Cascade Aclaims New Airport

Citizens of Cascade were in the forefront among the thousands who visited the new Cascade Airport which opened on Saturday. In the morning the Cascade Township Board were among the official guests along with president of the Cascade Businessmen's Association Richard Seppaman. Other official guests included Ada Township Supervisor Richard Lynch, and Lowell Township Supervisor, Ray Rittenger.

Of particular interest was a discussion at the official opening with Charles Lawyer, Grand Rapids Treasurer and member of the Kent County Board of Supervisors, and a native of Cascade Township. Lawyer said that he was born at the family homestead just at the east end of the airport and the great change in the landscape would certainly be a shock to his family if they could have lived to see it.

Another Cascade native whose family home is next to the new airport is trustee of the Cascade Township Board, Minor Cook.

Looks for Tremendous Growth
Charles Lawyer said that he looks for tremendous growth in the area around the airport with light industry and office and warehouse facilities moving into close proximity of the new transportation facility.

Just in the past few years while the airport has been under construction the citizens of the area can see the movement along 28th Street of industrial offices of former Grand Rapids concerns. The Pneu-dynamic Corporations new plant for production of electronic parts for missiles and aircraft was among the first to locate specifically near the new Cascade Airport.

In a few years it is expected that Spaulding, Patterson and the other roads surrounding the airport will be built up solid with commercial buildings. This should add greatly to the economic strength of the entire community.

Cascade Airport Open To Public

Kent County's new multi-million dollar airport in Cascade Township became operational last week-end following special ribbon-cutting ceremonies and tours for officials and guests Saturday morning. The new airport was opened for public viewing Saturday afternoon from 12:30 to 4 p. m., following the official ceremonies. Work on the interior of the terminal building will continue throughout the winter months and the new air transportation facility will be officially dedicated at gala ceremonies planned for early June.

The design for Kent County's new airport terminal building features an H-shaped building complex supporting a nine-story control tower. The new airport terminal building was designed by the Daverman Associates, architects and engineers, and features extensive use of glass and precast concrete panels with exposed quartz aggregate facing.

The multi-level terminal building design concept incorporates four basic elements: the passenger service wing, the main terminal structure, a passenger concourse arm and the control tower.

The passenger service wing constitutes the main passenger entrance to the building. All passengers will enter and depart from the airport through this wing. Contain-

ing approximately 12,000 square feet, this building houses ticketing counters for United Airlines, North Central and Lake Central Airlines, and airfreight office, a baggage reclaim area, insurance counters, car-rental agency offices, and facilities for ground transportation to the surrounding cities and residential areas. The main entrance to this one story building features a cantilevered covered walkway, to shelter arriving and departing passengers from the weather.

This passenger service wing is connected to the main terminal building by means of an enclosed corridor bridge for passenger traffic. All airport baggage and service vehicle traffic will flow beneath the passenger service bridge.

The interior design of the 24,000 square foot main terminal building features a two-story, spacious lobby surrounded by a mezzanine which provides access to a group of second-story offices. When completed, the main lobby will contain a central passenger lounge, surrounded by various concessions areas including newsstand, coin-vended food area, game room, novelty and gift shop, a permanent exhibit by the Grand Rapids Furniture Manufacturers Association, coffee shop and cocktail lounge, and other spaces yet to be leased. The public rest room area, located off the main lobby, also contains an equipped nursery for passenger comfort and convenience.

An outstanding design feature of the lobby area is the open mezzanine stairway which ascends directly over a ceramic-tiled pool.

The mezzanine floor will include a public observation lounge, air traffic management offices and conference room, weather bureau area, FAA Flight Services area and Safety Division, and other office spaces to be leased. The mezzanine will also contain a Fred Harvey restaurant and cocktail lounge. These facilities are expected to be operational by February.

The main terminal wing also contains a ground level area which will house the airport's mechanical, electrical and telephone equipment, as well as a stand-by generator for emergency lighting and control tower power. This lower level will also provide other spaces available for leasing to those tenants desiring airport terminal space.

Stretching out in a southerly direction from the main terminal building is an enclosed passenger concourse containing eight loading gates. At each gate position inside the concourse will be operations spaces for the airlines. The concourse has been designed for future expansion to increase the number of boarding positions from the present eight. The concourse will support a public observation deck which will be accessible from the mezzanine floor of the terminal building.

Towering above the two-story terminal wing, and integrated with the total building design is the 130 foot high FAA control tower. This nine-story tower features cantilevered floor slabs and is capped by a glass-enclosed cab from which air traffic controllers can direct all flight and related ground activities in the terminal area. The tower also houses such other FAA facilities as communications and radar equipment rooms, offices, training and maintenance areas.

The tower is served by a staff elevator to all work areas.

The design is a contemporary solution which provides maximum passenger comfort, economy of operation and future expandability. The design scheme permits passengers to pass through the entire terminal boarding process without climbing stairs. Furthermore the design also precludes the necessity for expensive escalator services.

Approximately three years in construction, the airport is considered a model for communities the size of Grand Rapids, which has a city population of 201,000 and a metropolitan population of approximately 350,000 people.

