



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## Scrawl Signature Main Cause Of Slow Income Tax Refunds

"When will I get my refund?" s one of the most frequent tax questions according to R. I. Nixon Detroit District Director of Inter nal Revenue. He said that th failure to receive a refund-check or savings bond-is usually caused by illegible names or addresses.

Mr. Nixon said that it is per missible to sign your name at the bottom of the return the way you always sign your name, even if your signature is a hurried scrawl At the top of the return, however your name should also be carefully printed or typed along with your social security number. In other words, eliminate any doubt as to who you are and where you live.

Each year thousands of refund checks are returned to Internal Revnue offices because the postman cannot deliver them.

Mr. Nixon said that if the taxpayer has moved, he should show his new address to promptly re ceive refunds and other mail from Internal Revenue. If he moves after filing, a forwarding address should be left with the post office.

# Improper Medical **Marriage Tests**

State Health Commissioner Dr Albert E. Heustis today revealed that he has received information indicating the possibility of some aboratories practicing medicine vithout a license, and that he is referring information available to him to the State Board of Registration in Medicine for any individual investigated and for appropriate action.

Following the disclosure that two aboratories in the Detroit area had been issuing illegal medical human experience. certificates for marriage licenses the Commissioner made an appeal to the public to help check on posmarital Physical Examination Law

So far, he has received more than 100 letters from persons recently married. Nearly half of the letters indicated that the couples had not had a complete physical examination and that the medical certificate was not signed in their presence.

The law requires that all persons making application for a license to marry shall within 30 days prior to making application be examined by a licensed physician as to the existence or nonexistence of syphilis, gonorrhea, or chancroid.

"Syphilis can be suspicioned by means of the state-approved type of blood test, done at the request of a physician, and in a laboratory that is approved and has the facilities and the know-how to make the determination accurately," Dr.
