## Good Attitude Makes Studies Very Interesting

With Labor Day comes picnics, parades and school. To help ease the change from beaches to books, the Michigan Education Association offers scholars a few tips on how to study.

Most important, start off with a good attitude toward your studies. Try to see the benefits of every course.

No one can do two things well at the same time so eliminate all kinds of outside interference. Study where it is quiet and clear your desk of pictures, souvenirs, magazines and letters. Study in a well-lighted place with a comfortable temperature. Sit in a straight-backed chair at a desk or table and try to have all the materials handy that you will need. This includes paper, pencils and reference books.

Budget your time for each subject and then begin immediately. Hesitation and indecision are two of the chief causes of defeat. Once you have developed a study plan stick with it.

When you begin studying an assignment, try to see the whole before working on the parts. You will find that the sense of the material will be much more apparent. Also learn the material in the way you will use it.

It is a good idea to take a break about every 1/2-hour. Decide ahead when you will take your breaks and do not take them before time. A good break should be about five minutes.

A final point—contribute in class. You will build up your interest and make studying less tedious. Remember, it's not always what you know that earns good grades, it's what you let the teacher know that you know.

This so-called franchise is very much lacking in the protection of the rights and interests of the people of Cascade township, but it is evidently hoped you will vote those rights and interests away on September 10th. Where did our township board get the idea they are doing us a good deed in promoting this deal. Why does the franchise read "beyond the limits of Cascade township" This franchise also permits the Somerville Co. to sell or assign this franchise and they need never turn one shovel of earth. Think this over.

Where does Mr. Somerville expect to get this water? Does he expect to take it from the Thornapple River which both associations in Cascade have been against when Wyoming and East Grand Rapids were teaming up to come out here for that purpose? Does he expect to take it by large deep wells driven in this area? If so the water well problem in Cascade township has just started. Do you remember what happened to Byron township when Wyoming was pumping heavily to supply Wyoming's water needs? Are we to be put in this same position.

It is a known fact that the water table has dropped in this area in some wells as much as 10 feet in the past 4 or 5 years. Where do we go from this point, if this franchise is granted by the electors. Who besides our township board and Mr. Somerville are promoting this project? And why?

Recent Newspaper accounts in the G. R. Press as to the water situation between Grand Rapids, Wyoming and East Grand Rapids certainly brings the water situation into a clear picture of what goes on politically in regards to water. Isn't it possible that our water franchise election date of Sept. 10th, and the one in Wyoming on Sept. 17th are not just a coincidence? Certainly Cascade Township has nothing to gain in voting away its water rights for \$250.00 or any other amount, besides being tied up for 30 years on the water situation as the franchise so states. A copy of the franchise was printed in the Suburban Life on July 18, 1963. Read it over and see what you think of it.

## Fear of Loneliness Deafness Penalty

We all know "the five senses"—sight, hearing, smell, taste and touch. Next to sight, probably the second most important to us is hearing. Many of us take our hearing for granted. Not until we begin to lose it do we realize how dependent we are upon it in almost every daily activity.

"In 1961 it was estimated that nearly 6,000,000 people in the United States had impaired hearing and the number has undoubtedly increased since then," says Dr. W. B. Prothro, City-County Health Officer. After the age of 40 the number increases sharply. Loss of hearing may result from infections, particularly in children, certain drugs, injury to the ears or head, exposure to excessive noise, and aging.

Recently one authority on deafness said, "Of all the handicaps encountered in deafness, I believe that loneliness, and especially the fear of loneliness, is possibly the greatest problem. You and I as hearing people have been lonely, but I do not believe that we can ever quite realize the degree of loneliness a deaf person sometimes feels."

How can it best be prevented? Be sure that all infections and injuries are fully treated, follow your doctor's advice on taking medicines and try to avoid too much exposure to loud noise.

Don't be discouraged if your children seem to reject your advice. It isn't wasted. Years later they will be offering it to their children.

## River Association Says Water Franchise Not In Township Interest

With the September 10 Special Election in Cascade Township for granting a thirty year water franchise to Somerville Construction Company, there are many valid questions being asked by the voters.

The Board of the Cascade Thornapple Association has made an extensive study of the proposed franchise and feels the Township Board is to be commended for recognizing an eventual need for a water system, however this group feels that the proposed franchise—as now written—is not in the best interests of Cascade Township.

The Association Board in its meetings with the Township Board, as well as in its letters to them, advocated:

1. "Water within the limits of Cascade Township should not be distributed beyond the boundaries of Cascade Township."

It is felt that the Thornapple River had been the major attraction in the settling of the area, and it should be preserved. The great investment which has been made by individuals in their existing wells should be protected. When Mr. Somerville suggested he might have a pipeline on the perimeter of the Township and would naturally want to service both

## Pre-School Check Needed by Children

Parents were urged today by Dr. W. B. Prothro, Grand Rapids-Kent County Health Departments Health Officer, to see that their children have a medical checkup before starting the school year. "Illness and poor performance in school can be prevented in many youngsters by a preschool checkup," said Dr. Prothro, "and this applies from kindergarten through high school."

The answer to "Why can't Johnny read?" may be that he can't see the words so well, or perhaps he doesn't hear the teacher as well as he should. Unsuspected small defects can make a big difference in his progress at school and later in life.

Protective immunization against polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough, and vaccination against smallpox are the best defense against these crippling and killing diseases. Follow-up booster shots should be obtained at proper intervals, and these can be taken care of at the regular checkups. In many states this protection is required before any student is permitted to enter school.

Authorities emphasize the need for greater national physical fitness, especially in our youths. A regular checkup can be an important step toward maintaining fitness and health.

In most cases the child will receive a clean bill of health, which is always good news. In others an unsuspected condition may be discovered and taken care of before it becomes serious, thereby avoiding possible suffering, lost time, and expense. Dr. Prothro urges parents not to wait until the last minute when doctors and clinics are swamped. Now is the time to arrange for that important preschool checkup.

For the Christian there is a promise of a home that perfectly fulfills all these conditions. Jesus says to the believer: I go to prepare a home for you, a home in heaven. He has paid the price. That home becomes your eternal possession only through faith in Jesus Christ.

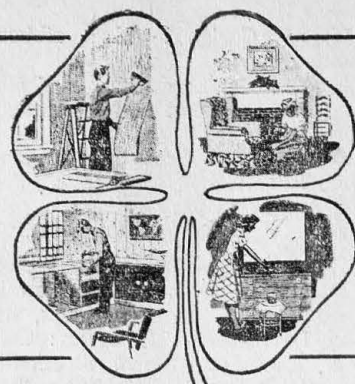
