no petals and is clustered thickly on the short stem, the spadix, inside an attractive mottled maroon hood, the spathe. They grow in moist places and don't wait for the ground to thaw, but rather thaw it with their own growth so that they may be seen as soon as the snow is gone.  
The next wild flowers grow on hillsides, warmed by the sun, under leafless trees. One is the hepatica, a many-petaled lavender blue flower that blooms from the center of a cluster of last year's leaves. These may also be shades of blue, pink, buff or white.  
The other is the trailing arbutus. This is a trailing shrublet which also keeps its leaves over winter. The flowers are a bright light pink with white cluster, often hid under the leaves.  
These flowers are here to greet the Great Blue Heron, The Song Sparrow, the Towhee, the Brown Thrasher, Hermit Thrush and Yellow Throat, whose arrival assures us that spring is really here.

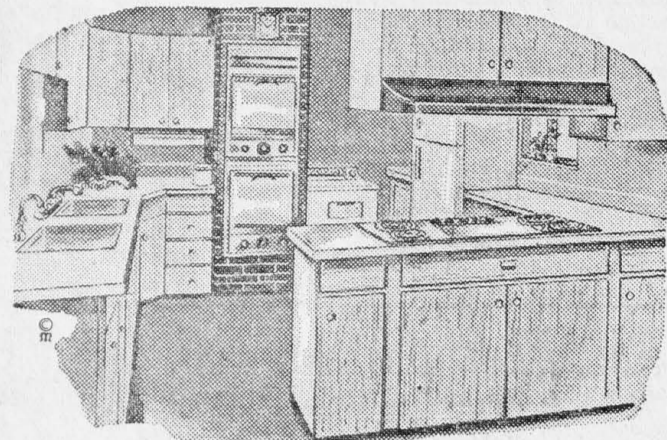

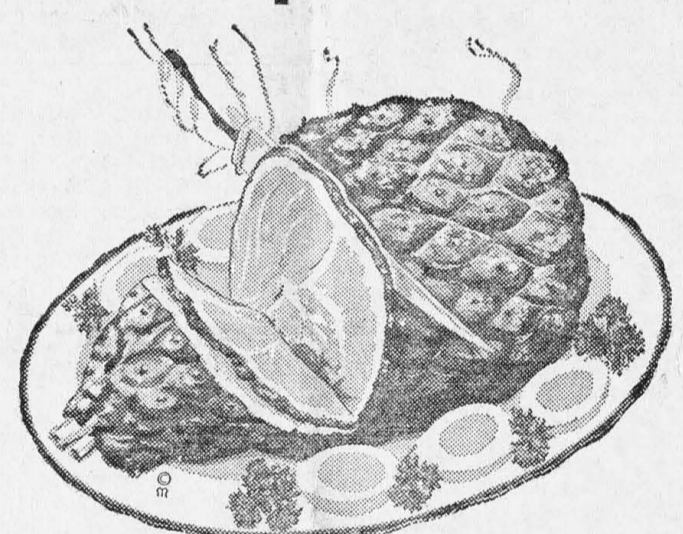