The main runway is 6,600 feet long and 150 feet wide and has a parallel taxi strip 75 feet wide, with high-speed turn-offs from the runway to the taxi strip. Both are concrete, 10 inches deep. The runway is just off the east-west axis, having been built as an 80-260 runway after extensive wind rose plottings.

Clear approaches and complete landing facilities are expected to make the new airport operable under conditions that precluded landings and take-offs at the previous Kent County field. The runway has center-line lighting, a full approach lighting system with stroboscopic units stretching 3,000 feet beyond the east end of the runway, and ILS facilities.

There is a paved 500-car parking lot, with room for expansion to 1,500-car capacity. Across the parking lot from the terminal building, a 50-unit motel is under construction and room is available for expansion of this facility, also. The airport lies approximately two miles south of a freeway, for which a penetration route to the center of Grand Rapids is now under construction and scheduled to open in 1964.

Also at the new airport is a completely new fixed base operator's facilities, operated by Northern Air Service. The main building, 220 feet by 120 feet, houses maintenance hangars, shops, pilot lounge and office facilities. In addition, there are 45 all-metal T-hangars plus tie-down facilities for private planes. Cement aprons serve the area.

A north-south runway, 3,500 feet long, will permit light plane landings regardless of wind direction. This runway does not intersect the main runway.

In referring to the terminal building scheme as a "design for tomorrow's jet age," Britton L. Gordon, Chairman of the County Airport Board, credited the architects and engineers with "proposing a design solution which will enable the air terminal to expand any one of its four functions independently without disturbing or interrupting the efficient operation of the other principal areas."

Gordon pointed out that "these four primary functions include the restaurant, ticketing, baggage reclaim, and terminal areas." He also indicated that future plans call for the construction of a second passenger concourse when necessary.

The new port is located on an 1,800-acre site about 10 miles from the center of Grand Rapids. The previous airport covered approximately 400 acres. The old facility started in 1926 and had a 1935-vintage terminal building. In the past 35 years, urban development has surrounded the field.

RUNWAY SYSTEM

A. SITE

The new airport site comprises 1800 acres and is located south-east of Grand Rapids.

The contract for grading and drainage was awarded in the spring of 1961 and it took approximately 1 year to complete this site work.

The pouring of concrete for the runway system took approximately six weeks.

B. RUNWAYS

East-West Main

1. This is the main instrument runway and is 6600 feet long and 150 feet wide. The main runway at the old airport was 5700 feet long.

2. This main runway is paralleled by a 75 foot wide taxiway with two highspeed turnoffs, which will enable aircraft to make 60 m.p.h. exits from the runway to the taxiway.

3. There also are two aircraft turnarounds at either end of the runway.

C. PARKING

A public parking area for 600 cars will be constructed just north west of the terminal building.

D. MISCELLANEOUS FACTS

1. Amount of concrete used in runway, turnoffs, taxiway and aprons is equivalent to paving 22 miles of dual-lane highway. There are approximately 2,295,000 square feet of concrete surface area. Approximately 133,589 tons of concrete were used.

2. Approximately 15 miles of sewer pipe was installed for the drainage system at the new airport.

3. Approximately 324 acres of grass seed will be sown at the airport site, requiring approximately one ton of grass seed.

4. The amount of dirt moved in the grading of the new site is equivalent to erecting a tower of dirt, one yard square and 1,700 miles high.

E. FUTURE RUNWAYS

The proposed north-south runway for light aircraft is expected to be constructed in 1963. It will be 3400 feet long and 100 feet wide. It will also have a parallel taxiway 50 feet wide. This proposed N-S runway will be surfaced by 32,000 tons of aggregate bituminous material.

According to the Liquor Control Commission the Ada restaurant was charged with having the premises occupied after the legal hour, persons consuming after the legal closing hour and refusal to cooperate with law enforcement officers.
Disposition of the charges was not known, but the hearing was scheduled for Tuesday, November 26.

Paddy's College Group To Study "Food Patterns"

"Food Patterns—A Part of Our Cultural Heritage" was the lesson given to the Paddy's College Extension Study Group November 19, 1963, at the home of Mrs. Jack Buys, 4486 Whitneyville Rd. by Mrs. Bernard Schaaf and Mrs. Clarence Hansen.

It was shown how food patterns from other countries are often modified to fit our way of life. For example our "coffee breaks" are an adaptation of the English teas—substituting the coffee for we just like it better. We do like to have teas for very special occasions with our best china and linen but it doesn't fit into our daily routine. Our buffet style way of serving and good old fashioned potlucks are a version of the Swedish smorgasbord.

An interesting pamphlet on "truffles" was examined by all members. Truffles are France's gift to gourmets. It is a fungus fruit related to edible mushrooms and to less appetizing fungi as molds, yeasts and mildews. French farmers train pigs to hunt for truffles which grow a few inches to a foot deep. Working against the wind a pig can smell a truffle 20 feet away.

Authentic recipes handed down from generation to generation were made by the leaders and hostess and were served as the refreshments. They were "Vet Bollen" (fat balls), Dutch Apple Cake, Banquet, Swedish cookies and Auskies from Poland.
