"My early planted corn, planted on the furrow in a four inch depression escaped the May 22 and 23 killing frosts," reports District cooperator Ralph Johnson of Cannon twp. Ralph, who makes use of all of

he conservation "tricks of his rade", weighted down his corn planter to plant at that depth to get adequate seed compaction. Two side attached shovels opened up the seed bed trough. He pointed out a few damaged rows where the corn plants were at normal ground level. But on his sandy loam soils, the lower planted corn was not nipped by the late freeze. Early emerging weeds are covered by the first cultiviation. This corn should not be affected as much by a mid summers drought. Ralph believes that post emergence weed spraying when the corn is six to eight inches high is less expensive and more effective this early in the spring.




